## Nunes posts preparedness information online

Rep. Devin Nunes joined Homeland Security Secretary Tom Ridge in urging citizens to be better prepared to cope with emergencies that might arise in their community, ranging from natural disasters to terrorist attacks.

"In uncertain times like these, it makes sense to adopt the Boy Scouts motto: Be prepared," said Rep. Devin Nunes, R-Tulare. "There are practical steps we should all take to be prepared for any emergency, whether it is a natural disaster, power outage or other unforeseen event."

The likelihood of you and your family surviving a house fire depends as much on having working smoke detector and exit strategy, as on a well-trained fire department. The same is true for surviving a terrorist attack. Residents should have the tools and plans in place to make it on their own, at least for a period of time. Just like having a working smoke detector, preparing for the unexpected makes sense, according to Homeland Security officials.

At a Homeland Security briefing earlier this week. officials distributed a brochure that lays out the practical steps any citizen could take to prepare themselves for an emergency. A copy of the brochure can be downloaded in PDF form from Mr. Nunes' Web site. Print copies are expected to be available soon.

Mr. Nunes has been part of the country's frontline defense against terrorism. In early February, he took part in a simulated bio-terrorist attack against the nation's agricultural industry.

As one of the key partici-
