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# **Appropriations Policy Brief**

# H.R. 3058 – Transportation, Treasury, HUD, Judiciary, and District of Columbia Appropriations Act for FY 2006

#### **Excluding Emergency Appropriations, the Committee Bill is:**

- > \$513 million (0.8%) more than last year
- > \$6.2 billion (10.2%) more than the request

H.R. 3058 exceeds the request *in part* because the Committee chose not to adopt the President's Strengthening America's Grant Program reforms. This proposal would have consolidated and transferred a number of grant programs, including the Community Development Grant Program, from the Housing Department to Commerce. As a result, this is one reason why the allocation for the Science, State Justice, and Commerce Appropriations Subcommittee is below the request.

**<u>Budget Compliance</u>**: According to CBO, the bill is within the 302(b) allocation of the Transportation, Treasury, and HUD Appropriations Subcommittee.

<u>Unauthorized Appropriations</u>: According to the Committee report, the bill appropriates \$48,944,056 for unauthorized appropriations. The Rules of the House prohibit this practice, but the rule governing consideration of the bill waives this restriction.

# **Items of Note:**

**Essential Air Service (EAS):** Provides \$104 million (an increase of \$2 million) for EAS. The program was created in 1978 to continue air service to communities that received mandated air service prior to deregulation. In the past, some conservatives have expressed concerns that the program was meant to be transitional, that it should be phased out, and that the subsidy per passenger (up to \$200) is particularly high. The Congressional Budget Office estimates that eliminating EAS would save \$1.2 billion over ten years.

**Amtrak:** Contains \$550 million for Amtrak, a decrease of \$657 million over last year's enacted level and \$190 million more than the request. The bill specifically prohibits funding for eighteen Amtrak routes that operate with a high subsidy level (\$30 per passenger or greater). The Committee Report notes that the 24 remaining Amtrak routes eligible for federal funding represented more than 80% of Amtrak's passengers in 2004. In addition, the bill earmarks \$50 million for capital investments to the Northeast Corridor.

**Mass Transit**: Includes \$8.5 billion for the Federal Transit Administration, an increase of \$836 million over last year's enacted level and \$701 million above the President's request.

**Member Pay Raise**: Does **NOT** include a pay increase for Members of Congress. The pay increase is automatic under existing law unless Congress enacts legislation blocking the pay raise. Any amendment seeking to do so would be deemed out of order.

**Housing Certificate Fund Rescission**: Rescinds \$2.5 billion in unobligated balances from the Section 8 rental assistance programs as proposed by the Administration.

Native Hawaiian Funding: Includes over \$10 million to fund various programs for Native Hawaiians, including the Native Hawaiian Housing Block Grant and the Loan Guarantee Fund Program. Some conservatives may be concerned that such benefits are being dispensed as if Native Hawaiians constitute an Indian tribe. However, Native Hawaiians are a racial group – not a tribe – and dispensing benefits to them would likely be subject to strict scrutiny in federal courts. **Domestic Partner Benefits in the District of Columbia**: Maintains the provision that prohibits federal funds, but NOT District funds from being used to provide employment, health, or governmental benefits to unmarried (whether heterosexual or homosexual) domestic partners.

**Abortion Funding Ban in the District of Columbia**: Maintains the prohibition on the use of federal or District funds for abortions (except for the life of the mother or in cases of rape or incest).

**Self-Determination for the District of Columbia**: Maintains the prohibition on the use of federal or District funds to seek voting representation in Congress or statehood for the District.

**Needle Exchange in the District of Columbia**: Maintains the prohibition on the use of federal or District Funds for the operation of needle exchange programs.

**Medical Marijuana in the District of Columbia**: Maintains the prohibition on the use of federal or District funds to implement any medical marijuana program.

**Anacostia Waterfront Initiative**: Provides \$5 million for the Anacostia Waterfront Initiative. Last year, \$3 million was provided for the project. According to the Appropriations Committee, the initiative is a multi-year project to revitalize the communities along the Anacostia River by designing and constructing a pedestrian and bike path from the Potomac River to the Maryland border.

**Abortion Funding Ban in the FEHBP**: Maintains the prohibition on the use of funds for abortions through the Federal Employee Health Benefit Program (except for the life of the mother or in cases of rape or incest).

# **Presidential Terminations and Reductions:**

**Overview**: According to the Committee, the bill terminates 11 programs and saves \$446 million. The Administration proposed 13 specific terminations and reductions, saving \$1.1 billion. The Committee chose to adopt only two of these terminations and two of these reductions (at higher levels than requested), saving \$391 million with regard to these selected programs.

**Next Generation High Speed Rail:** Reduces from \$19 million to \$10.2 million funding for the Next Generation High Speed Rail program. The program funds research and development for high-speed rail. The Administration proposed to terminate the program and have such research compete against other projects under the Federal Railroad Administration's existing research and development program.

National Defense Tank Vessel Construction Program: Provides no new funding for the National Defense Tank Vessel Construction Program, which provides subsidies to construct commercial oil tankers that could be used in wartime or national emergency as part of the Maritime security fleet. The Administration proposed to terminate the program and rescind \$74 million appropriated in FY05 (not adopted by the Committee), citing a similar ineffective ship construction program that was terminated in 1981.

**Railroad Rehabilitation and Improvement Financing Loan Program (RRIF):** Retains RRIF which provides loan subsidies for the improvement and rehabilitation of rail infrastructure. No appropriation is made to the program, but the Administration proposed its termination to reduce the government's exposure to costly defaults.

**Facilities and Equipment Program:** Increases funding for the FAA's Facilities and Equipment program from \$2.5 billion to \$3.1 billion. This program provides funds for the FAA to modernize its information technology. The Administration proposed to reduce funding for the program to \$2.5 billion, saving \$77 million, as a result of consistently large cost overruns.

**Airport Improvement Program:** Increases funding for the Airport Improvement Program from \$3.5 billion to \$3.6 billion which provides funds to rehabilitate and expand runways, taxiways, and facilities. The Administration proposed \$3 billion for the program, saving \$497 million.

**IRS Taxpayer Service Program:** Increases funding for the IRS "processing, assistance, and management" account from \$4.1 billion to \$4.2 billion, which contains funding for the Taxpayer Service Program. It appears from the Committee Report that the bill does not endorse the Administration's proposal to reduce funding for this program and decrease walk-in taxpayer assistance centers (TACs).

**Strengthening America's Grant Program**: Declines to consolidate and transfer a number of economic development programs from the Housing Department to Commerce, including Community Development Block Grants (\$3.9 billion or \$250 million below last year's level), as requested by the Administration. This proposal would have saved \$1.6 billion.

**HOPE VI:** Terminates \$143 million in funding for the Revitalization of Severely Distressed Public Housing Program (HOPE VI), which provides grants to public housing authorities to demolish public housing units. The Administration proposed this termination, because the program was enacted with the goal of demolishing 100,000 dangerous units and that goal has been surpassed (117,000 units through 2004).

**Housing for Persons with Disabilities:** Retains the \$238 million for the Housing for Persons with Disabilities program, to construct and rebuild group homes and for low-income persons with disabilities. The Administration proposed to scale the program back to \$120 million, citing cost overruns and construction delays.

Native American Housing Block Grant: Reduces funding for the Native American Housing Block Grant program from \$622 million to \$600 million which provides funds to Native American tribes to improve poor housing conditions. The Administration requested a larger reduction (\$522 million) in funding because the program has been unable to demonstrate results and there remains significant unspent balances that could be used to maintain services.

**Public Housing Capital Fund:** Increases funding for the Public Housing Capital Fund from \$2.58 billion to \$2.6 billion to renovate local public housing. The Administration proposed to reduce such funding by \$252 million.

**High Intensity Drug Trafficking Areas Program:** Increases funding for the Office of National Drug Control Policy's High Intensity Drug Trafficking Areas Program from \$226.6 million to \$227 million. This program assists those programs most affected by drug trafficking. The Administration proposed total funding of \$100 million in order to focus resources on a smaller number of areas. For instance, the program's resources now flow to 28 large areas encompassing 60% of the nation's population.

National Historical Publications and Records Commission (NHPRC) Grant Program: Increases funding for the National Archives' program from \$5 million to \$7.5 million. This program provides grants to states, localities, and other institutions to preserve historical records. The Administration proposed no new funding for the program, to save \$5 million.

**Postal Service Revenue Foregone:** Increases funding for the "revenue foregone" appropriation from \$29 million to \$43 million. This program reimburses USPS for the cost of offering reduced rates to non-profit mailers (mandated by law). The Administration proposed to eliminate this program based on legislation enacted (P.L. 108-18) in 2003 that lowered USPS' pension payments "more than compensating the organization for the loss of this small revenue foregone appropriation."
