Policy Brief..... FY 2005 Foreign Operations Appropriations

BY THE NUMBERS:

Excluding Iraq reconstruction supplemental spending, the Committee bill is:

- \$1.9 billion or 11% above last year; and
- \$1.9 or 10% below the request.

H.R. 4766 is within the 302(b) allocation for the Foreign Operations Appropriations Subcommittee and thus complies with the Budget Act.

Note: In the past six years, foreign operations spending has grown 35.1% and 5.1% each year on average.

LANGUAGE OF NOTE:

Global AIDS Funding – The bill provides \$1.87 billion to combat international HIV/AIDS, including \$1.26 billion for the State Department's Global HIV/AIDS Initiative, \$570 million from USAID, and \$36 million from various other accounts. In addition, the bill provides an additional \$330 million to combat tuberculosis and malaria. Such funding levels fully meet the President's request.

<u>Export-Import Bank</u> – The bill provides \$166 million, an increase of \$127 million or 330% for the Export-Import Bank. In the past, some conservatives have expressed concern that the Bank subsidizes corporations that export to other countries. For instance, in FY2000, Boeing, General Electric, and United Technologies were among the top beneficiaries of the Bank.

Economic Support Fund – The bill contains \$2.45 billion for global economic support, including \$360 million for Israel, \$535 million for Egypt, \$250 million for Jordan, \$200 million for Pakistan, \$35 million for Lebanon, and \$50 million for Haiti.

<u>International Fund for Ireland</u> – The bill contains \$18.5 million (\$10 million more than the President requested) in economic support for Ireland. Northern Ireland's current unemployment is less than the U.S.

<u>Russian Assistance to Iran</u> – Withholds 60% of the funds allocated for the Government of the Russian Federation until the President certifies that they terminated any arrangements to provide nuclear assistance to Iran and are providing access to humanitarian relief for Chechen refugees.

<u>Millennium Challenge Accounts</u> – The bill provides \$1.25 billion (25% increase) for Millennium Challenge Accounts – President Bush's initiative to restructure foreign aid to reward (and therefore provide incentives to) those countries exhibiting certain best practices that lead to economic independence.

<u>Foreign Military Financing</u> – The bill contains \$4.8 billion for foreign military financing (an increase of \$221 million or 4.9%), including \$2.2 billion for Israel (an increase of \$72 million) and \$1.3 billion for Egypt (an increase of \$7.7 million). Such funding levels for Israel and Egypt fully meet the President's request.

<u>Pro-Life Provisions</u> – Maintains the Kemp-Kasten language that allows the President to take funding away from any group that supports a coercive population control program; maintains the Tiahrt language to require family planning be voluntary; maintains the ban on foreign aid funding for abortion; maintains the ban on using Peace Corps funds for abortion

<u>UNFPA Funding</u> – Provides \$25 million for the United Nations Population Fund (UNPFA), provided that the UNFPA does not fund abortions and that amounts spent in China by UNFPA be deducted from the U.S. contribution to UNFPA. **Note**: Since FY02, the Bush Administration has determined that "UNFPA's support of, and involvement in, China's population-planning activities allows the Chinese government to implement more effectively its program of coercive abortion" (Source: Secretary Powell, July 21, 2002). This determination has triggered the Kemp-Kasten statutory language and thus UNFPA has not received any U.S. taxpayer funds in the past three years, despite the fact that the appropriations committee continues to earmark funds for the organization. Because UNFPA refuses to stop its collusion with the enforcers of China's brutal one-child policy, it is expected the FY05 funds allocated in this bill would again be frozen. <u>Funding Commodities in Surplus</u> – Restricts funding for expanding production of any commodity for export by a country other than the U.S., if the commodity is likely to be in surplus on the world market and if such assistance will injure U.S. producers.

<u>Relocation of U.S. Businesses and Workers Rights –</u> Prohibits funds from being used to provide an incentive for U.S. businesses to relocate outside the U.S. if such a relocation will reduce employment in the U.S. Also prohibits funding for any activity that contributes to a violation of internationally recognized worker rights.

<u>Prohibition On Assistance to Governments That Support Terrorism</u> – Prohibits assistance to countries that export lethal military equipment to countries supporting international terrorism.

<u>Assistance to the PLO –</u> The bill contains several specific restrictions on providing assistance to the PLO (See Sections 544, 547, 550, and 558).

<u>Palestinian State</u> – Prohibits funding to support a Palestinian State unless certain conditions are met (See Section 555).

<u>Assistance to Afghanistan</u> Provides that not less than \$977 million shall be provided as assistance for Afghanistan.

<u>Debt Relief for the Poorest Countries</u> – The bill authorizes the reduction of debt owed to the U.S. by the poorest counties so long as appropriations have been made in advance.

EARMARKS:

<u>University Programs</u> – The Committee report directs USAID to actively consider funding (but still subject to the competitive process, if applicable) 42 separate projects at universities. For a list see pages 28-30 of the Committee Report.
