My statement might have been clearer had I said, "the fall of 2003," rather than the fall of FY2004." In both cases, its the same date; the anticipated start-up for the two service area pilots is October 2003, about five months from now.

Sue,

Thanks for sharing the notes you and Rick made on your recent visit to Houston. Your comments and observations illustrate the value of board members making these trips, and I am especially appreciative that you and Rick took the time to meet with the chapter's paid and volunteer staff. I know they enjoyed your visit and the opportunity to hear directly from board members.

With your permission, I am forwarding a copy of your comments on to Alan McCurry and David.

### A few observations of my own:

• Houston has been a strong chapter and the anchor for the SW region. The economic distress they are currently experiencing is common to many chapters, even our best ones. The staff cuts they anticipate will be painful, but are necessary in these difficult times. Your notes suggest that they will make these cuts in accord with the newly developed corporate strategy. That's the right thing to do, but it will put pressure on programs like Transportation and HIV/AIDS. While undeniably valuable, every program has to pull it own weight (on a fully costed basis), especially those that are "supportive" rather than core to the strategy.

• I agree with you that after the corporate plan is approved, the concept of MUST, SHOULD, and MAY services needs to be re-examined. The idea of dictating <u>services</u> to chapters, rather directing their actions through <u>strategic goals and initiatives</u> seems outmoded.

- The implementation timetable for the Disaster Service Areas is an issue John needs to discuss with Terry. I'm convinced that the delay until fall FY2004 is necessary, but if John has new information that could speed things up, it should be considered. Management needs to work the issue out; I know Alan has valid cost and logistical concerns.
- The importance of diversity (in volunteer recruiting, youth, fund raising, and collaboration) is apparent from your comments. I hope Alan and Tony Polk will consider Houston as a test area for any business-building activities they plan in support of Strategic Initiatives F, G, H, & I. It would be a great place to start something new.

- Transportation money maker for the chapter. Great for PR.. "rolling bill boards."
- PR/Marketing have great/effective TV/radio commercials (award winning) donated by local Texas
  media firm. They state ok for others to copy. National must continue to be proactive and use more
  prime time media slots. Working with AFES to get "daily" stories out about military personnel.
  NHQ/chapter communications has improved since Chuck Conner has taken over. Appreciate being
  asked to advise national. Keep asking/keep listening.
- AFES very busy/overwhelming. All in chapter pitching in. Working closely with youth on care packages. Houston has largest reservist population in country.
- HIV/AIDS CDC money to NHQ has dried up. If they want to keep programming viable NHQ needs
  to be more aggressive in seeking funds from other entities. Chapter successful with local
  fundraising.
- Youth very successful youth program (much due to Directors leadership capabilities and keeping youth invested). Tries to track once kids leave for college (although also has many college RC youth programs). Stresses "volunteer for life." Face of youth have changed. Diversity important factor. Need to consider how to draw in differenct cultures. Idea for keeping youth engaged (and others) blast monthly emails.

The whole "must, should, may" concept should be reconsidered. H&S "should be elevated to a must service." Responsible for bringing in many valuable dollars. Feel like "step child."
- CFO need to do better job with targeting "minority dollars." All approaches don;t work equally for all cultures. Need help from NHQ. Houston second largest population of wealthy blacks.
- IT very concerned that Houston "not allowed" to keep track of their own volunteer data. National
  feels they need to keep all data. Concern that during power outage Houston have and can get to
  their volunteers. Tom Swaniger apparently not communicating clearly enough with chapter. Need
  for clarification of issue and resolution.
- John McDivitt Will do major RIF soon. Hurt by decreased financial support AND increased insurance costs (+55%) from National. External relations/corporate development high priority. Very proud of staff.

Over the past few months, the agenda of the American Red Cross has more than filled all of the space between the international and domestic bookends. The organization has been stretched at every level, and this at a time when donor funding decisions are more deliberate and less bountiful. The war in Iraq has added complications and new challenges as we fulfill our chartered obligations in time of international conflict and strive to maintain and strengthen our relationships with our sister societies.

Through it all, the American Red Cross has performed admirably. Marty and her management team have begun to focus on the strategic issues and are giving positive visibility to the work of the Red Cross. You have also been active – visiting disaster sites, chapters and Blood Services regions and carrying forward the work of the Board committees. I am grateful for your committed efforts.

To assist you more effectively in being able to represent the American Red Cross in an informed manner, we have realigned the support system for the Governors. Barbara Henderson, who had previously been Special Assistant to the Chairman, will now assume the duties of Manager, Board of Governors Office, and will report to Marty and me and also to Mary Elcano, General Counsel/Corporate Secretary, in order to assure coordination of Governor activities and to respond to your needs. Committee Chairs should continue to work directly with their counterparts in the organization, but I encourage other Governors to contact Barbara for any information needs that you may have and to advise her of your other activities and contacts on behalf of the Red Cross. This will enable her to keep Marty, me and others in the organization informed as appropriate, so that we may give you all of the necessary support.

On July 11, 2003, it is anticipated that the Board Office will relocate to the new building at 2025 E Street in N.W. Washington, D.C. At that time, there will be dedicated space for Governors who are visiting, and Barbara will provide you with administrative support as necessary on those occasions. In a volunteer-based organization, the role of the Governors — the ultimate volunteers — is critical to the success of the Red Cross. These moves are intended to enhance your effectiveness and to facilitate a seamless transfer of questions, opportunities, contacts, etc., from Governors to Marty and those in operations so that we respect the bright line between governance and management. Obviously, any Governor should contact Marty or me directly should they feel the need to do so at any time, just as you have done in the past.

I hope that you find this new alignment helpful – and again my appreciation for your commitment to the cause of the American Red Cross.

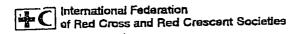

Dear Mr. Chairman,

The Governing Board of the International Federation met last week in Geneva, from 27 to 29 May. A number of substantive issues were addressed, including the report of the Finance Commission. During the discussion under that item, reference was made to the non-payment of the barême contribution from the American Red Cross during the past three years. The Board further addressed that question in an exchange of views specifically dedicated to the American Red Cross. As a result, a decision was adopted, a copy of which I am addressing to you herewith.

The text of the decision is self-explanatory, and does thus not require any further elaboration on my part. I would like to say, however, that the discussion within the Board was positive and constructive. While all members recognise the financial hardship the non-payment of the barême contribution is causing to the Secretariat, and urge for a prompt settlement, they also understand the difficulty in which the Board and Management of the American Red Cross is operating. I felt from the discussions last week that there is supportive commitment to search for a solution to the satisfaction of all parties. What the American Red Cross will be able to do for the Secretariat in terms of voluntary contributions will evidently be highly appreciated. But it was heartening to realize that there was no hostility in the debate, rather a strong sense of solidarity within the International Federation.

The Governing Board,

#### 5.6 American Red Cross

having taken note of the recommendations of the Finance Commission (doc. GB/5/1) concerning the non-payment by the American Red Cross of its annual statutory contributions to the Federation;

recalling and confirming its decisions on this matter since 2000;

recalling that the American Red Cross has stated that it will not pay its annual statutory contribution to the Federation until Magen David Adom (MDA) of Israel is admitted as a full member of the Federation;

reminded the American Red Cross that under the current statutes of the Movement it is not within the power of the Federation Governing Board nor of the General Assembly to admit MDA to the Federation, with its current emblem;

recalled that a proposal to resolve this issue through the adoption of a third protocol to the Geneva Conventions has been developed by the ICRC and the Federation for adoption by a diplomatic conference of states party to the Geneva Conventions, and welcomes the fact that the American Red Cross supports this approach;

reminded the American Red Cross of the membership duty it has under the Federation's Constitution to remit an annual contribution to the statutory budget of the Federation;

welcomed and encouraged the continuing contributions of the American Red Cross to the funding of Federation programmes as well as their direct contributions to National Societies, and reminded the American Red Cross that programme funding, while highly valuable, can not be used to fund core structures and activities and that the American Red Cross statutory contribution is 25% of the total annual statutory income of the Federation;

highlighted to the American Red Cross that the non-payment of its statutory contribution constitutes non-compliance with the Federation Constitution and has

already resulted in cutbacks and hardships which have caused serious harm to the Federation's ability to carry out its mission;

therefore, in the interests of unity and universality of the Movement, strongly called on the American Red Cross to pay, in the immediate future, its annual membership dues owing since 2000 which, including the arrears to date, amount to CHF 30.6 million;

hoped that, based on the spirit and philosophy of the Red Cross and Red Crescent which the American Red Cross shares, and of the humanitarian sentiments of its members, that the American Red Cross makes every effort to avoid a fracture within a humanitarian organisation which so greatly benefits humanity and which represents such hope for improving the dignity of millions of human beings.

I wanted to acknowledge with appreciation your good letter of 10 June 2003 concerning matters discussed by the Governing Board at their meeting last month. We are grateful for your support of the principled position of The American Red Cross with regard to the admission of Magen David Adom to the Federation even though we know that this has financial implications for the Federation.

The Board of Governors of the American Red Cross takes exception to some of the provisions of resolutions expressed in the "Decision Sheet" which you enclosed with your letter. As I advised you earlier, we stand by our decision to withhold Bareme payments until the Federation honors the principals of the Movement regarding Universality and Neutrality and admits Magen David Adom to the Federation. In doing so, we are mindful that the American Red Cross does not want to diminish in any way the important humanitarian services provided by the Federation or its members and on that basis, our Board has elected to withhold only two years of escrowed Bareme payments and to expend the balance of the funds for international humanitarian purposes. Those purposes will be identified in collaboration with the Federation to assure, insofar as possible, that we are supporting the regional priorities of the Federation.

At this critical time in the future mission of the Federation, the American Red Cross wishes to play a constructive role. We understand the difficulties of the Federation's financial situation – it is a common problem here and in other societies. We desire to be a positive partner in fulfilling the worthy mission of the Federation and the ICRC, but we are not prepared to

By the time most of us learned about yesterday's massive power outage in Canada and the northeastern and central United States, the American Red Cross had already swung into action. In New York City, as thousands of people poured out of buildings and subway stations as they tried to make their way home in the sweltering August heat, the American Red Cross in Greater New York handed out bottled water and flyers on heat exhaustion. Red Cross volunteers were deployed to Penn Station, Grand Central Station, Port Authority, the George Washington Bridge Bus Terminal, the Brooklyn Bridge, the Flatbush and Jamaica subway stations in Brooklyn, and LaGuardia and JFK airports to help people cope with the sudden loss of civilization's amenities. In New City alone, more than 225,000 people received bottled water from Red Cross volunteers.

The Red Cross performed similar services in Connecticut, New Jersey, Ohio, Pennsylvania, and Michigan. Local chapters dispatched Emergency Response Vehicles, set up Emergency Aid Stations, and opened shelters and reception centers for people seeking a break from the heat. As state after state activated their Emergency Response Plans, Red Cross workers were called upon to staff Emergency Operations Centers through the night. In all affected areas, Mental Health Services volunteers acted swiftly to allay the stress of the situation. In Washington, D.C., the Red Cross was represented at the Department of Homeland Security's operations center, and, at national headquarters, the Disaster Operations Center was activated to support local unit activities. Additionally, a national news release was issued, stressing the importance of preparedness.

To support Red Cross relief, our corporate partners (including Sears, Kmart, Home Depot, and Nextel) have offered their assistance, and Culligan is supplying thousands of bottles of water. We are continuing to solicit targeted businesses.

Not surprisingly, Red Cross efforts attracted national media attention. Don Stephens, an experienced disaster responder, appeared on "Good Morning America" and MSNBC, succinctly summarizing the Red Cross in addition to offering practical suggestions in line with our Together

We Prepare initiative. Don is scheduled to appear on CNN later today. "Good Morning America" also aired a segment featuring a woman and baby from Atlanta who, after arrival by bus to New York last night, wept while saying that "nobody helped her except the Red Cross." CNN Headline News broadcast a live segment in front of a Red Cross comfort station, located outside Penn Station, and NBC's "Today" interviewed the mayor of Cleveland, who praised Red Cross services to stranded travelers.

Several chapters have reported leveraging these power outages to share the Red Cross preparedness message via their own local radio and TV stations – even in non-affected markets – and we continue to urge all chapters to use this opportunity to educate their communities about the importance of preparedness. All national media interviews are focusing on the practical steps outlined by our *Together We Prepare* campaign, and we have posted resources for the chapters and the public on CrossNet and Redcross.org (http://www.redcross.org/news/ds/misc/030814blackout.html).

As is our history, this sudden and unforeseen event brought out the best from our local units and highlighted the importance of our efforts to prepare our nation for the unexpected. We so often hear about what went wrong or about the actions that the Board took to prepare for the future that were unpopular – the negatives that are inevitable in an organization of our size and with the scope of our charter. I thought it might be a fitting way to conclude the year by recognizing just a few of the positive contributions among many that we should celebrate.

- We responded to everything from the explosion of an imaginary "dirty bomb" in the five-day TOPOFF 2 exercise to the all-too-real explosion of the Space Shuttle Columbia.
- We focused on disaster victims and took steps to more effectively deliver services, from toll-free call centers to client assistance cards.
- We responded to disasters from coast to coast, from Hurricane Isabel and her associated power outages on the east coast to the California fires on the west coast.

Subject: XVII Inte-American Conference, Santiago, Chile, April 23-26, 2003

I recently returned from the XVII Inter-American Conference of the Red Cross of the Americas held in Santiago, Chile. Upon returning from that wonderful experience, I want to share with you some thoughts and observations which further support the fundamental involvement of the American Red Cross in International Services.

The two major themes of the conference were the Red Cross Initiative to increase health equity and strengthen the capacity of local societies in the Americas. The goal is to reduce risk and improving coordination towards an integral disaster-management system in the Americas. At the opening of the conference we heard presentations by the National President of the Chilean Red Cross, President of the InterAmerica Regional Committee, Vice President of the International Committee of the Red Cross, President of the Standing Commission of the Red Cross and Red Crescent (Princess Margriet), President of the International Federation of the Red Cross and Red Crescent Societies and President of the Republic of Chile. On subsequent days we heard presentations by representatives of the Federation, various Red Cross Societies throughout the Americas on their particular programs and efforts and reports from some other societies such as the German Red Cross which is involved in building homes and communities in the Americas following disasters.

There were several main themes that seemed to evolve around the fact that there is a great deal of assistance needed through the Americas for those who are vulnerable and that the most effective way to address the need is through a solidarity of human respect and continuing efforts to keep up the cooperative network that exists amongst the Red Cross and Red Crescent. Initial emphasizes was that we are a global society and that all Red Cross/Red Crescent Societies must have an interest in personal dignity and humanitarian aid outside of their own countries. One of the speakers commented about an old Chinese proverb that says that we are all "born naked, wet and hungry and then it gets worse". The emphasizes is that we must break this old Chinese proverb for all people. Jacques Forster from the ICRC emphasized that much of the war-like conflict taking place throughout the world is causing significant economic and social problems. All of this has significantly increased the need for humanitarian relief. He also cited examples where the gap between rich and poor challenges the stability in countries. In addition, he emphasized that humanitarian law in this environment is extremely important because it establishes the basic values that must persist. Princess Margriet of the Netherlands, who is the Chair of the Standing Committee, emphasized the importance of building cooperation between Red Cross/Red Crescent Societies and Geneva. She emphasized that if Geneva loses touch with the movement in the field, it will not be successful. She also emphasized that while poverty is expected to grow, so also are the poor hard hit in the face of disasters or conflict. We must all remember that we are a global movement and as a movement we are stronger working together. A few of her words which I was most struck by were really a challenge to all in the Red Cross movement. She stated "our movement must be much greater, bolder and more significant - we have to stand and move as a movement - our work is about people and about humanitarian action - let's make our action bolder than words". I would submit that based on the International Services Committees' renewed focus since our meeting last Fall we are on the right track and should continue this focus and effort.

The President of Federation of Red Cross/Red Crescent Societies, Mr. Juan Manuel Deltoro, emphasized that we are all united by our diversity with a common focus on humanitarian values. The world now needs the Red Cross fundamental principles more than ever. We must focus on improving sanitary conditions, address HIV Aids, and reduce illness throughout the world. In addition, we should demonstrate how the Red Cross Movement can work with the ministries of health. We can do this by working in partnership with other Red Cross Societies to assist vulnerable communities. We must protect human worthiness as it is the essence of the International Conference and Red Cross. We should strive to create a cultural of tolerance and peace which will result in a better and more just world.

On the following day we heard from Didier Cherpitel, the Secretary General of the Federation of the Red Cross/Red Crescent Societies. He focused on Strategy 2010 and emphasized several objectives that all Red Cross/Red Crescent



Societies should be focused upon and that the Federation will be working toward. They involve the following:

- 1. Strengthening National Societies through money, people and lessons learned. We need to help develop resources, increase the fund raising for International Services in each country. As part of this, each Red Cross Society must better fit with the culture and diversity of their countries.
- 2. Coordination, cooperation and partnerships must be further developed between Red Cross/Red Crescent Societies. There must be an ever present focus upon youth involvement.
- 3. Representation and advocacy increase the presence and profile of the Federation and Red Cross Societies in the respective regions. We must also develop advocacy in communication campaigns.

The challenges ahead that he emphasized are:

- 1. Human resources emphasize that all national Societies must strengthen their staff and volunteer base and continue using talents and resources in their Region.
- 2. Advocacy communication and external relations. The National Societies should develop liaisons with a more regional focus. In addition, the Federation should develop a stronger advocacy representation in communication.
- 3. Sustainability National Societies must become self-sufficient in order to create a strong and effective Federation that meets the challenging needs of all communities.

As far as the role for National Societies, he emphasized several points:

- 1. The development of strategy 2010.
- 2. Must be active involvement in the National Societies in developing cooperative assistance strategies to ensure that the Societies meet their priorities.
- 3. There must be full engagement in the process to ensure effective coordination between National Societies.
- 4. Make the success of change in the Americas a collective achievement to share with the rest of the Red Cross Movement and demonstrate our commitment and our passion to serve the vulnerable for this is our duty.

There was also a lot of discussion about the fact that all societies are dependent on each other in reaching the needs of vulnerable people throughout the world and the Movement's focus should be to be stronger together in reaching vulnerable people with effective humanitarian action. Throughout the remainder of the second day and in to the third day, the presentations dealt with examples of how the various societies are implementing these strategies and discussion and examples of the vulnerability of people throughout the world and particularly in the Americas. In all of this, it was made clear that poverty, discrimination, social and political issues and exclusion are the factors that contribute to vulnerability. The poorest are the most exposed to disasters and this causes bigger demand and preparation. We need to work on risk management. Our challenge will be to demonstrate to our governments and others within our countries that the investment in community preparedness can reduce the risk. We must link up with other partners both public and civil to accomplish these goals.

We also received an update on the Iraq situation from Jacques Forster. Mr. Forster emphasized that the ICRC had significant presence in Iraq since the Gulf War and that they had a key understanding in the country about various issues and had wide experience and knowledge and health services. He stated that there has been close cooperation with the ICRC and the Federation around communications, coordination, mobilization and safety issues. As far as achievements, he indicated that there had been really good focus on International humanitarian law, they were able to access the POW's held by the coalition, provided assistance to families establishing links with other family members and they successfully acted as a neutral intermediary with hospitals and water supply.

The difficulties in the Iraq situation were:

- A difficult environment, limited staff and safety issues.
- Lack and inability to have access to POW's held by Iraq.
- 3. The Delegation had to establish clear priorities and could not do assistance for all. Some of the assistance areas that could not be met were (a) diplomats stranded; (b) deaths of reporters; (c) message transmission for individuals (d) Iraq citizen requests; and (e) security constraints.

He did note that the Senior Management of the Red Crescent Society in Iraq is all but gone and that they were working in the various community remnants of the Society. As for his perspective on the future, he did indicate that during the time we were at the Conference that 22 national societies had met in Geneva, developed a coordinate plan to assist with humanitarian relief in Iraq. The key points were:

- 1. Security is high on the agenda. There is a high potential for violence.
- 2. Convoys of relief goods to the country were in process and already convoys to Basra and the North were being deployed.
  - 3. Experts in water sanitation were working in the country.
  - 4. Various independent humanitarian activities were ongoing.
  - 5. Importance and urgency of establishing the Red Crescent in Iraq.
- 6. Importance that the ICRC must act in an independent way even to the point of no armed escorts or military logistics involved.

While this creates some challenges, he indicated that it is very important that they be seen as totally independent in Iraq.

Based upon the above, you can see that challenges are ahead and there are great opportunities for the American Red Cross through its International Services to be a leader and make a difference for those less fortunate throughout the world. It further emphasizes our need to do fundraisings for International Services so we continue to be a leader in humanitarian relief and partner with other societies.

David, thanks for asking for my feedback on the Atlanta Town Hall Meeting.

I didn't attend the LA or St. Louis meetings so I can't judge the relative negativity in Atlanta but would assume it was the most negative of the three. Based on my Minnesota chapter visits, conversations with some of my BoG colleagues and the Atlanta meeting I feel we have a "10% problem" (my guesstimate nothing scientific). Of the "10%" who are protesting I believe over half of them could be on board if someone (BoG or staff) would spend some time with them to clear up the misconceptions. The remainder may continue their resistance to change. I feel we need to spend time with them also but not necessarily expect buy-in.

Relative to Atlanta I was disappointed that some folks seemed to base their comments on opinions they had coming into the meeting - without factoring in the information Marty, Terry, Mary and you presented. Again let's continue to talk to them. I also thought that you as presenters did a good job of listening.

BoG made the policy decision. I think we could be effective in talking to the chapter board chairs. Your message was great. It was more expansive than my message in my earlier chapter visits. Since most BoG members have served in local board roles we have credibility with the chapter boards. The point is one Red Cross with consistent service delivery and accountability. The chapter boards have the same responsibilities as before but what's different is "providing the service area executive with shared oversight and advice". We can sell that in most cases.

I have several specific communication suggestions:

- Define the relationship between the chapter boards and BoG. Is there any formal or informal liaison role?
- Emphasize that performance standards will be the measure of chapters.
- End the concern about disenfranchisement of chapter board members. It has not happened. You said it - the chapter boards are still governing boards. (This is similar to what I heard from the blood boards last year when they went to advisory. We defused the disenfranchisement issue there.)
- More explicitly define the interaction be between the chapter boards and the service area

executive.

Thanks the feedback opportunity. Let me know how I can help.

As you know, in May the American Red Cross launched the largest blood donation initiative in its history, the Save A Life Tour. This campaign was designed to dramatically raise public awareness about the need for increased, regular blood donations, as well as to support Red Cross collections objectives across the United States. We have garnered unprecedented exposure in the media, including print, TV, and radio, securing 435 million impressions within the first three months of this sixmonth endeavor. 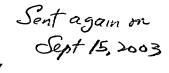

# Key Messages and Suggested Talking Points for Federation Foundation Board Meeting – 11/29/03

- The American Red Cross is supportive of 'Health and Community Care Programs' as the overall theme for the Foundation Board's funding priorities. Focusing on such devastating and widespread health issues as HIV/AIDS, TB, measles and malaria provides the International Federation with an opportunity to present its work in these areas as global in scope and impact while allowing donors to respond at either a global, regional or country-specific level. For this reason, we believe it would be preferable for the FFB to prepare program profiles in each of the five areas proposed (HIV/AIDS, measles/water and sanitation, malaria, TB and First Aid) which represent the global RC/RC approach, allowing donors the option to focus their giving. As currently presented, the programs are largely regional in scope and neglect both the Americas and the Middle East.
- Leveraging the strength of the RC/RC Movement to achieve global impact in areas of mutual interest and benefit to the Federation and its National Societies will be attractive to donors with global presence and interests.
- Funding priorities chosen for the FFB to represent must be seen as mutually beneficial to both
  the Federation and National Societies represented on the FFB. The American Red Cross
  prefers an 'open cooperation' model which ensures the <u>opportunity</u> for the NS to participate
  as a partner in the service delivery of the program funded by a donor in their country (if the
  NS has both capacity and interest to implement).
- FFB members fundraising efforts will focus on the agreed upon program areas and *not* on Federation Secretariat funding needs or operating costs of the FFB.
- The American Red Cross agrees at this time to review the proposed draft 'program profiles'
  developed by the Federation with its operational staff to gauge the potential for U.S. donor
  interest and ARC programmatic strategic interests. We will provide our feedback as soon as
  possible.

### Donor Relationship Management Program for Federation Foundation Fundraising

In a world where companies are becoming more and more global in their make-up and their philanthropic interests, we must respond to these needs. By developing a common, unified fundraising approach for approved and agreed upon strategic program areas, the Red Cross/Red Crescent Movement can be the leader in securing philanthropic support for humanitarian efforts.

The proposed Red Cross/Red Crescent donor relationship management process is designed to meet the needs of our donors and maximize the financial support from major donors to support the priorities of National Societies in alignment with agreed upon sectoral program areas. Our intent is to create a helpful system across the Movement that provides value and resources as strategies are designed and implemented. Our work will start with "top" prospects which can provide the greatest financial support. The goals are to:

- Not leave money on the table create strategic asks that are appropriate to the donor's capacity, interests and propensity
- Provide a "one Red Cross/Red Crescent" menu of opportunities to donors

- Grow strong relationships that bring in over time regular high level financial support
- Not be bureaucratic, rather provide a smooth process that is donor focused
- Create a system that has accountability for participation

Key to the success of this process is a well defined strategy and implementation plan. There are six major steps to the donor relationship management process. These include: 1) pre-qualification of donors; 2) selection of donors for inclusion; 3) assignment of donors and participants in the process; 4) donor strategy development; 5) strategy implementation and 6) donor recognition.

The National Society where the headquarters or individual donor's primary residence is located will serve as the lead with that prospect.

The National Society convenes the Relationship Management Team from among the stakeholders to determine who will play the donor relationship manager role and primary/secondary contact roles.

Additionally, the team will perform the following functions:

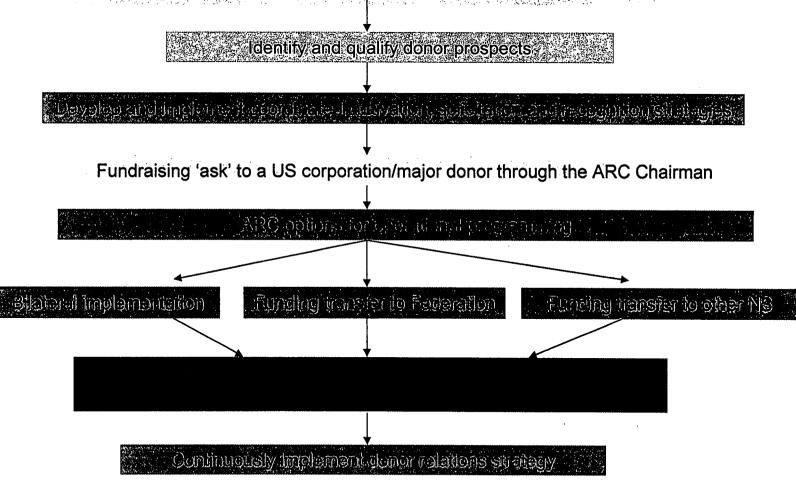

- Quarterly Review of prospect activity and strategy

# WE ARE YOUR LOCAL RED CROSS

To the Editor:

In their Nov. 13 letter ("Not One of Kenyon's Best Efforts"), Gene and Sandy Nelson described the American Red Cross as a national organization "headquartered in Washington, D.C." They implied that the Red Cross, like so many charities, lacked a "local presence." This couldn't be further from the truth

The Red Cross, represented locally by the Central Vermont/New Hampshire Valley Chapter, is a grass-roots. local organization. The volunteers who serve on its board of directors are your neighbors and friends. Those who respond in the middle of the night to single-family house ·fires and provide help and comfort to the victims live just down the street. The lifeguards and water-safety instructors trained by the local chapter attend a local high school or college. The men and women who organize and support the local blood drives stand in line with you at the supermarket.

The Red Cross is here in the Upper Valley.

More than 800 volunteers in Vermont and New Hampshire are dedicated to delivering vital Red Cross services throughout the region. There is no charge for Red Cross services to the victims of a disaster, whether it is a devastating local flood or the loss of a single-family home to a mid-winter fire.

The federal government chartered the Red Cross to organize disaster-relief efforts and support military personnel and their families in times of war. Over the years this mission has grown to encompass a broad range of safety- and preparedness-related programs. But, as is the case with many such mandates, the government provides no federal funds to support our mission. We are able to execute our humanitarian responsibilities here and across the country thanks to the efforts of our hometown volunteers and the generous financial support of the local community.

We are your Red Cross, and we ask you to join us and your neighbors in this local effort to provide life-saving services to our community.

Dear Didier,

I was pleased that we had an opportunity for a frank exchange of views when I was in Geneva and appreciate your working this into your schedule. As we agreed it would be useful for both of us to have confirming memoranda of various discussions between our organizations to avoid unintended misunderstandings, I decided to forward my thoughts on our meeting.

It is my understanding from your comments that you were "disappointed" in the American Red Cross over the fact that the released escrow funds from the Bareme were not forthcoming to you before the end of your fiscal year and that they were not dedicated in a way that was budget relieving for you. I also understood that you felt that the American Red Cross had made a commitment in London to contribute on a voluntary basis to assist in your financial difficulties. You indicated that this lack of support from us might put in jeopardy some of our joint programs.

While we can understand your frustration, we were surprised by your statement. Our position on the bareme and MDA has been known to you and the Federation for some time. We cannot subvert Board policy and our commitment to our public in the United States by budget reallocations that blur the lines.

Additionally, our decision to hold two years of bareme payments and release for international humanitarian purposes the balance was communicated to you and President Juan Manuel Suarez del Toro on July 22 and was acknowledged by your President with appreciation. It was never our intent that the release of these funds would be substituted in your budget for purposes previously covered by the bareme, but we did indicate that we would work closely with the Federation in the allocation of these funds.

We did not make a commitment to a level of voluntary payments in London, nor do we recall any individual society pledging a specific amount at those meetings.

Subsequently, the American Red Cross has released some \$2.4 million of our funds of which I understand \$700,000 has been dedicated to offset core costs in the Americas and Africa. Of the remaining \$1,7 million, I understand that \$1.2 million is in the process of being transferred to support joint programs in these two regions, focused on health and national society capacity building.

Policy in the American Red Cross is set by the Board of Governors, its Chairman, and by the President. I indicated that we take exception to approaches by you and your staff to various individuals in the American Red Cross in which assertions are made as to our commitments, with the hope that you will get answers that are favorable to your position. If you want to argue for a change in policy, it should be addressed to Marty or by President del Toro to me.

I indicated that the timing of the recommendation from the Federation Finance Commission, of which you presumably were aware, can be potentially harmful to the entire Movement and the improvements in our relationship that we have all worked so hard to achieve in the past 18 months. We know that you have financial pressures, but we do not believe that the American Red Cross is the sole cause of them and take exception to your seeming to shift the focus of those problems to us rather than to fiscal management and realistic revenue projections on the part of the Federation.

I also feel it is important to take exception to your suggestion that the independent actions of the American Red Cross might, for some, be comparable to the United States unilateral action in Iraq. This strikes me as an unworthy observation and contrary to the Fundamental Principles of the Movement to which we subscribe.

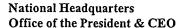

Per your invitation, I would like to offer management's thoughts regarding the next steps for the Fundraising Task Force and the report presented by Jerry Panas. I believe that the review was useful and can prompt important action on key initiatives needed to take Red Cross fundraising to the next level. After discussions with Kathleen Loehr and other members of my leadership team, we identified several overall themes from the study that will benefit the American Red Cross.

- Board ownership. Leadership is always critical in implementing successful change, and we are suggesting fairly important changes for our "one red cross" fundraising. We agree with Jerry's recommendation that the Task Force (or its successor) help lead this process, as it sends a very strong message across the organization. Together we will have to make hard and courageous decisions for the good of the organization as we design new ways of doing collaborative fundraising, and your leadership will be critical.
- Leadership engagement. We have already seen the increased dollars and relationships at national headquarters through the engagement of the Board and senior leaders. I agree that we must now make fundraising a key ingredient for CEOs and volunteer leaders in the Service Areas and chapters. Fundraising led by leaders and volunteers is always much more powerful than that led by staff. This recommendation will require much cultural change and training, but the results will be well worth it.
- Chapter fundraising. We must continue to build collaborative fundraising relationships across the organization. Because the strength of our chapters is so critical to our overall ability to serve the nation, we agree with Jerry's view that we should incorporate ways to improve the fundraising power and potential of our chapter network. Programs like direct mail and on-line fundraising can be standardized to generate economies and better results, as shown with chapters that national headquarters currently supports. We agree that we should move forward with a deliberate pace to create a shared donor database to better leverage our resources and align national and local fundraising efforts.
- New programs. Several ideas were presented by Jerry that deserve additional evaluation. New programs such as a legacy society would complement the new focus on individual major gifts. New initiatives can build on programs in development such as the Chairman's Cabinet and Project RED. We should catalog these new program ideas from his report and determine which to implement and the appropriate timing for each.

While the report has some important themes, several areas were lacking. For example, the report does not articulate how the national headquarters Development department compares with its peers in the area of non-episodic fundraising. While I know that it is difficult to find exact benchmarking partners, the report was devoid of any meaningful metrics or comparisons.

The report also did not provide many details behind the recommendations. Many of these are simple observations with no insight on how to move forward. For example, recommendation 103 to change the staff reporting structure only focused on rearranging reporting relationships and creating a new unit. Details behind the structure such as appropriate staffing levels, primary mission of the units and other important aspects were lacking. Another example is recommendation 36 that observes donor relations processes are cumbersome – the report only suggests to "keep the steps as streamlined as possible."

Another concern focuses on the lack of data and lack of sources for data that was provided. Data sources were not provided for the few graphs or tables in the report. It appears that the basis for the preponderance of his findings are strictly interviews he conducted, rather than a rigorous analysis of our processes and results as outlined in his proposal. Mr. Panas presented a Resource Evaluation to Achieve Potential (REAP) process in his proposal, specifically stating:

"We conduct a complete inventory of the Red Cross' fundraising work and assess every possible major factor of your work. But of greater importance, we determine what your full potential should be."

"We identify where you are and indicate where you should be. And develop a strategy for how to get there. There is a concentrated focus on developing a strategy for increasing your philanthropic production year after year after year."

"We review and evaluate forty-three specific areas. These cover virtually every detail and mechanic of your fundraising program."

"In a careful analysis, I review how you can most effectively use staff time for optimum results. We determine what type of staffing is required for your annual fundraising and for the proposed growth. We provide you with a template for determining necessary and realistic individual staff objectives and show how to monitor status and progress."

I believe the final report did not live up to these commitments.

We understand there is awareness of the study and great interest in its results at headquarters as well as among chapters. I recommend that the Task Force issue a communication to the organization that provides an overview of the report and outlines next steps. We would be happy to help prepare such a message if desired.

We are excited to build on the momentum the study has generated. We agree with Jerry's observation that we have never had such good alignment of the key ingredients to achieve our full fundraising potential. We look forward to working with you and your colleagues as we embark on a reenergized fundraising effort for the entire American Red Cross.

Message to the Board of Governors from Fundraising Task Force Co-Chairs Elaine Lyerly and Bruce LaBoon:

During our meeting in San Francisco in May 2005, the Board of Governors approved a Resolution to form a Fundraising Task Force to benchmark realistic expectations and goals focusing on sustainable non-episodic fundraising in the competitive environment of other non-profit organizations. The Resolution further provided that expenses for any external consulting services to the Task Force were to be funded by individual members of the Board.

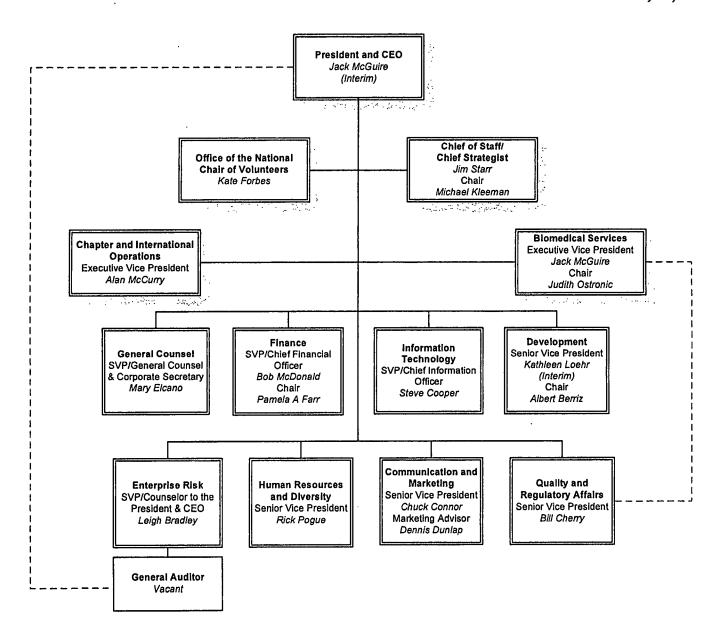
The Task Force members decided that an external consultant was required to benchmark the fundraising strategies and to identify the best practices of other non-profit organizations. After sending out a Request for Proposal in early June, the Task Force interviewed four consulting firms. Based on those interviews, the Task Force narrowed its selection to two firms and met a second time for additional presentations and interviews.

The Task Force unanimously selected the firm of Jerold Panas, Linzy and Partners to undertake this important work. All of the Task Force members were extremely impressed with the reputation and skill of this firm. The Panas firm agreed to conduct the study for \$51,000 plus capped expenses not to exceed \$5,000, for a total of \$56,000.

Under the terms of the contract, the Board is obligated to pay one-third of the fee at this time, with the second and third installments due in September and October 2005, respectively. That is why we are now writing to you to request your participation in paying for this very significant consulting contract. Please contact us no later than August 3rd, to let us know whether you are able to assist the Board in underwriting this expense. All of your payments should be made to the American Red Cross so that you may, appropriately, treat your contribution as a tax deductible expense.

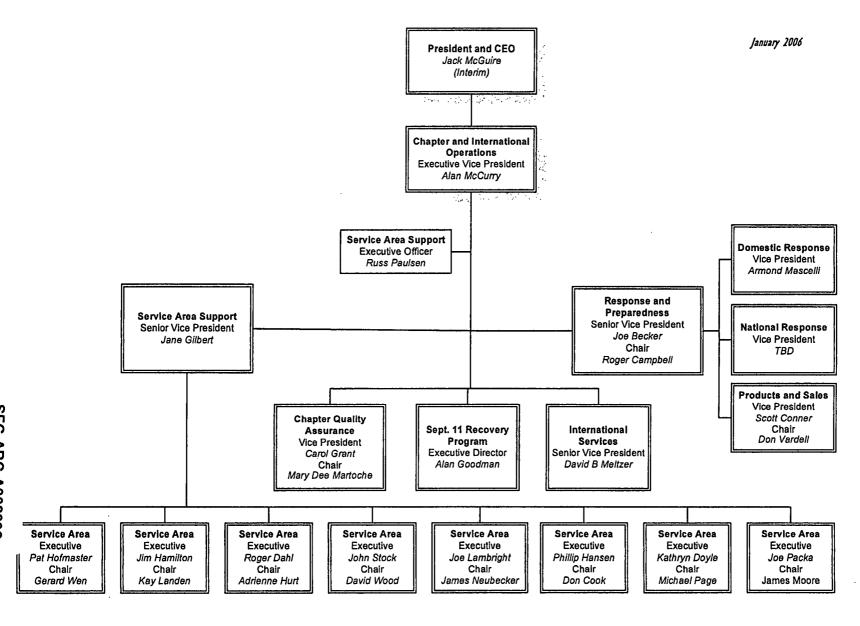

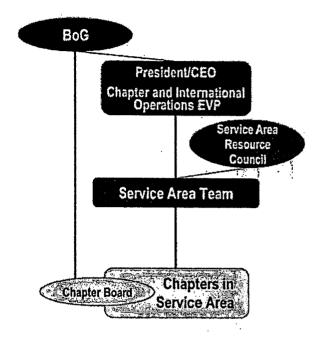

### DIAGRAM OF THE SERVICE AREA STRUCTURE

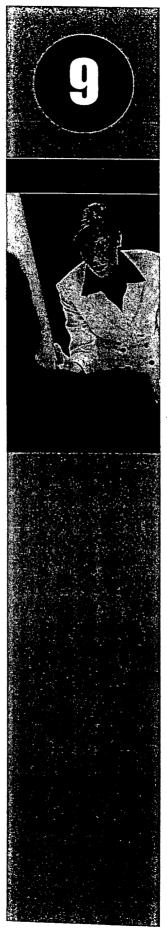

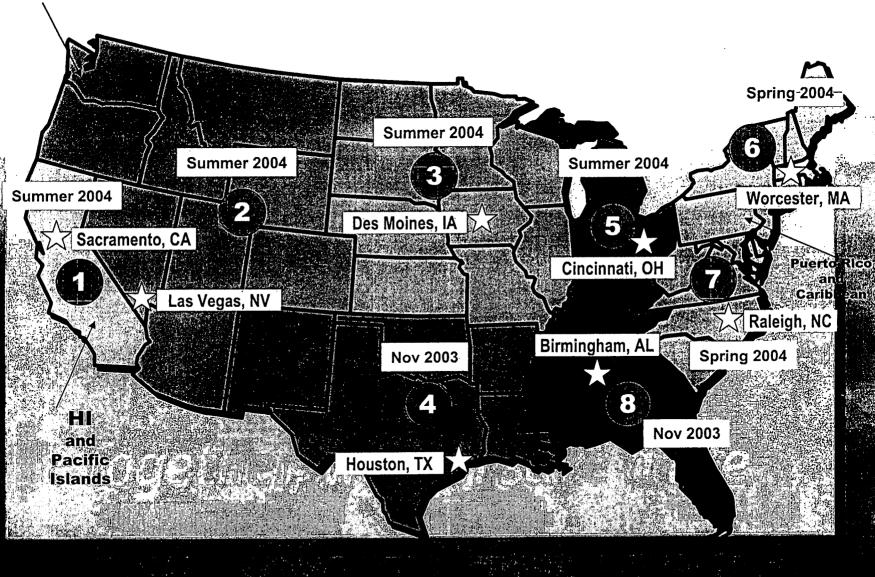

Carol Ann - In response to your inquiries, I'd like to share the following:

#### 1. Fundraising for International Services

Subsequent to the BoG Retreat in September, the International Services and Financial Development Departments have been meeting each week to discuss ways to realize opportunities for increased fundraising for that line of service. The two departments have agreed to increase the level of human resources available for international fundraising efforts. Resources to support this structure will come from available International Services Department funds (up to \$1.2 million).

#### 2. Fundraising Criteria for International Services

The International Services Business Plan FY 2003 cites six strategic priorities totaling \$41.5 million. These priorities, which have been shared with Development, include: International Response Fund (\$16.5 million), Measles Initiative Africa (\$11 million), Integrated Management of Childhood Illnesses (IMCI) (\$1.8 million), HIV/AIDS (\$3 million), Africa Women's Initiative (1.0 million) and Regional Sector Priorities (\$8.2 million).

#### 3. Magen David Adom and the Bareme Payments

#### a. MDA Status Update

Progress regarding admission of Magen David Adom (MDA) into the Movement proceeds very slowly due to the ongoing conflict in the region. It is impossible at this time to predict a resolution of the problem.

Following the statutory meetings in November, 2001, the Movement's Standing Commission named ten national societies to an Emblem Working Group charged with making progress on this issue. It is this Working Group that is now the focus of Movement efforts to resolve this situation. This Working Group, on which Gerry Jones

represents the American Red Cross, has adopted a two track process: track one is meant to encourage states to convene a diplomatic conference as soon as feasible; track two is a pragmatic attempt in the interim, to normalize Movement relations with MDA. At its October 3<sup>rd</sup> meeting, this Working Group met with representatives of MDA to discuss their statutes, structure and operations. MDA made a good presentation which was received in a cordial, collegial and encouraging manner. No major objections were raised.

#### b. 'Grandfathering'

The "grandfathering" of MDA into the Movement did not gain acceptance. It is the Standing Commission's Working Group with its two track process that is the focus of efforts. As stated, the crisis in the Middle East makes a quick solution unlikely.

#### c. Bareme payments

As directed, the International Services' VP, Gerry Jones has been discussing potential humanitarian uses of excess bareme money with colleagues at the Federation. Likely areas of utilization and collaboration include health programming, emergency response and national society capacity building. This decision to utilize these funds has been welcomed by both the President and Secretary General of the Federation, though the Secretary General cautions that this does not necessarily lessen our outstanding bareme liability.

#### 4. Federation Governing Board

Over the past six months several national societies and well-placed members of the Secretariat have informally mentioned the possibility of the American Red Cross seeking a seat on the Governing Board in fall 2005. American Red Cross presence on the Governing Board could be useful and this is something we must consider.

We recently learned that CBS Evening News reporter Sharyl Attkisson is producing another story about the Red Cross, concentrating specifically on Blood Services and our relationship with the Food and Drug Administration (FDA). She is also interested in transfusion associated risk factors for HIV, HCV and other blood-borne diseases for which we test. Her story is expected to run as early as this week.

We responded to the questions regarding transfusion associated risk factors and believe we have a good story to tell. In accordance with our ongoing position/strategy, we did not respond to issues related to our pending litigation.

Attached you will find talking points for your review and use in providing factual information and allaying any fears and concerns resulting from this story. We also provided a taped statement regarding blood safety from Ramesh Thadani, Executive Vice President and CEO of Biomedical Services.

As I said recently, the Red Cross shares a common goal with the FDA – to save and enhance lives through providing the safest possible products to patients – and we continue to work toward resolution with the agency. We plan to aggressively work with our paid and volunteer staff and donors, sponsors, hospital customers and communities at large to educate the public about the safety enhancements Red Cross has made to date and our commitment to working with the FDA to resolve issues and further enhance blood safety and availability.

After several months of review and reconstruction of the chapter's financial records, especially related to Liberty Fund donations and transactions, it was determined that, in fact, approximately \$ 199,000 had not been remitted. However, the chapter had remitted in excess of \$1.2 million to the Liberty Fund.

On Tuesday, September 17, a Mountain Pacific Regional team and representatives from the Office of the General Counsel and Audit Services met with paid and volunteer leadership of the Fresno-Madera Chapter in Fresno, California. The regional team advised the chapter board's Executive Committee that upon careful review, the chapter had an additional liability to the Liberty Fund of approximately \$199,000, which included allowable expenses estimated at approximately \$79,000. At no time has there been any indication that Liberty Funds were diverted for any personal gain or purposefully diverted to the chapter. Rather, the audit process revealed that the chapter had not followed guidance from financial management on designating donations that lacked clear donor intent and on maintaining documentation to support donor intent. Based upon this and other management issues, the region requested that the Board remove the executive director of the Chapter. The Fresno-Madera Executive Committee contacted Regional Operations, Chapter Services Network, and the Office of the President and CEO to ascertain national headquarters' support of the regional team's position. National headquarters' total support and endorsement of the region's position was communicated to the Executive Committee members.

Following the meeting with the Executive Committee, the regional team met with the full board of the chapter to inform them of their Liberty Fund liability and request management action. The chapter board advised the team that the executive director had, subsequent to dialogue with Executive Committee members, decided to submit her resignation, effective immediately. The chapter and the region accepted her resignation and an experienced interim chapter manager, Ed Webb, is now in place to provide necessary staff leadership and guidance to board and staff. The chapter board offered the executive director a modest separation package and she executed a separation agreement and release. Pursuant to the agreement, both parties agreed to keep the terms of the separation agreement confidential. Further, both parties agreed upon a press release regarding the executive director's resignation and agreed not to make any statements inconsistent with the contents of the press release to any member of the public or the press who made inquiries about her resignation.

The chapter remitted the outstanding amount due to the Liberty Fund on September 18, 2002. There was some initial local media coverage of the situation as it pertained to the resignation of the executive director and the Liberty Fund audit results.

It is with a sense of deep regret that I announce Harold Decker's decision to leave the American Red Cross. We owe a debt of gratitude for his exceptional service to this organization during a time of crisis and intense scrutiny.

Harold's talents became evident very quickly after he arrived at the Red Cross in February of 2001 following a successful career in the pharmaceutical industry. Hired as the Associate General Counsel, Harold immediately went to work rebuilding the legal staff and restructuring responsibilities within the office of the General Counsel. Throughout this process, Harold's first priority was determining how to best serve the needs of the chapters and insuring that the General Counsel's office added value to the needs and requirements of our field structure.

Within a matter of months, Harold was elevated to Corporate Secretary and General Counsel of the Red Cross. Very shortly thereafter, the Board of Governors asked Harold to assume the duties of Interim President and CEO. This request, made after the unexpected departure of his predecessor, was a clear reflection of the Board's confidence in his capacity to provide inspiration and leadership in those difficult days. Harold's courage in accepting this position, and the leadership that followed, guided this organization through the turmoil of the post 9-11 response. Through press conferences, dozens of media appearances, and outreach to members of Congress and government, Harold worked tirelessly to regain the public's trust in our organization. He provided stability within the Red Cross when the organization needed it most.

At a moment like this it is not sufficient to list Harold's significant accomplishments- there is much more to his tenure. I believe the most significant term we can use is "legacy." If any one of us can come to an organization and leave a legacy for others to follow, then we will have served in the most profound way. Harold Decker leaves a significant legacy, one that is deeply etched in the long history of this proud organization. We will all miss him and are deeply grateful for his service to the American Red Cross and the nation. Subject: Murphy's Law and Clem Malin

You may or may not recall that I am a member of the board of our Montclair-Glen Ridge-Nutley Chapter.

Many weeks ago, in response to your request for nominees for national service, and in response to e-mail forwarded by Gerard Wen, I began to talk to some people in the pharmaceutical industry (where I did quite a bit of recruiting and from where some earlier Red Cross leaders had come). In addition, while at homecoming we had some class and other meetings in connection with our up-coming 50<sup>th</sup> ('06). My old friend Clem was a highly valued participant and I thought, "what a great asset he would be for the Red Cross." I broached the question to him and was delighted with his positive response.

A week or two passed; Clem forwarded me his resume; I looked up the memo from Mr. Wen and thought the best way to submit Clem's background at that point would be to fax it to Mr. Wen per the fax/phone numbers on his e-mail. I probably hit a wrong key; got no connect; called him to verify the number and asked that he verify receipt and appropriateness of my cover letter and resume on Clem. My fax machine indicated a completed second transmission. That was on November 21. We then went to Boston for Thanks Giving with our daughter. On my return, I was concerned that I had not heard from Mr. Wen. To verify, again, that I had the right fax number, I sent him another fax asking for confirmation. He returned that one with a note on the bottom saying I should contact Monica Hoyos Hodson or Carol Taylor Brown in Washington.

Monica advised me that I was supposed to have submitted Clem's background per information on Crossnet. I was somewhat concerned because Mr. Wen had never mentioned that and the deadline was December 12. However, I'm familiar with deadlines and was not deterred. I went to Crossnet and received

a message, "That site is not responding." By then your offices in DC were closed. It was Friday night December 5. I kept trying Crossnet all weekend to no avail. Monday morning, December 8, I called Monica to ask that she fax me whatever was on the net. She was in meetings most of the day but eventually faxed me the nominating guidelines and forms.

There were several important requirements that would be challenging! Clem's original signature was needed and so was that of our chapter chair. These and the other materials had to be in Washington by today (12/12). I had to re-fax everything from Monica to Clem and explain the situation. I had to contact our chapter chair explain the requirements to him — and it turned out that he needed a meeting of our executive committee to authorize his signature. Also, our Executive Director ended up having to type some of Clem's information into boxes on the Crossnet form with an old fashion mechanical typewriter — since we did not know how to do that on the computer — especially since Crossnet was still "not responding." Yesterday afternoon we were able to hold a conference call with our Executive Committee. They were impressed with Clem's background and authorized our chair to sign the nomination. Clem was not at home for me to determine when he could sign his form and FedEx it to Washington. Murphy's law was hard at work!

We called Monica to ask if we could FedEx Clem's materials in time for the Friday deadline and have his signature follow as soon as possible after I could reach him. Monica got Mr. Wen on a conference call and our common sense request was turned down... "out of fairness to other candidates."

When I was finally able to reach Clem at home late last night, he withdrew his candidacy!

He had read the specs from Crossnet and felt he did not have requisite prior Red Cross experience. He would prefer something which capitalized on, and more rewardingly utilized, his strong international background. I pointed out that within the 11 page guidelines "International" experience was among the many qualifications being sought. The nominee processing situation which we had just experienced was also a deterrent to Clem.

Thus, he concluded by saying that he might send you a letter directly -- expressing his interest in such community service, with an international bent, in some role other than which we just missed.

Dave, there seems to have been a confluence of human and technical communication failure here. That being the case, it would be a great shame if such a near miss were to deprive the Red Cross of someone with Clem's character and his personal and professional assets.

I apologize the length of this letter. However, hopefully, you will get the idea that I feel something unfortunate has happened here. Moreover, I would feel very badly if I had just let it go at that.

We have a home in Woodstock and I have run into John Heston and others at the Nugget or elsewhere in Hanover. Since I new that you, too, now have a place in the north country, I have hoped to also run into you there sometime. I am co-chairman of our 50<sup>th</sup> and have been in touch with Don Goss and people from other classes for their assistance. That, too, has taken me to Hanover on a number of occasions. We were also very saddened to learn of Nancy Beekman's fatal accident. She was a cheerleader in my first varsity football game in high school! We saw Phil and Nance in Florida last May.

Lee joins me in sending you and your family all the best for the holidays and New Year. Maybe we'll run into each other at a Red Cross function somewhere.

#### Independent Auditors' Report

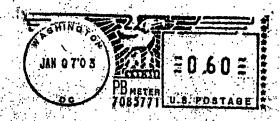

Carol Ann gave me the okay to write directly to you.

In April, 2001 I was in Warsaw as a member of a 3 person delegation from the ARC, myself, Jef Eyring a member of the Baltimore board with a business in Warsaw and Randy Ackley now at NHQ who was then a delegate posted in Bulgaria. For several days we met with the board of the Polish Red Cross (PRC) and members of the Federation discussing the needs of the PRC. My initiation and graduate course in writing a business plan!

An area of great concern is their tracing system. They are the repository of over 7 million individual records that are not properly stored or easily accessible. Since that time, a committee consisting of Jef, members of the Advisory Committee of the Holocaust Center in Baltimore of which I am a member and others from the ARC family have been trying to help.

It has been determined after extensive discussion with the PRC that a needs assessment of the tracing department must be done before we can help them take steps to preserve and utilize the documents in their possession. We have been told this assessment would cost approximately \$10,000. Can we count on the ARC for this money?

We are proposing going to the PRC with the following

- 1. We have money for the needs assessment if it is done by a company mutually agreed upon by the PRC and ARC.
- 2. When it is finished we will help secure funding to implement the plan.

A member of our committee is well connected in the Polish community in Chicago and nationally and believes he can mount a campaign for the second part of the project.

Can you help with the funding for the needs assessment?

I appreciate receiving your letter of 2 April 2003 – it was good to hear from you. It is now almost five months since the November 18 signing of our MOU in Tel Aviv, an event that I remember fondly. It is certainly unfortunate that neither of us has had the time to meet since then. I am looking forward to meeting with Avi at our National Convention in Indianapolis in May and would be delighted if you could attend as well.

While current events have no doubt preoccupied us both, I certainly agree that we must make every effort to realize the full potential of our MOU. Despite this disruption, I am pleased that, following the holiday season here, both Malik Jaffer and Pancho De La Roche of our International Services unit were able to visit Israel in January, and that Dr. Peter Page and Dr. Shinar were in contact to arrange the transfer of the blood freezing equipment to Israel for MDA use. I understand that for obvious reasons it was not possible for your two MDA staffers to join our Disaster Services staff last month in Reno for the National Medical Disaster Conference but hopefully a similar opportunity will arise soon and the timing will be favorable for such an exchange.

It is good to learn that MDA's relationships with both the International Committee of the Red Cross and the International Federation are proceeding in a positive way. The American Red Cross continues to support the salary and program costs of the Federation delegate in Tel Aviv and I hear positive things about the contribution of both the past and present Federation representatives. I was delighted to learn ICRC is making a more substantial allocation of funds this year to assist MDA service delivery.

I wanted to acknowledge your letter of 6 March 2003 – it was good to hear from you again. I recall well my visit to Springfield last summer and your gracious hospitality when I expressed to Carol Ann my desire to meet with Don to understand the relationship between the Community Blood Center of the Ozarks and our own Blood Services region. It was very educational and I appreciated your hospitality in giving me a tour of your facilities.

You will undoubtedly remember that our discussion focused on whether by combining our collection efforts we could get some synergy out of a joint program. Obviously, this would be a management decision for as a Governor of the American Red Cross, I have to respect the role of the management versus the role of the Governors. On my return, I did suggest to our management that they look at the possibility to see if the regions available blood supply would be enhanced by such a collaborative effort. The conclusion that they reached was that this would not be the outcome and there was also expressed some concerns that this type of cooperative program could be construed as collusive from a legal standpoint.

I apologize that this outcome was not convened to Don and you. It certainly was not based on arrogance or total self interest. The American Red Cross is motivated by serving the public's interest, just as you are, and to infer otherwise does no one any credit.

I have suggested to Ramesh Thadani, our CEO and Executive Vice President, that if he determines that the public's interests are better served by a cooperative blood collecting effort and if it is determined to be acceptable from a legal competitive standpoint, that he call Don Thomson to review how this might take place. Unfortunately, I am not optimistic based on my review of the facts, but one can always hope for a more constructive outcome.

Dear David:

It was such a pleasure to meet you on the Baltimore – Manchester "cattle car" last week. Since our conversation, I have been thinking about your responsibilities as Chairman of the American Red Cross and my longstanding interest in the development of a potential substitute for red blood cells.

As you may know, I spent my time during World War II working for the government's Office of Scientific Research and Development, under the aegis of the National Research Council developing a substitute for plasma from gelatin made from bone. It worked and was used for battle casualties in China. I never lost my interest and went from plasma substitutes, to I.V. protein nutrition, to total parenteral nutrition, to "blood substitutes".

After completing my second four-year term as Surgeon General, my continuing interest in this field led me to join the board of a small biotech firm called Biopure, which has been developing a purified bovine hemoglobin product. This product is rather remarkable because it transfers oxygen around the body more efficiently than transfused red blood cells. It requires no typing or cross-matching and stores at a wide range of temperatures safely for three years or more. Clinical trials in over 800 patients have shown the ability for it to safely be substituted for red blood cells in a variety of surgical settings. Trauma studies are being funded by the U.S. military and will be underway in the next 3-4 months.

Several years ago when Liddy Dole was chair of the ARC, I arranged a meeting of ARC brass and scientists, and Biopure investigators. As I said at the time, "For a heads up on what we are doing; if I were in the position of the ARC I'd like someone in my position as chair of the scientific advisory committee to Biopure to do just that."

David, I'm sending this to New London because I got the definite feeling at the aforementioned meeting that Biopure was misunderstood; we were there as colleagues not competitors.

Leaving that meeting I mentioned that with FDA requirements for blood banks were becoming more stringent, more and more blood banks would be shutting down and eventually the ARC would see huge rise in costs as they were more and more responsible for the size and safety of the supple of blood for transfusion. Wouldn't this be the time, I said, to look forward to the time the ARC and Biopure could work together on a number of fronts. This was an olive branch, which I think was seen as a threat.

Frankly, and understandably, the ARC don't seem to know exactly what they want to do about the emergence of a product that could be an effective substitute for red blood cells in at least certain surgical situations and possibly in trauma / disaster relief, as well. A more recent meeting just a couple of weeks ago suggests there is still no ARC point of view on this product.

The U.S. BLA (Biological License Application) was submitted in July 2002 and accepted for review by FDA in October 2002. The veterinary form of our product oxyglobin has already been approved by FDA in the United States and by EMEA for Europe. Our ARC product for human consumption (Hemopure) has been approved in South Africa.

While there may be some commercial relationship that would benefit the American Red Cross and Biopure, that is not what I'm worried about. My people tell me this product will likely be approved by FDA in the next 90-120 days. My concern is that the American Red Cross had better have an answer for the media and policy makers in general concerning their position on this product when that approval comes through. I don't think it would look good for the ARC to be "caught by surprise" by a product approval that would have such relevance to disaster relief, adequate blood supply and possible blood safety issues. I especially don't want you, David, to be blindsided.

Is there a possibility we could talk about this so you can acquaint yourself with this issue directly? Please let me know. There are many ways we could do this – perhaps the best is for you and me to go to Cambridge where you can see the whole show for yourself. I'll be out of the country from March 8<sup>th</sup> to March 25<sup>th</sup>.

Dear Mr. McLaughlin:

As the Chairman of The American Red Cross, there is a situation I feel you need to be aware of.

My name is Allene Lynn and I am one of only two retirees from the Broward County Florida, American Red Cross Chapter. I have been receiving pension and insurance benefits since my retirement on 11/1/1990. These benefits are administratively provided by the National Red Cross Organization and are paid for primarily by my contributions with a small contribution by the local chapter. On February 1<sup>st</sup>, 2003, with no advance warning, my Medicare supplemental insurance policy (administered by Aetna Insurance) and a small term life insurance policy were terminated without my knowledge or consent. This is a clear violation of ERISA Section 104, which requires a 60-day notification period prior to any termination of benefits.

I now have no Medicare supplemental insurance including no coverage for my prescription drugs. I am facing the prospect of medical bills (my 20% not covered by Medicare) of over \$7,000/year as well as a prescription drug bill, the insured portion of which totaled over \$6,800 in 2002. This represents an annual cash outlay for me of more than \$13,800/year, all of which had been covered by my Medicare Supplemental policy since 1990.

What follows is a chronology of events leading up to the desperate situation where I currently find myself.

- November 19, 2002 Received a call from Max Brown-Webster at Broward County chapter asking me about my current insurance benefits and future needs she mentioned that the Broward chapter was evaluating potential cost saving opportunities for their full time employees.

insurance carriers for their full time employees. Mr. Epps based this opinion on the fact that they had previously switch insurance carriers for their full time employees during the mid 1990's and my Medicare supplemental policy was not impacted.

- February 1, 2003 I receive my monthly pension statement and notice that no deductions have been made for the Aetna Medicare Supplemental Policy. After a call to Aetna Insurance I am notified that my group Medicare supplement insurance has been terminated. I arrange an appointment to visit the Broward Chapter to find out what happened.
- February 4, 2003 I visit the Broward County chapter and talk to Esther Zipper. She informs me that the local chapter has switched to Neighborhood Health Partnership (an HMO) for their full time employees. However, Neighborhood Health Partnership has no Medicare Supplemental policy for retirees. The local chapter agreed to help me contact the National Chapter to see if I can simply be "re-attached" to their Aetna Medicare Group Policy. After many phone calls to the National Organization they made no progress.
- February 5-26, 2003 After several calls to the National Chapter, National tells the local chapter its Broward County's problem and washes their hands of the entire situation. Esther Zipper contacted me with a situation update and then suggested I look for alternatives on my own. What the local chapter does not seem to understand is that is impossible for an individual to obtain equivalent coverage to what I had with Aetna without being a member of a large group. The best individual coverage I can find is approximately \$500/month (vs. the \$200/month I am currently paying) and their prescription drug program will only cover up to \$3,000 annually leaving me with another \$4,300/year to cover out of my own pocket as well as an additional \$3,600/year in insurance premiums that will not be covered by the local chapter.
- <u>Current Status</u> The National Chapter insists it is a local problem, the local chapter Manager Bill Epps and the HR representative Esther Zipper refuse to return my phone calls – hiding behind their voice mail and secretaries, I am stuck in the middle with no insurance.

What I am asking for is not a costly solution. Simply allow me to re-enroll in the Aetna Medicare supplemental group program (that I was enrolled in for 13 years) that the National Chapter already provides for their retirees and for retirees of other Local chapters.

This solution is not without precedent. A similar situation occurred in the Miami Chapter when they also switched to Neighborhood Health Partnership. Their retirees were allowed to continue with their Aetna Medicare Supplement policies and they have full Aetna coverage to this day.

I spent 15 years as a valued employee of the Broward Count Chapter of the Red Cross. During my tenure I developed regional Red Cross Service Centers, created special events that raised significant amounts of money, even managed the Broward Chapter on an interim basis. As an American Red Cross Corporate Officer, I am asking you to press for an equitable solution to this situation.

You helped our management to shape the architecture of our response and your reaching out to those affected by the disaster as well as to the other agencies involved was a lesson for all of us in how we need to be more inclusive and open in situations of this kind -- which hopefully will not occur again.

I share Marty's hope that you will continue to stay involved with the American Red Cross and would look forward to working with you again should the occasion arise.

Dear Rabbi Ofseyer:

I understand that your congregation has been given some misinformation about the American Red Cross and its commitment to our Israeli counterpart, Magen David Adom (MDA). As the Chairman of the Board of Governors, I want to assure you personally that our organization at the highest levels continues to emphatically and publicly support MDA. We are strongly advocating that the Movement grant full recognition and membership to the Red Cross Society in Israel—the MDA.

Last November, representing the American Red Cross, I traveled to Tel Aviv to sign a historic Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) with MDA. This important agreement outlines the numerous and specific ways the two organizations will continue to collaborate in areas such as preparedness for incidents involving weapons of mass destruction, international tracing and family reunification, biomedical services and much more. The MOU also expresses continued support for MDA's membership in the International Red Cross and Red Crescent Movement.

This trip was very revealing as I learned first-hand not only how important MDA is to the people in Israel, but also how vital are the working relationships they have established with the Red Crescent Societies in the region. These ties transcend the bonds of political conflict and offer hope for a humanitarian future in a divided land.

Following the signing ceremony, we contacted the leadership of several organizations including the American Jewish Committee, Hadassah, American Israel Public Affairs Committee, the Conference of President's of Major Jewish Organizations and the Anti Defamation League. All of these groups were very enthusiastic about the strong support and partnership activities that the American Red Cross and MDA have forged.

In a statement hailing the American Red Cross agreement with MDA, American Jewish Committee Executive Director David Harris said "Today's agreement between the American Red Cross and Magen David Adom is a boost to existing cooperative efforts between these two outstanding humanitarian relief organizations."

Unfortunately, since its founding in 1930, MDA has been denied membership in the international bodies of the Red Cross, first because societies must be from a country that has signed the Geneva Conventions, and secondly because governments would not accept their emblem, the red shield of David, which is not explicitly allowed by the Geneva Conventions.

The American Red Cross Board of Governors has considered the admission of MDA into the Movement a policy priority for more than 25 years and has in protest withheld the past four years of annual dues payable to the International Federation of Red Cross and Red Crescent Societies. The amount withheld to date exceeds \$20 million—a strong signal of our commitment to including MDA in the Movement.

Our work, however, is not complete. The Red Cross will steadfastly promote MDA's membership at every opportunity. Last month, American Red Cross President and CEO Marsha J. Evans reaffirmed our position at meetings with leaders in Switzerland, reiterating our Board's policy to not pay dues until this injustice is reversed.

As our country continues to face uncertain times, our organization has much to learn from Israel's MDA, especially in preparing for the destructive effects of weapons of mass destruction. We look forward to sharing knowledge and developing best practices through this important partnership.

I would also like to mention that the Riverside County Chapter is very supportive of MDA. I know you met Pamela Anderson briefly, and she and the volunteers of your local chapter is there providing much needed services to your community.

Dear Chairman, Dean Dand

One year ago I had the honour to be elected President of the International Federation of Red Cross and Red Crescent Societies. This is, I believe, a good time to summarize some of the important issues we have dealt with and those we will have to consider in the near future.

During this period the Governing Board has tried to make its work more useful and, in this conviction, we have done our utmost to come up with approaches consonant with our Federation's challenges. At its first meeting, the Board set the orientations to follow during its term of office: Strengthening National Societies and the presence of the International Federation in the international sphere.

The Board decided on these priorities because it felt there was a need in these areas.

• With regard to strengthening National Societies, the Secretariat prepared the document "the change strategy", based on Strategy 2010, in response to this orientation. We have regularly given you information on the main aspects over recent months.

I should like to highlight the major effort the Secretariat is making to develop and implement this strategy in order for us to have a less operational but more facilitating Secretariat. I should like to outline here some of its broad lines:

- The purpose and tasks of the regional and country delegations are going to be redefined so as to better serve and be closer to the needs of the National Societies.
- The budget architecture has been modified. The budget now comprises statutory contributions and a new formula called "core appeal", whereby the donor Societies have undertaken to make extraordinary contributions to cover the necessary basic budget. This furthermore implies a change to how the so-called "Programme support recovery" is funded, now considerably reduced from 11% to 6.5%. The aim of these changes is, basically, to lower the budget for expenditure at Geneva headquarters and to increase funding in the field.



Capacity Building Fund (CBF) to CHF 5 million. In this way it can help the greatest possible number of National Societies, with the objective of 80 by the end of 2004.

• In line with the Board's guidelines, the Secretariat is working very hard on the international presence of the Federation and our presence is increasingly being noted in international Fora. We are making the Federation's work better known and our voice heard in all these Fora, especially the United Nations and other multilateral agencies.

With regard to the work of the Board, this first year we have mainly focused on the issues of integrity, advocacy, communications and external relations, and resource mobilization (the Foundation for the Federation is beginning to be reactivated as a tool able to bring in additional funding), and some policies have been reviewed. This is ongoing work in which we are still involved.

In addition, this year we plan to lay down the lines of a vision for the future and determine what Federation we want. We will have an excellent opportunity to discuss this together at our next General Assembly.

In 2003 Strategy 2010 will have been in application for years and the General Assembly will have the possibility to ask the Governing Board to assess it and, if necessary, to propose to adapt it.

Cooperation with the ICRC and the Standing Commission is also being pursued, with special reference to advocacy and external communication as well as profile in the mass media, as in recent years. The culmination will be the holding of the International Conference in 2003.

This is, in short, some of what has been done in the past year and what is planned for this year. We are convinced that our work will bear fruit in the coming years and hope there will be some tangible results in the immediate future.

For these actions to have the desired success, apart from time we need your ideas and contributions. Both the Secretary General and I would like you to send us any suggestions and comments you feel appropriate. Rest assured that we will read them with great interest and concern.

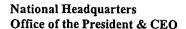

Per your invitation, I would like to offer management's thoughts regarding the next steps for the Fundraising Task Force and the report presented by Jerry Panas. I believe that the review was useful and can prompt important action on key initiatives needed to take Red Cross fundraising to the next level. After discussions with Kathleen Loehr and other members of my leadership team, we identified several overall themes from the study that will benefit the American Red Cross.

- Board ownership. Leadership is always critical in implementing successful change, and we are
  suggesting fairly important changes for our "one red cross" fundraising. We agree with Jerry's
  recommendation that the Task Force (or its successor) help lead this process, as it sends a very
  strong message across the organization. Together we will have to make hard and courageous
  decisions for the good of the organization as we design new ways of doing collaborative
  fundraising, and your leadership will be critical.
- Leadership engagement. We have already seen the increased dollars and relationships at national headquarters through the engagement of the Board and senior leaders. I agree that we must now make fundraising a key ingredient for CEOs and volunteer leaders in the Service Areas and chapters. Fundraising led by leaders and volunteers is always much more powerful than that led by staff. This recommendation will require much cultural change and training, but the results will be well worth it.
- Chapter fundraising. We must continue to build collaborative fundraising relationships across the organization. Because the strength of our chapters is so critical to our overall ability to serve the nation, we agree with Jerry's view that we should incorporate ways to improve the fundraising power and potential of our chapter network. Programs like direct mail and on-line fundraising can be standardized to generate economies and better results, as shown with chapters that national headquarters currently supports. We agree that we should move forward with a deliberate pace to create a shared donor database to better leverage our resources and align national and local fundraising efforts.
- New programs. Several ideas were presented by Jerry that deserve additional evaluation. New
  programs such as a legacy society would complement the new focus on individual major gifts.
  New initiatives can build on programs in development such as the Chairman's Cabinet and
  Project RED. We should catalog these new program ideas from his report and determine which
  to implement and the appropriate timing for each.

While the report has some important themes, several areas were lacking. For example, the report does not articulate how the national headquarters Development department compares with its peers in the area of non-episodic fundraising. While I know that it is difficult to find exact benchmarking partners, the report was devoid of any meaningful metrics or comparisons.

The report also did not provide many details behind the recommendations. Many of these are simple observations with no insight on how to move forward. For example, recommendation 103 to change the staff reporting structure only focused on rearranging reporting relationships and creating a new unit. Details behind the structure such as appropriate staffing levels, primary mission of the units and other important aspects were lacking. Another example is recommendation 36 that observes donor relations processes are cumbersome – the report only suggests to "keep the steps as streamlined as possible."

Another concern focuses on the lack of data and lack of sources for data that was provided. Data sources were not provided for the few graphs or tables in the report. It appears that the basis for the preponderance of his findings are strictly interviews he conducted, rather than a rigorous analysis of our processes and results as outlined in his proposal. Mr. Panas presented a Resource Evaluation to Achieve Potential (REAP) process in his proposal, specifically stating:

"We conduct a complete inventory of the Red Cross' fundraising work and assess every possible major factor of your work. But of greater importance, we determine what your full potential should be."

"We identify where you are and indicate where you should be. And develop a strategy for how to get there. There is a concentrated focus on developing a strategy for increasing your philanthropic production year after year after year."

"We review and evaluate forty-three specific areas. These cover virtually every detail and mechanic of your fundraising program."

"In a careful analysis, I review how you can most effectively use staff time for optimum results. We determine what type of staffing is required for your annual fundraising and for the proposed growth. We provide you with a template for determining necessary and realistic individual staff objectives and show how to monitor status and progress."

I believe the final report did not live up to these commitments.

We understand there is awareness of the study and great interest in its results at headquarters as well as among chapters. I recommend that the Task Force issue a communication to the organization that provides an overview of the report and outlines next steps. We would be happy to help prepare such a message if desired.

We are excited to build on the momentum the study has generated. We agree with Jerry's observation that we have never had such good alignment of the key ingredients to achieve our full fundraising potential. We look forward to working with you and your colleagues as we embark on a reenergized fundraising effort for the entire American Red Cross.

Message to the Board of Governors from Fundraising Task Force Co-Chairs Elaine Lyerly and Bruce LaBoon:

During our meeting in San Francisco in May 2005, the Board of Governors approved a Resolution to form a Fundraising Task Force to benchmark realistic expectations and goals focusing on sustainable non-episodic fundraising in the competitive environment of other non-profit organizations. The Resolution further provided that expenses for any external consulting services to the Task Force were to be funded by individual members of the Board.

The Task Force members decided that an external consultant was required to benchmark the fundraising strategies and to identify the best practices of other non-profit organizations. After sending out a Request for Proposal in early June, the Task Force interviewed four consulting firms. Based on those interviews, the Task Force narrowed its selection to two firms and met a second time for additional presentations and interviews.

The Task Force unanimously selected the firm of Jerold Panas, Linzy and Partners to undertake this important work. All of the Task Force members were extremely impressed with the reputation and skill of this firm. The Panas firm agreed to conduct the study for \$51,000 plus capped expenses not to exceed \$5,000, for a total of \$56,000.

Under the terms of the contract, the Board is obligated to pay one-third of the fee at this time, with the second and third installments due in September and October 2005, respectively. That is why we are now writing to you to request your participation in paying for this very significant consulting contract. Please contact us no later than August 3rd, to let us know whether you are able to assist the Board in underwriting this expense. All of your payments should be made to the American Red Cross so that you may, appropriately, treat your contribution as a tax deductible expense.

The firm has already begun its interviews of Red Cross personnel at NHQ and will provide the Task Force with an interim report on October 14. The firm will make an extensive report to the entire Board during our Board Retreat on October 29.

(4) to carry out a system of national and international relief in time of peace, and apply that system in mitigating the suffering caused by pestilence, famine, fire, floods, and other great national calamities, and to devise and carry out measures for preventing those calamities.

Mission says:

The American Red Cross, a humanitarian organization led by volunteers and guided by its Congressional Charter and the Fundamental Principles of the International Red Cross Movement, will be advised when such assumption of direct responsibility is deemed necessary. The President and CEO should notify the Executive Committee of such action at such time.

The mission (looks more like a vision, but it's called a mission in the document) for disaster services, as approved by the Board as a part of the Disaster Services Task Force (2002) Report:

Every day throughout America, Red Cross neighbors help save their neighbors' lives and property from the destructive power of disasters. We are the premier, volunteer-led organization devoted to: educating people to prevent and prepare for disasters; planning for and responding to disasters; and advocating for disaster victims. We are driven to serve people, using the highest standards of urgency, excellence, compassion, trust and respect...and do so as a team in partnership with others.

Finally, I've attached the report of the Task Force from three years ago. It's a little long, but as close as we have to any organizational statement specifically about catastrophic disasters.

- Barry Porter, Executive Director of the Triangle Area Chapter, has a rich and diverse 23 year history with the American Red Cross. He has served at the Triangle AreaChapter since April of 2003. His Red Cross experience began as a volunteer in 1983; he has worked for the Red Cross in Indiana, Illinois, Ohio, Kentucky, Alabama and North Carolina.
- Bob Bowerman has been a chapter volunteer for ten years and has served as the Disaster Chair and as a Board Member of the Triangle Area Chapter before becoming Chairman. Prior to coming to the Chapter he served as the North Carolina State Mitigation Chair as well as a Volunteer Partner to the National Mitigation Manager. Mr. Bowerman is retiree of IBM where he worked for 38 years.
- With 23 paid staff and over 2400 volunteers, the ratio of volunteers to staff is 106 to 1.
- There were 250 blood drives were set up throughout the community in 2004.
- In FY 04 the Triangle Area Chapter took on service delivery responsibilities for Johnston County, NC.
- The Chapter has increased Health and Safety attendance by offering convenient on line registration for its life saving courses. The Chapter has over 800 instructors who taught over 28,000 people in 2004.
- Volunteers and staff provided 197 families affected by fire with emergency aid The Chapter was also able to assist 844 families with emergency AFES communications and social services for military personnel and their families.

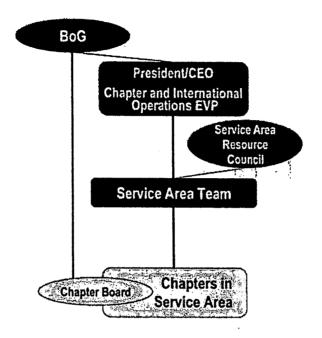

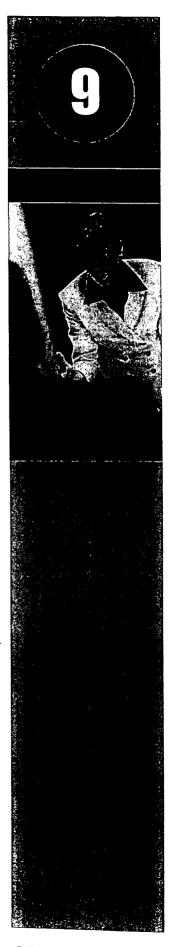
#### DIAGRAM OF THE SERVICE AREA STRUCTURE

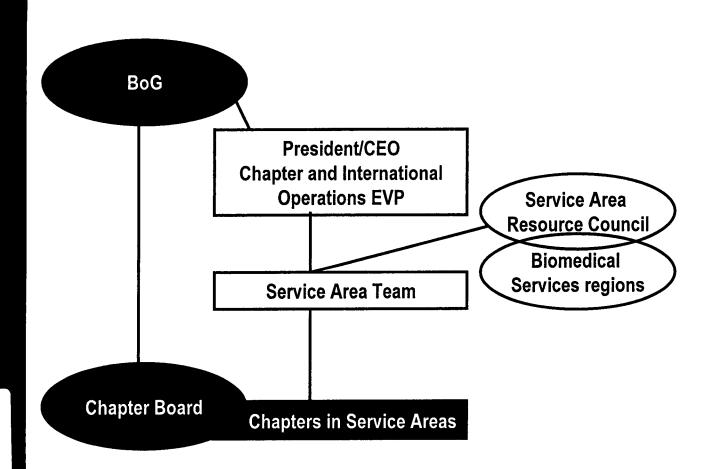

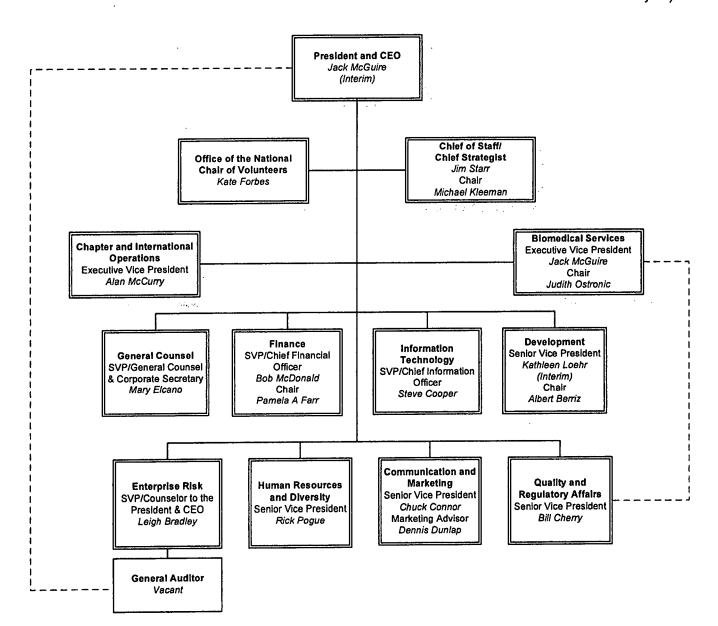

# Service Area Diagram



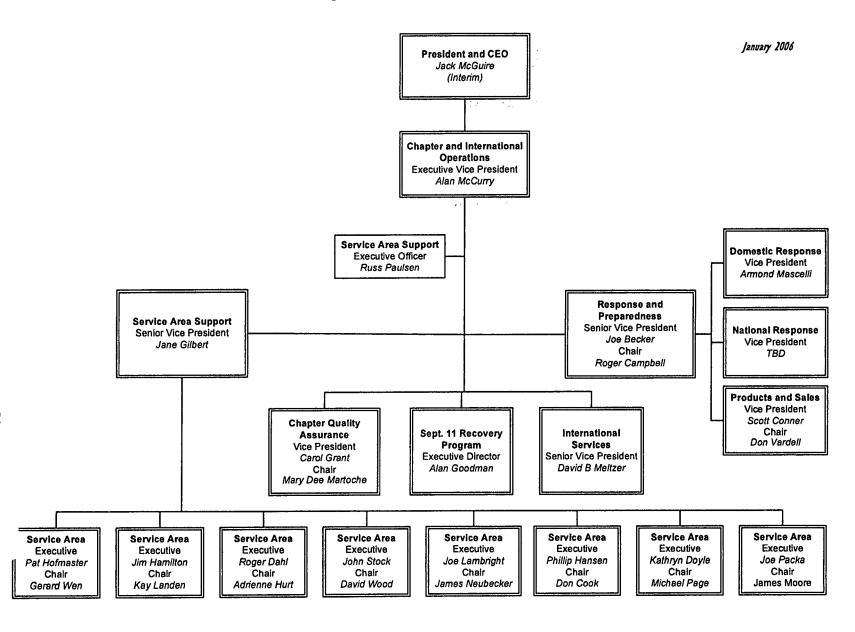
Service Area Boundaries, Headquarters Locations and Planned Opening Dates

This Professional Services Contract ("Contract"), effective as of December 1, 2003 (the "Effective Date"), is made by and between The American National Red Cross, a charitable and not-for-profit corporation chartered by Congress, having an office at 2025 E Street, NW, Washington, DC 20006 (the "Red Cross") and Public Strategies, Inc. a Texas corporation, having its principal place of business at 98 San Jacinto Blvd, Suite 900, Austin, TX 78701 ("Contractor").

The Red Cross desires to engage Contractor to provide certain professional consulting services in support of the Red Cross Senior Leadership Branding Project as more fully described below and Contractor is willing to provide such services to the Red Cross upon the terms and conditions herein contained.

In consideration of the foregoing, of the promises contained in this Contract and of other good and valuable consideration, the Red Cross and Contractor (each, a "Party" and collectively, the "Parties") intending to be legally bound, agree as follows:

#### 1.0 RESPONSIBILITIES OF CONTRACTOR

Using its best skills and attention, Contractor will deliver to the Red Cross the following services within each identified area ("Services"):

- Strategy Coordinate with Red Cross public relations staff to create and implement a strategy/plan for Marsha J. Evans, making her the "face" of the Red Cross and ensure this strategy is aligned with organizational public relations plans.
- Media Relations Secure at least two media opportunities a month including, but not limited to morning show appearances, cable/network news, talk shows, print publications, online media, etc.
- Influential Groups Secure public speaking opportunities, (at least once a month) with influential groups at premier venues.
- Writing Develop key messages, talking points, press releases and media advisories in association with media appearances/speaking engagements.

#### 2.0 <u>DELIVERABLES AND SCHEDULE OF PERFORMANCE</u>

Using its best skills and attention, Contractor will deliver to the Red Cross the following deliverables ("Deliverables") on or before the corresponding deadlines:

- Provide written strategy reports as requested by Red Cross during the term of the Contract.
- Provide written talking points for media interviews two weeks prior to scheduled interview.
- Provide written key messages for speeches two weeks prior to scheduled speaking opportunity.

The term "Deliverables" shall include Custom Deliverables, as defined in Section 9 below.

#### 3.0 PLACE OF PERFORMANCE

The place of performance for this Contract is at the Contractor's place of business with occasional local travel to Red Cross National Headquarters at 2025 E St., NW, Washington, D.C. Travel and maintenance expenses will be reimbursed as long as they are pre-approved and in accordance with the Travel Regulations For American Red Cross Contractors/Consultants, Attachment A, attached and hereto made a part of this Contract.

#### 4.0 ACCEPTANCE

The Red Cross will approve, or disapprove with written modifications, the Services performed and Deliverables provided under this Contract within ten (10) days after receipt of such Services or Deliverables. The Red Cross reserves the sole and exclusive right to determine the acceptability of the Services and Deliverables provided by Contractor. Unacceptable Services or Deliverables will be corrected at no additional cost to the Red Cross.

#### 5.0 TERM AND TERMINATION

- 5.1 This Contract will begin on the Effective Date and expire on November 30, 2004 unless otherwise terminated sooner in accordance with this Contract (the "Term").
- 5.2 The Red Cross may extend the Term of this Contract for an additional twelve (12) months by written notice to Contractor within thirty (30) days of the expiration of the Term ("Extension"). The Extension period is subject to the terms and conditions of this Contract, including without limitation, this Section 5.2. The total duration of this Contract, including the exercise of any options under this clause, may not exceed three (3) years.
- 5.3 Either party may terminate this Contract, by providing sixty- (60) days' prior written notice of its intention to terminate this Contract to the Contractor. The liability of the Red Cross for such termination will be limited to payment for Services performed as of the effective date of termination.
- 5.4 Either Party may terminate this Contract if the other has failed to fulfill any one of its obligations under this Contract (the "Breaching Party"). In the event the Breaching Party is the Contractor, the Red Cross must provide ten (10) days written notice to allow the Contractor to cure the breach. In the event the Breaching Party is the Red Cross, Contractor must provide ten (10) days written notice to allow the Red Cross to cure the breach. The Contract will terminate if the Breaching Party fails to cure the breach after the expiration of the requisite cure period. The liability of the Red Cross for termination pursuant to this section will be limited to payment for Services authorized and incurred as of the effective date of termination.
- 5.5 If any applicable and then-current laws, rules and regulations ("Regulations") is amended in a way that precludes a Party from lawfully performing its obligations under this Contract, either Party may terminate this Contract effective upon the effective date of such amended Regulation.
- 5.6 The Red Cross may terminate the Contract in accordance with Article 16.0.
- 5.7 In the event this Contract is terminated, Contractor agrees to immediately cease all Services and turn over all finished and unfinished Deliverables to the Red Cross.
- 5.8. The rights and remedies provided in this section are not exclusive and are in addition to any other rights and remedies provided by the Regulations or this Contract.
- 5.9 Unless otherwise provided in this Contract, In the event of any termination or expiration of this Contract, Section 5.9 and Articles 8.0, 9.0, 10.0, 12.0, 13.0, 14.0, 15.0, 17.0, 18.0 and 22.0 will survive indefinitely.

#### **6.0 COMPENSATION AND INVOICES**

6.1 As compensation for the Services and Deliverables, subject to <u>Article 4.0</u>, the Red Cross will pay Contractor as follows:

A firm fixed retainer fee of \$10,000 per month which will include consulting fees but is not inclusive of additional fee-based elements, such as focus groups if required by Red Cross. If Red Cross requires these Services, the Contract will be amended to add such.

Notwithstanding the foregoing, in no event will contractor receive more than \$120,000 for Services rendered and Deliverables provided in accordance with this Contract without a Contract Amendment.

- 6.2 Contractor must submit invoices to the Red Cross before payment will be made on a monthly basis. To ensure prompt payment, Contractor will submit an invoice to the following address: Carrie Martin, PR Manager, 2025 E St., NW, Washington, D.C. 20006 (martinc@usa.redcross.org). Each invoice must contain the following information:
- Contractor's name and address
- The Contract and/or purchase order number
- A description of the Services or Deliverables and the dates of performance or delivery
- Any additional information required by this Contract
- 6.3 The Red Cross will make payment to Contractor within thirty (30) days of the receipt of an accurate invoice.
- 6.4 Contractor agrees that submission of an invoice to the Red Cross for payment is a certification that any Services and/or Deliverables reflected on such invoice were performed in accordance with this Contract.

#### 7.0 DELAY; FORCE MAJEURE

- 7.1 Contractor must notify the Red Cross, in writing, immediately upon learning, or otherwise becoming aware, of any difficulties that may delay the delivery of Services or Deliverables. Such notification must identify the reason for the delay, as well as the anticipated period of delay. Failure to provide timely notice to the Red Cross will disqualify Contractor from receiving:
  - 7.1.1 any extension of time to perform the Services or provide the Deliverables, or,
  - 7.1.2 any additional compensation that may arise out of the Contractor spending any additional time to perform the Services or provide the Deliverables as a result of the delay.
- 7.2 Each Party may be excused, without penalty, from any delay in performance or from failure to perform in accordance with this Contract, to the extent that such delay or failure results from causes beyond the reasonable control of such Party, and without fault or omission. Such excusable delays include, but are not limited to, delays caused by fires, floods, epidemics, quarantine restrictions, acts of terrorism, strikes, freight embargoes and unusually severe weather conditions. If such excusable delay extends beyond thirty days (30) either Party may terminate this Contract immediately upon written notice to the other Party, without additional cost or penalty.

## **8.0 REPRESENTATIONS, WARRANTIES AND COVENANTS**

- 8.1 Contractor hereby represents, warrants and covenants that:
  - 8.1.1 All Services performed and Deliverables provided under this Contract will conform to the requirements of this Contract, as well as the Regulations.
  - 8.1.2 It will perform all Services and provide all Deliverables in a timely and professional manner by qualified professional personnel.
  - 8.1.3 For a period of one (1) year after acceptance by the Red Cross of the Deliverables, Contractor will promptly correct, at its own cost, any error, problem, or defect in material or workmanship with respect to such Deliverables.
  - 8.1.4 The Services performed and Deliverables and Contractor Works provided under this Contract do not and will not contain any libelous material, or, infringe upon or violate any Regulations (including without limitation, patent, copyright, trademark, moral rights, semiconductor chip protection or unfair

competition law); any license; proprietary information; non-disclosure, trade secret, intellectual property or other right of any third party; or right of privacy; provided that it shall not be a breach of this Contract by Contractor if such infringement arises solely from (a) any materials or oral statements that were based upon information or the technical expertise provided by Red Cross or its agents; or (b) conduct or statements made under the direction of and with the prior consent of Red Cross.

- 8.2 If the Deliverables, Contractor Works, materials or information, including any components of the Deliverables, Contractor Works, materials, or information may or actually become the subject of a patent or copyright infringement claim ("Infringing Deliverables"), Contractor may:
  - 8.2.1 substitute the Infringing Deliverables with similar modifications that are satisfactory to the Red Cross, or
  - 8.2.2 obtain the right for the Red Cross to continue using the Infringing Deliverables. If the use of the Infringing Deliverables by the Red Cross is prevented by a permanent court action, or, if Contractor cannot obtain the right for Red Cross to continue using the Infringing Deliverables at a reasonable cost, then Contractor agrees to take the Infringing Deliverables and refund the total amount the Red Cross has paid Contractor under this Contract as set forth in Article 6.0, less one percent (1%). Contractor will provide payment to the Red Cross in immediately available funds to the address provided by the AR (as defined in Section 24.1) within thirty (30) days after the Parties determine that such refund is warranted.
  - 8.2.3 Notwithstanding the foregoing, subsections 8.2.1 and 8.2.2 shall not apply to any Deliverables, materials or oral statements, or any components of such, to the extent that Deliverables, materials or oral statements or any components of such are based solely upon information or the technical expertise provided by Red Cross.

#### 8.3 Each Party agrees that:

- 8.3.1 It is organized, validly existing and in good standing under the Regulations of the jurisdiction in which it was organized,
  - 8.3.2 this Contract, when executed and delivered by it, will be the legal, valid and binding obligation of it, enforceable against it in accordance with its terms,
  - 8.3.3 the execution, delivery and performance of this Contract by it do not and will not (i) conflict with, or constitute a breach or default under its incorporation documents or any material agreement, contract, commitment, or instrument to which it is a party or (ii) require the consent, approval or authorization of, or notice, declaration, filing or registration with, any third party or any governmental or regulatory authority, and
- 8.3.4 it has not previously granted and will not grant any rights to any third party (including a subcontractor of Contractor) which are inconsistent with the rights granted herein.

#### 9.0 OWNERSHIP OF MATERIALS / INTELLECTUAL PROPERTY

Contractor, in providing Services hereunder, will develop work product specifically for Red Cross ("Custom Deliverables"). Contractor acknowledges and agrees that the Custom Deliverables shall constitute a "work made for hire" under all relevant copyright laws (e.g. 17 U.S.C. § 101), and that Red Cross shall own in perpetuity the Custom Deliverables, throughout the world, including without limitation all copyrights (and any renewals and extensions thereof), and the exclusive, perpetual right, throughout the world, to use, advertise, exhibit, distribute and/or otherwise exploit Custom Deliverables in any and all media and manners, whether now known or hereafter devised. If, for any reason, the Custom Deliverables shall be deemed not to be a work made for hire, this Contract shall constitute an irrevocable assignment to Red Cross and its successors and assigns of any and all of Contractor's right, title and interest thereto, including without limitation any and all worldwide copyrights and any and all renewals and extensions thereof and for all uses and purposes whatsoever. Contractor hereby agrees to provide all assistance reasonably requested by Red Cross in the establishment, preservation and enforcement of its copyright in such Custom Deliverables, such assistance to be provided without any additional compensation to Contractor. For example, Contractor agrees

to execute any assignment documents Red Cross may require confirming Red Cross's ownership of the results and proceeds hereunder. Notwithstanding the foregoing, this paragraph shall not be deemed to transfer or assign to Red Cross the copyright in any work product developed by or for Contractor (a) through engagements with Contractor's other clients, or (b) otherwise independent of Contractor's relationship with Red Cross (all such work product referred to herein as "Contractor Works"). By way of example and not limitation, Contractor Works include media training materials and the public assessment workbook. Contractor shall not include Contractor Works in any Deliverables that are intended to be used by Red Cross outside of the Red Cross to an external audience, by way of example and not limitation, talking points, key messages and speeches. If any Contractor Works are included in Custom Deliverables, Red Cross is hereby granted a non-exclusive, perpetual, world-wide, royalty free license to use such Contractor Works for Red Cross's internal purposes only. If Red Cross wishes to disseminate any Contractor Works that are included in Custom Deliverables external to Red Cross (e.g., to the public generally, to Red Cross's customers or Red Cross's other vendors), Red Cross shall obtain the prior written consent of Contractor. If Red Cross furnishes any work product for Contractor to use for purposes of this Contract, Red Cross represents and warrants to Contractor that Red Cross has all rights, titles and interests necessary for Contractor to use such work product, and Contractor represents and warrants that Contractor shall not use such work product for any purpose other than in Contractor's performance under this Contract.

13.1 Contractor agrees to, defend, indemnify and hold harmless the Red Cross, its governors, officers, directors, agents, employees, volunteers and their respective successors and assigns (the "Red Cross Indemnitees" or individually referred to as a "Red Cross Indemnitee") from and against all losses, liabilities, suits, claims, costs, expenses (including reasonable attorneys' fees and court costs) demands, fines, penalties, judgments, damages and causes of action that are asserted or claimed against Red Cross Indemnitees, or incurred by the Red Cross Indemnitees, (except to the extent caused by the negligence of any Red Cross Indemnitees) that; (i) arise from, or is attributable to, any act or omission of Contractor, its subcontractors or material suppliers (at any tier) or their respective directors, officers, employees and agents in connection herewith, or; (ii) result from any breach or violation by Contractor, its directors, officers, employees or agents of any representation, warranty or covenant made herein or (iii) involve an allegation of infringement of any patent, trademark, copyright, or other intellectual property, right or trade secret of a third party as well as any allegation of libel, slander, invasion of privacy, or any failure to obtain a necessary release, permission or clearance, or any other cause of action or claim arising out of the materials and elements provided by Contractor under this Contract, provided that such indemnification shall not be applicable to any losses, liabilities, suits, claims, costs, expenses (including reasonable attorneys' fees and court costs) demands, fines, penalties, judgments, damages or causes of action arising from (a) any materials, elements or oral statements that were prepared by or made by Contractor to the extent such materials, elements or oral statements were solely based upon information provided by any Red Cross Indemnitee; or (b) conduct or statements made under the direction of and with the prior consent of any Red Cross Indemnitee. If Red Cross furnishes any work product or materials for Contractor to use for purposes of this Contract, Red Cross warrants to Contractor that Red Cross has all rights necessary for Contractor to use such work product or materials and such work product or materials shall not infringe any patent, trademark, copyright or other intellectual property, right or trade secret of a third party nor libel, slander or invade the privacy of any third party.

13.2 Contractor will be liable at all times for damages to or destruction of Contractor's equipment and materials, including the loss of use thereof, regardless of how such damage or destruction occurs. The Red Cross will be under no liability to reimburse Contractor for any such loss or damage thereto, and Contractor waives any right of subrogation against the Red Cross for such loss or damage. If Contractor insures its equipment and materials against physical loss or damage, then Contractor agrees to secure, if required in such insurance, a waiver of subrogation in favor of the Red Cross.

#### 14.0 INSURANCE

- 14.1 Contractor will maintain the following insurance policies in full force and effect for the term of this Contract and thereafter for not less than one (1) year:
  - 14.11 a Commercial General Liability policy endorsed to include Products and Completed Operations Liability and Personal & Advertising Injury Liability with the Red Cross Indenmitees as additional insureds; the amount of the policy will be at least \$1,000,000 combined single limit for each occurrence and; this will be written on an occurrence form (not "claims made form");
  - 14.1.2 a Professional Liability Insurance policy (Errors and Omissions Insurance) in an amount not less than \$1,000,000 each claim insuring claims arising from performance of Services to the Red Cross as defined in this Contract and related material, including, but not limited to, coverage for all expenses, including attorney's fees, incurred in the investigation, negotiation, arbitration, and defense of any suit or claim for damages including lost earnings of the Red Cross;
  - 14.1.3 an auto liability policy including coverage for owned, non-owned and hired vehicles and uninsured and under-insured motorists coverage in an amount not less than \$1,000,000 with the Red Cross Indemnitees as additional insureds; and
  - 14.1.4 a Workers' Compensation policy covering all employees provided under this Contract and having statutory limits for each jurisdiction where the work required under this Contract is performed, and an Employers' Liability policy with at least the following limits, \$250,000 per accident, \$500,000 per disease and \$250,000 per disease (each employee).
- 14.2 Contractor will, at its sole expense, keep in force valid and enforceable policies of insurance as specified in this Contract and as required by statute, with carriers currently rated by A.M. Best at A+10 or higher and licensed in the states in which the work of this Contract is being carried out, and such policies will be written as primary policy coverage and not contributing with, or in excess of any insurance coverage which the Red Cross may maintain. Contractor will provide the Red Cross with such certificates of insurance evidencing all of the above coverages and conditions (types and amounts) prior to the commencement of work, and renewal certificates within ten days of expiration or non-renewal of the policies required; in the "Cancellation Clause" the certificate will provide for not less than thirty (30) days prior written notice to the Red Cross of non-renewal of policies, cancellation or material change in the coverage provided which reduces the amount, terms or conditions below that required herein, prior to the date of such non-renewal, cancellation or change.

#### 15.0 CONFIDENTIALITY; TRADE NAMES; LOGOS

15.1 For the purposes of the Contract, confidential information includes the terms and conditions of this Contract, all information provided to or by the Contractor and such other information identified as confidential prior to disclosure ("Confidential Information").

Contractor acknowledges and agrees to hold all Confidential Information in the strictest confidence as a fiduciary and will not make any press release or public announcement of this Contract, or voluntarily sell, transfer, publish, disclose, display or otherwise make available to any third persons such Confidential Information or any portion thereof without the express written consent of the Red Cross. Contractor will use its best efforts to protect the confidentiality of all such information consistent with the manner in which it protects its most confidential business information.

15.2 Contractor will not permit or generate any publicity, advertising or promotion concerning this Contract, the Services or Deliverables provided to the Red Cross or any aspect of Contractor's relationship with the Red Cross without the prior written consent of the Red Cross. Contractor recognizes that the name, emblem, logo and marks of the Red Cross represent valuable assets and that substantial recognition and goodwill are associated with such assets. Contractor will not use the name, emblem, logo, or marks of the Red Cross without the prior written consent of the Red Cross.

15.3 Each of the Parties acknowledges that a violation of this Article would cause irreparable harm to the other Party for which no adequate remedy at law exists and each Party therefore agrees that, in addition to any other remedies available, and notwithstanding any other provision of this Contract, the aggrieved Party will be entitled to injunctive relief to enforce the terms of this Article. The prevailing Party will be entitled to recover all costs and expenses, including reasonable attorneys' fees, incurred because of any legal action arising in relation to this Article.

#### 16.0 CONFLICT OF INTEREST

- 16.1 Vendor represents that there are no conflicts of interest arising from the Services to be provided pursuant to this Contract. Vendor will immediately notify Red Cross if any potential or perceived conflict arises. Red Cross reserves the right to terminate this Contract in accordance with <u>Section 5.6</u> without cost to Red Cross if Red Cross determines that a conflict exists.
- 16.2 Contractor will immediately notify the Red Cross whenever any non-Red Cross customer or client requests or receives any information, professional advice, representation or assistance regarding the Red Cross, whether or not the inquiry is related to the Services provided under this Contract.

#### 17.0 DISPUTES

Any dispute between the parties arising out of or relating to this Agreement or in any way relating to the parties' relationship which cannot first be resolved in the ordinary course of business, shall be submitted to mediation prior to the filing of a lawsuit or other legal proceeding. Mediation shall be conducted in accordance with nationally accepted rules of mediation, and the costs of mediation shall be equally shared by the parties unless otherwise agreed. The selection of the mediator shall be agreed upon by mutual consent of the parties; provided, that if the parties are not able to agree on a mediator within forty-five (45) days after the first request for mediation, then a mediator will be appointed in accordance with nationally accepted rules and procedures governing mediation then in affect at the time of the dispute. The parties will participate in good faith in the mediation. Each party agrees to keep all disputes and negotiation and mediation proceedings strictly confidential, except for disclosures of information to legal counsel or required by applicable law. The obligations undertaken herein by the parties shall survive and continue after the expiration/termination of this Agreement

#### 18.0 GOVERNING LAW - Intentionally Omitted

#### 19.0 ASSIGNMENT AND SUBCONTRACTING

- 19.1 This Contract may not be assigned by either Party without the express prior written consent of the other Party. Any attempted assignment without such consent will be null and void and of no effect.
- 19.2 Contractor may not subcontract the Services without the prior written consent of the Red Cross. Any attempt to subcontract without such consent will be null and void and of no effect. In the event the Red Cross approves Contractor's use of a subcontractor, Contractor must comply with the terms and conditions of Attachment B.

## 20.0 EQUAL EMPLOYMENT OPPORTUNITY

In connection with the performance of work under this Contract, the Contractor will not discriminate against any employee or applicant for employment because of age, disability, race, religion, color, national origin, sex or any other characteristic protected by the Regulations. The Contractor agrees to abide by all federal, state and local employment and labor law notice posting requirements.

#### . 21.0 ENTIRE AGREEMENT AND MODIFICATIONS

This Contract constitutes the entire agreement between the Parties as to the subject matter hereof and supersedes all prior verbal and written agreements. There will be no amendment, modification or waiver of any of the terms and conditions hereof unless in writing and executed by both Parties. Any prior verbal, written agreements, and proposals are not considered a part of this Contract.

#### 22.0 INTERPRETATION

- 22.1 Unless otherwise specified, all references to "days" are to calendar and not business days.
- 22.2 The preamble and Attachments to this Contract (as applicable) and the terms and conditions incorporated therein are integral parts of this Contract. All references herein to this Contract encompass such preamble and Attachments (as applicable) and the terms and conditions incorporated therein.
- 22.3 Unless otherwise explicitly stated, in the event of any conflict between the terms of the articles of this Contract and the terms of any of the attachments hereto (as applicable), the terms of this Contract govern. In the event of a conflict between the terms and conditions of this Contract and any terms and conditions that may be set forth in any order, proposal, request for proposal, invoice, verbal agreement or otherwise, the terms and conditions of the articles of this Contract govern.

#### 23.0 SEVERABILITY

This Contract was drafted with the intent of complying with the Regulations and to the extent possible, will be interpreted in such manner as to be effective and valid under such Regulations. If any provision in this Contract is in clear violation of the Regulations, such provision will be unenforceable and removed from this Contract, with the other provisions remaining in full force and effect. In the event of such removal, the Parties will promptly negotiate in good faith, a lawful, valid and enforceable provision that is as similar as possible to the original provision. If the Parties are in conflict over whether a provision is in compliance with the Regulations, the disputing Party may immediately invoke the procedure set forth in Article 17.0.

The Contracting Officer is responsible for all administrative contractual matters and is the only Red Cross personnel permitted to modify this Contract or contractually commit the Red Cross.

#### 25.0 TAX EXEMPTION

The Red Cross is a not-for-profit, charitable corporation, exempt from the payment of federal excise taxes and state sales and use taxes. Contractor is responsible for requesting from the Red Cross any tax exemption numbers or certificates needed by Contractor.

#### 26.0 RED CROSS PROPERTY

Contractor will use reasonable care to avoid damaging existing buildings, equipment, and property at Red Cross sites ("Red Cross Real or Personal Property"). If Contractor damages Red Cross Real or Personal Property, it will replace or repair such Red Cross Real or Personal Property at no expense to the Red Cross, as directed by the Red Cross. If Contractor fails or refuses to make such repair or replacement, Contractor will be liable for the cost of such repair or replacement, which cost may be offset against payments due Contractor.

# Travel Reimbursement Policy for American National Red Cross Contractors And Consultants

Because The American National Red Cross (Red Cross) is supported by generous donations from the American public, contractors/consultants are required to limit their travel expenditures to levels that are commensurate with the charitable objectives of Red Cross.

The purpose of the following policy statement is to ensure that all contractors/consultants are reimbursed in a fair and equitable manner for all reasonable expenses that are incurred while traveling on behalf of Red Cross.

All expenses incurred by contractors/consultants while performing contracted services for Red Cross must be reasonable, actual (no-mark-up) and must be pre-approved by Red Cross in order for the contractor/consultant to receive reimbursement from Red Cross. All expenses must be separately invoiced to Red Cross. Receipts must be submitted for all expenses above \$25. Note: Contractors/consultants are not to use any Red Cross forms when seeking reimbursement.

Contractor/consultants are strongly encouraged to use the Red Cross travel agent (WorldTravel BTI) to book all pre-approved travel (air, rail, car, and hotel) when WorldTravel BTI offers the lowest price. WorldTravel BTI maybe reached at 877-292-9466.

#### Air/Rail Travel

Red Cross strongly encourages contractors/consultants who are traveling on business pursuant to a contract with Red Cross use WorldTravel BTI to book travel. WorldTravel BTI will make reservations for a contractor/consultant travel at the lowest logical airfare. The contractor/consultant should compare ticket costs between what they can obtain from their corporation and WorldTravel BTI and use the least expensive airfare.

Air/rail charges booked through WorldTravel BTI must be placed on the contractor's/consultant's credit card. All air/rail tickets issued through WorldTravel BTI are subject to a \$41.04 transaction fee. There are no transaction fees for information calls, schedules, or for air/rail, car, hotel reservations.

## **Authorized Class of Service**

Domestic

All domestic travel must be in Coach Class.

#### International

The most economical route must be utilized for all international travel. Red Cross contractor/consultants may upgrade from coach/economy to business class between the "international gateway" and their destination if the uninterrupted travel time from travel origin to first or next business destination exceeds eleven (11) hours or more and the business class travel is pre-approved by the Red Cross.

**Lowest Logical Air Fare** 

Contractors/consultants will be reimbursed using the lowest logical airfare. The "lowest logical airfare" is defined as the least costly airfare that uses a regularly scheduled commercial aircraft, using the following parameters:

- routing requires no more than one additional stop over or connection each way;
- departure/arrival must be no more than 2 hour(s) before or after requested time for flights;
- penalty and non-refundable fares must be used, and booked as soon as travel plans are firm. Timing is vital, as substantial savings are available on tickets purchased at least seven (7) to (21) days in advance.

#### and

 Contractors/consultants may elect to fly a non-stop flight provided that the additional cost is no more than \$100.00 USD per direction of travel.

Contractors/consultants should also consider taking advantage of savings opportunities that can be obtained using alternate regional airports.

Contractors/ consultants, who are traveling to the Washington, DC area on business pursuant to a contract with the Red Cross must call WorldTravel BTI and reserve rooms at one of the following hotels depending on the location of the place of performance of the services:

#### Outside the Washington Metropolitan Area

When traveling to a city where Red Cross has preferred hotels, WorldTravel BTI will book the contractor/consultant at the Red Cross preferred hotel. In the event that there is not a Red Cross preferred hotel, WorldTravel BTI will reserve rooms for the contractor/consultant using the Federal per diem as a guideline.

#### Meals

As with other business travel expenses, reimbursement for meals must be supported by adequate documentation including:

- Name(s), company affiliation(s) and business relationship(s) of all persons in attendance
  - Business purpose of meeting and nature of items discussed
    - Original, itemized receipts

Personal Meal Expenses - Personal meals are defined as reasonable meals incurred by the traveler when dining alone while on providing services for Red Cross.

Maximum Meal Reimbursement Guidelines - The actual cost of meals, including tips and taxes should generally not exceed \$40.00 per day. The following guidelines must be used:

- Breakfast \$8.00
- Lunch \$12.00
- Dinner \$20.00

#### **Ground Transportation**

Contractors/consultants who are traveling on business pursuant to a contract with Red must use the most economical and practical mode of transportation, giving due consideration to factors such as scheduling and distance, in addition to cost. Ground transportation should be shared whenever possible. In all cases, receipts are required for reimbursement.

To/From Airports and Terminals: Contractors/consultants should use the most economical mode of transportation to/from airports, rail terminals, and bus terminals.

Contractors/consultants should seek to use the following methods of local transportation:

- buses and subways (before taxis)
  - Red Cross shuttle services
- hotel and airport shuttle services

Rental Cars: Contractors/consultants may rent a car when other forms of transportation are impractical, more expensive, or not available. When traveling in groups, travelers must share cars.

- Rental Car Categories: Red Cross will reimburse Car rentals up to and including midsize.
- Refueling: To avoid excessive refueling charges at the rental company, cars should be returned to the car rental agency with a full tank.

Personal Vehicles: Personal vehicles should only be used when it is the most economical means of travel taking into account the extra time and expense involved when using a personal car for long distance travel (e.g., additional nights lodging, meals, mileage, etc.) versus the cost of air fare (the lowest applicable fare between the two points of travel), car rental fees, lodging, meals.

When driving on Red Cross business pursuant to a Red Cross contract, the contractor/consultant must carry a valid driver's license, vehicle registration, and proof of insurance.

 Mileage: Mileage is billed at the standard rate published by the IRS. Once at the Red Cross site or place of performance, local travel will not be reimbursed.

#### Miscellaneous

Phone Calls: Only long distance phone calls directly related to services provided under the Contract will be reimbursed.

Any other expenses must be pre-approved by Red Cross.

A \$10.00 transaction fee will be assessed each time a call is made to WorldTravel BTI's emergency number.

" Red Cross reserves the right to amend, revise, or modify this policy at any time for any reason, with or without notice.

# ATTACHMENT B SUBCONTRACTING CONDITIONS

- Contractor must ensure that all subcontractors approved by the Red Cross are bound by the terms of this
  Contract. Subcontractors must assume all obligations and responsibilities that the Contractor assumes toward
  the Red Cross.
- 2. Prior to the execution of any subcontract agreement, the Contractor must make available to each approved subcontractor a copy of this Contract to which the subcontractor will be bound. For purposes of any subcontracts entered into pursuant to this <a href="Attachment B">Attachment B</a>, the term "Contractor," as used in this Contract, will mean subcontractor, and the term "Red Cross" as used in this Contract, will mean Contractor, unless specified otherwise herein.
- 3. Each subcontract agreement must preserve and protect the rights of the Red Cross with respect to the Services provided by Contractor. Subcontractors must enter into similar agreements with its sub-subcontractors. The Red Cross retains the unrestricted right to review all subcontract agreements, or other documents pertaining to the retention of any subcontractor at any tier, for performance under this Contract, prior to the execution of such subcontract or other agreement.
- 4. The Contractor hereby assigns each subcontract agreement to the Red Cross in the event of a termination of such subcontract agreement provided that the Red Cross accepts such assignment by notifying the subcontractor in writing. Contractor must expressly provide for such assignment in all of its subcontract agreements.
- 5. The Contractor must require each Red Cross-approved subcontractor, if any, to procure and maintain insurance of the types and amounts required of Contractor in favor of Red Cross as required by this Contract. In addition, the subcontractors must sign the hold harmless agreement identical to that contained in this Contract, in favor of Red Cross.
- 6. Contractor agrees to include a provision in each of its subcontracts that allows the Red Cross or its designees access to any books, documents, papers or other records of the subcontractors related to this Contract for examination, for a period of two (2) years after the termination or expiration of this Contract.
- 7. Nothing in this Contract will be deemed to entitle subcontractors, materialmen or lower-tier subcontractors rights as third-party beneficiaries of this Contract. Notwithstanding any statement to the contrary, at all times, Contractor is responsible for all acts and/or omissions of its subcontractors.

Celebrity Outreach did not put out for bid the work for its National Celebrity Cabinet recruitment for several reasons:

- 1. Established Understanding of our Business This fall Celebrity Outreach will embark on recruiting for its third National Celebrity Cabinet. To effectively pitch celebrity representatives on our behalf requires a strong understanding of how the American Red Cross provides service as well as its issues and concerns as they relate to having celebrities represent the organization. To educate a contractor to a satisfactory level of knowledge such that they can negotiate for us is a time consuming endeavor. Paul Freundlich Associates (PFA) has managed our business in this area for several years. It would take us longer to accomplish our celebrity recruitment goals if we needed to first educate a firm less familiar with us on how we do business. With limited resources, we can not afford to contract with a firm for longer than six months. Because of PFAs familiarity with our organization, his team can deliver in the short time of the contract.
- 2. Fees Significantly Discounted For the first National Celebrity Cabinet, we paid the contractor, Rogers & Cowan, somewhere between \$10,000 and \$12,000 a month for services with no guarantee of delivery. PFA agreed to charge us \$6,000 a month and to deliver in six months. If they do not have a satisfactory recruitment of celebrities delivered in six months, they agree to keep working until they meet our deliverables. Other firms have not been so willing to accommodate our business.
- 3. Established Relationships in Small Community While there are hundreds of celebrities, the community of those who represent them is smaller because one agent often works for a cadre of celebrities. For two years we have been working through PFA to reach out to this community of celebrity representatives. There as been a rapport of

- 4. Representations and Warranties. Contractor represents and warrants to Red Cross that Contractor owns all rights in and to all intellectual property provided by Contractor to Red Cross in performance of this Agreement. Contractor further represents and warrants that such intellectual property does not and will not infringe any patent, copyright, trade secret, trademark, right of privacy or any other right of any third party.
- 5. <u>Termination.</u> Red Cross may terminate this Agreement at any time in the event Contractor is not performing the Services or delivering the Deliverables in a manner acceptable to Red Cross.
- 6. Liability and Indemnification. CONTRACTOR EXPRESSLY ACKNOWLEDGES AND AGREES THAT NEITHER RED CROSS, INCLUDING ITS CHARTERED UNITS, NOR ITS GOVERNORS, DIRECTORS, OFFICERS, EMPLOYEES, AGENTS AND VOLUNTEERS SHALL BE LIABLE IN ANY WAY, TO ANY PERSON OR ENTITY, IN CONNECTION WITH THIS AGREEMENT, INCLUDING BUT NOT LIMITED TO THE SERVICES TO BE PERFORMED HEREUNDER AND THE DELIVERABLES TO BE DELIVERED HEREUNDER. Contractor shall indemnify, defend and hold Red Cross harmless, including its chartered units, and its governors, directors, officers, employees, agents and volunteers from and against any and all suits, claims, demands, liabilities, damages, costs and expenses (including reasonable attorneys' fees) arising out of or relating in any way to this Agreement, including but not limited to a breach of any of Contractor's representations or warranties made in this Agreement or arising out of or in connection with alleged or actual infringement of any copyright, trademark, trade secret or any other intellectual property right used by Contractor in performance under this Agreement.

Both parties consent to and waive any objection to the jurisdiction and venue thereof.
- 10. Entire Agreement. This Agreement, including page 1 attached hereto and these Standard Terms and Conditions, constitutes the entire agreement between the parties relating to the subject matter of this Agreement and supersedes all prior and simultaneous representations, discussions, negotiations, and agreements, whether written or oral. This Agreement may only be amended or modified by a writing signed by both parties.

Because we offer a comprehensive level of international communications services, we would be pleased to offer you assistance in other matters as you may request over the course of this agreement. Any change in the terms and conditions of this agreement or engagement for additional services shall be mutually agreed upon in writing prior to performing those services.

#### 2. Performance Review:

We are committed to serving you and helping you achieve your desired results. We encourage you to review regularly with us any and all comments and suggestions you may have about our performance, and we will meet with you as frequently as you deem necessary to review performance.

# 3. Fleishman-Hillard's Dedication to Confidentiality and Commitment to Client Relationship Integrity:

Fleishman-Hillard Inc. ("FH") is a service company that offers its clients communications consulting across a wide array of practices and industries. Like other global agencies, FH often works for more than one company in any one industry sector. We understand that clients need assurances that their confidential information will be protected and that our work for multiple companies within an industry sector will not hinder our ability to provide effective representation.

Accordingly, FH approaches all client relationships with the following principles:

You may inspect, at the appropriate FH office, all correspondence, contracts, books, accounts, and other materials prepared or held by us that are directly related to our performance under this agreement. Inspections may be made during our normal business hours upon three days' prior written notice.

#### 5. Approvals, Accuracy of Information and Indemnification:

You shall have the sole responsibility for authorizing and approving the dissemination of all information and materials released on your behalf. You shall be solely responsible for the accuracy, completeness and legal compliance of the information about you that you provide or approve for our use.

We shall indemnify you against any and all losses, liabilities, damages, demands, settlements, judgments, costs and expenses, including reasonable attorneys' fees

(collectively, "Damages"), sustained as a result of any claim of libel, slander, defamation, copyright infringement, trademark or servicemark infringement, trade dress infringement, unfair competition, misappropriation of ideas, infliction of emotional distress, invasion of rights of privacy, or invasion of right of publicity arising from any materials prepared by FH on your behalf (collectively, "Materials Claims"); provided, however, the foregoing indemnification provision shall not apply to Materials Claims arising from any such materials that were approved by, or prepared based upon information provided by, you or any of your employees, agents, or independent contractors. You agree to indemnify us against any and all Damages sustained as a result of any Materials Claims arising from any such materials that were approved by, or prepared based upon information provided by, you or any of your employees, agents or independent contractors. In addition, we shall indemnify you against any and all Damages sustained as a result of our breach of this agreement or our negligence or intentional misconduct in connection with this agreement, and you shall indemnify us against any and all Damages sustained as a result of your breach of this agreement or your negligence or intentional misconduct in connection with this agreement. The foregoing indemnification provisions in favor of you and us are intended to extend to and cover your and our respective officers, directors, agents and employees.

#### 6. Outside Experts and Other Third Parties:

It may be appropriate in the course of our performance under this agreement to work with outside experts and other third parties hired by you or hired by us with your authorization. You agree to reimburse fees and expenses incurred by these persons, and we shall not be liable to you in any way for the acts or omissions of such third parties.

#### 7. Fees, Disbursements and Other Charges:

We are sensitive of the need to manage and control costs. It is our preference to work with budgets in which our fees for services are agreed upon in advance and made part of our agreement with you. You agree under this contract to reimburse us:

We strongly prefer that you contract directly with any third party vendors as needed for the services to be performed under this contract. In such case, you shall be billed directly by and submit payment directly to such third parties. Should you choose to have us contract directly with any other third parties, their invoices will be billed to you with a standard agency commission of 17.65 percent.

#### 8. Billing and Payment:

We want you to be satisfied with the quality of our services and the reasonableness of our bills, and we ask that you discuss with us any questions or comments you may have about fees, charges and/or the format of bills. Our fees and out-of-pocket expenses are due and payable on receipt of our invoice. We will bill on a monthly basis for fees, disbursements and related charges incurred in the preceding month. Where possible and with your agreement, we prefer to pre-bill you at the beginning of the month. You shall, within fifteen days of receipt, advise us of any dispute related to said invoice, or we shall deem the invoice accepted. While we make every effort to include all disbursements in the invoices for the period in which they were incurred, some costs are not available at the time of billing and must therefore be included in a later invoice.

#### 9. Non-Payment and Collection:

Failure to pay our invoices within 60 days after the date of invoice may, at our discretion, result in suspension of any or all service to you until payment is received, and may result in termination of the agreement. We shall incur no liability of any kind to you for such suspension or termination. We reserve the right to charge interest up to 18 percent per annum on all amounts more than 60 days outstanding. In the event that we must retain counsel or other services to enforce the contract or recover any sum due, you shall be responsible for all said costs and expenses including reasonable attorneys' fees.

#### 10. Force Majeure:

Neither party shall be responsible for its failure to perform due to causes beyond its reasonable control such as acts of God, fire, epidemics, theft, war, riot, embargoes, acts of civil or military authorities, or intervention by the federal, provincial, or local government. If services are to be delayed by such contingencies, the party requesting such a delay shall immediately notify the other party in writing. The party requesting the delay shall be responsible for all out-of-pocket expenses resulting from such delay.

#### 11. Limitation of Liability:

Notwithstanding anything to the contrary contained in this agreement, in no event shall either of us be liable to the other for any punitive, incidental, consequential, or other special damages in connection with any claim arising out of or related to this agreement.

#### 12. Termination:

We hope and trust that our relationship with you will be long and valued. Nevertheless, either of us may terminate our services for any reason with 15 days' prior written notice. You remain liable for all fees, disbursements and other related charges incurred up to the date of termination, as well as all amounts that we must pay to third

parties pursuant to non-cancelable agreements we entered into in performance of this contract. Provisions in the agreement related to payment, confidentiality, indemnification, dispute resolution and waiver shall survive termination of the agreement,

#### 13. Hiring of FH Staff Members:

Entertainment Outreach did not put out for bid the work for its television and film product and issue integration work for several reasons:

- 1. Established Understanding of our Business Bragman Nyman Cafarelli (BNC) has had our business for entertainment outreach for over two years. In that time they have learned about our mission, our issues and our preferred approach to entertainment outreach. We have an account person at the firm who has demonstrated her dedication to our account. She provides excellent customer service, represents the organization proudly and understands all the issues and information related to the American Red Cross. It would take several years to find another account representative at another firm that demonstrates such heartfelt commitment to our business while adeptly grasping our broad business and many issues.
- 2. Unyielding Time Constraints This summer, Entertainment Outreach needed to begin its efforts to gain television show product and plot involvements upon the productions' return from their hiatus. It is in July when productions begin working on their episodes for the new season that commences each year in September. To promote Red Cross to writers and producers in the hopes of gaining more visibility throughout the season, we needed to start when they did. Television season does not wait for anything and writers and producers are up against compelling and unyielding deadlines. We needed to get organized early to set our strategy and begin pitching the shows for time in their hectic schedules to come meet with them. Were we to put our entertainment outreach business out to bid at the conclusion of last television season, we would have missed out on many opportunities. Additionally, many films begin production once television season ends and we needed to have BNC in place to help us capitalize on those projects. Films have a

finite period in wh' to reach them for inclusion, so a bidd process could have resulted in many mussed projects.

- 3. Fees Discounted Over the past two years, we have gotten excellent service at a discount rate from BNC. They have agreed to do both our television and film business at a discounted rate from their regular fee. Additionally, they do not charge us for many administrative and other fees. They have worked with us to find ways we can operate at an economy level without compromising the excellence in the service. They have increasingly been willing to find ways to accommodate our business having had significant budget constraints since we started working together.
- 4. Established Relationships in Small Community The television and film industry is a small and tight community. Studios and productions want to have one reliable way to get what they need when they need it. They also want to work with people they trust respect their business demands and constraints. For us to gain acceptance within this tight community, we need a firm who has the relationships and does the job the right way. BNC with two years of service for us, has established themselves as the eyes and ears helping the American Red Cross in Hollywood. That helps opportunities open up to us as well has helps productions reach us more efficiently. With an established group representing us in this tight community, a change to a new vendor will create confusion and increase the likelihood that we miss out on opportunities because the contacts for us changed.

For the reasons above, we do not believe that putting this business out for bid would be to the best advantage for the organization. Given the specialty that is required for this type of work and our tight time constraints, the lengthy bidding process would significantly encumber our ability to deliver television and film opportunities for Red Cross. Moreover, we do not believe that another firm would offer a better price for the same caliber of service and accommodation our business requires.

- Services, Deliverables and Fees. Contractor agrees to perform the Services and/or deliver the Deliverables as specified on page 1 of this Agreement. - 2. No Assignment; Independent Contractors. Red Cross selected Contractor to perform the Services and/or deliver the Deliverables, as applicable, based upon Red Cross receiving Contractor's personal services, and therefore, Contractor may not subcontract or otherwise assign or delegate its obligations under this Agreement without the prior written consent of Red Cross. Contractor and Red Cross understand, acknowledge, and agree that the relationship of the parties shall in all respects be that of independent contractors.
- 3. Assignment of Intellectual Property. Contractor agrees that all intellectual property in the Deliverables and in the results of the Services performed hereunder shall belong to Red Cross. Contractor shall indemnify, defend and hold Red Cross harmless, including its chartered units, and its governors, directors, officers, employees, agents and volunteers from and against any and all suits, claims, demands, liabilities, damages, costs and expenses (including reasonable attorneys' fees) arising out of or relating in any way to this Agreement, including but not limited to a breach of any of Contractor's representations or warranties made in this Agreement or arising out of or in connection with alleged or actual infringement of any copyright, trademark, trade secret or any other intellectual property right used by Contractor in performance under this Agreement.

#### 7. Insurance.

Contractor shall maintain the following insurance policies for the term of this Contract: (1) A Commercial General Liability policy, endorsed to include Products and Completed Operations and Personal & Advertising Injury, with The American National Red Cross, its operating units, governors, officers, directors, agents, employees, volunteers, and invitees named as additional insureds, in the amount of at least \$500,000 combined single limit for each occurrence, written on an occurrence form (not "claims made form"); (2) An auto liability policy with statutory limits for each jurisdiction where the work is required under this Contract and (3) if applicable, Workers' Compensation coverage with statutory limits for each jurisdiction where the work required under this Contract is performed and an employers' liability policy.

For any work done under this contract outside of the United States or its territories, the following requirements shall also apply: The above policies shall be endorsed so that they will respond to claims brought in the courts of United States and of countries in which the work will be performed other than the United States or its territories.

#### TELEVISION AND FILM PRODUCT AND ISSUE PLACEMENT SERVICES

THE AMERICAN NATIONAL RED CROSS CONTRACTING OFFICE 2025 E STREET N.W. WASHINGTON, DC 20006 This Professional Services Contract ("Contract"), effective as of February 15, 2005 (the "Effective Date"), is made by and between The American National Red Cross, a charitable and not-for-profit corporation chartered by Congress, having an office at 2025 E Street, NW, Washington, DC 20006 (the "Red Cross") and Norm Marshall & Associates, Inc., a California corporation, having its principal place of business at 11059 Sherman Way, Sun Valley, CA 91352 ("Contractor").

The Red Cross desires to engage Contractor to provide certain television and film product placement and issue integration services as more fully described below and Contractor is willing to provide such television and film product placement services to the Red Cross upon the terms and conditions herein contained.

In consideration of the foregoing, of the promises contained in this Contract and of other good and valuable consideration, the Red Cross and Contractor (each, a "Party" and collectively, the "Parties") intending to be legally bound, agree as follows:

#### 1.0 SERVICES TO BE PROVIDED BY CONTRACTOR

- 1.1 Using its best skills and attention, the Contractor will provide to Red Cross pro-active and re-active product and plot integration services for television ("TV") and film visibility (collectively, "Services"), as more specifically described below in Sections 1.1 through 1.15. Contractor will endeavor to build public awareness of Red Cross services to a broad audience in the hopes of expanding fund-raising and support through blood donation, volunteerism and training course participation for the organization. Contractor will work to have Red Cross consistently part of disaster relief portrayals on TV and in films and to gain exposure for other lines of service ("LOS") thereby increasing relevance of the Red Cross mission to viewers young and old.
- 1.2 Definitions. For the sake of clarity, the following words shall have the following meanings when used in this Contract:
  - (A) "PRODUCTS" is defined as Red Cross brands, packaging, name, logo, advertising, (i.e. billboards, tag lines, commercials), identity or identifying materials.
  - (B) "<u>PLACEMENT</u>" is defined as a propping or clearance plot involvement opportunity made by Contractor to a production company for use of Products or portrayal of Red Cross services under the terms of this Contract.
  - (C) "PRODUCTION" is defined as a feature film, movie of the week or episode of a television series, special or other program.
  - (D) "VISIBILITY/(IES)" is defined as successful Placements confirmed by Contractor staff upon release or airing of a Production. Visibilities include both (i) visual exposure of a Product, (ii) oral references to Red Cross in a Production and/or (iii) plot involvement incorporating Red Cross services or functions in a Production.
- 1.3 Contractor will conduct a thorough review and understanding of the Red Cross brand, mission, LOS, LOS message sensitivities and constraints, organizational structure, strategic goals and initiatives, business priorities and supplied market research.
- 1.4 Contractor will develop a marketing plan for TV and film product placements, mentions and or issue integrations. This marketing plan will include creative and strategic guidance to accomplish TV and film visibility goals through tactics such as, but not limited to:
  - pitch kit/letter development
  - relationship building
  - TV/film property target list generation
  - coordination of meetings with film/show writers/production staff
  - coordination with production for materials or information delivery

- managing legal release process (required with every inclusion)
- identifying publicity opportunities beyond production such as cross-promotions with theatrical release, DVD release and/or film premiers.
- 1.5 Contractor understands that the objective of the Services provided is to:
  - Demonstrate Red Cross relevance to current and prospective supporters.
  - Increase awareness for the need to donate blood, time and money.
  - Build the Red Cross brand and re-establish an emotional connection to the work of the organization with a wide age-range of audiences (ages 18-65).
  - Create production relationships that demonstrate support for the Red Cross mission and are open to
    extending the placement beyond the production into broader publicity or visibility for Red Cross.
- 1.6 Product Integration Representation. The product integration services provided by Contractor to Red Cross include the following:
  - (A) Contractor will represent Red Cross to Production companies and Production personnel that are preparing for the filming of Productions. Contractor's express intent will be to influence said Production personnel to expose Red Cross, Products and Red Cross services in appropriate Productions.
  - (B) Contractor will, whenever possible, negotiate screen credits for Red Cross. Contractor must obtain Red Cross approval of all screen credits in substance and form.
  - (C) Contractor will review film scripts for positive Visibility opportunities.
  - (D) Contractor will review Red Cross Release Form ("Release Forms") (<u>Attachment A</u>) with Production companies and Production personnel as warranted. All final Release Forms will be reviewed and executed by Red Cross.
- 1.7 <u>Product Placement Guarantees.</u> Contractor guarantees that it will generate a minimum of five (5) Visibilities for Red Cross in Productions generated from Placements made by Contractor each year during the Term ("Visibility Guarantee"). Should Contractor under deliver the agreed number of actual Visibilities, Red Cross may, at its sole discretion, suspend Contractor's retainer payments. Contractor will continue to service the Red Cross account until the minimum number of Visibilities is achieved.
- 1.8 <u>Production Release Patterns</u>. Red Cross recognizes that Contractor has no control over the release pattern or airing of Productions. Red Cross recognizes that the average gestation period for a feature film production start to release can be as much as twenty-four (24) months. Accordingly, it is foreseeable that Visibilities will result in Productions released or airing subsequent to the term of this Contract and shall count toward the Visibility Guarantee defined above.
- 1.9 <u>Quarterly Reports.</u> Contractor will forward quarterly reports to Red Cross, or make these reports available on the Direct Data System (as defined below), detailing Contractor's efforts on behalf of Red Cross. Contractor reports will include the following information on Visibilities as it becomes available:
  - (A) Production in which Product was placed
  - (B) Star/Director
  - (C) Intended release mode (e.g., theater, cable, home video/dvd, network)
  - (D) Release date of Production
  - (E) Exposure time of Product in Production
  - (F) Still photographs and/or video clips
  - (G) Materials/Products placed
  - (H) Value of Product or issue placement accomplished
  - (I) Estimated national viewing audience
  - (J) Box office revenue (theatrical) and ad equivalent cost (TV)

- 1.10 <u>Annual Reports.</u> Contractor will produce a videotape highlighting Red Cross film and television Visibilities during the Term. Contractor will also produce a written year-end report detailing overall summary of Visibility and value of efforts for TV and film.
- 1.11 <u>Direct Data System.</u> Contractor will create and maintain a private, password-protected extranet website, herein referred to as "Direct Data System," for the purposes of reporting Contractor's activities to Red Cross. Red Cross will have access to the web site 24 hours a day, 7 days a week less required system downtime for maintenance and service upgrades. Direct Data System reporting of Contractor's activities will include a chronology of Contractor's interactions with Production, and will outline all activities and the status of all Placement opportunities. Contractor is required to update the Direct Data System weekly at a minimum.
- 1.12 Content Integration Fees. Red Cross recognizes that the placement of Red Cross Products and/or Red Cross involvement in major Productions can become competitive among other brands. Accordingly, in some instances in order to obtain a high profile Visibility of Red Cross in a major Production, Red Cross may choose to pay a "Content Integration Fee" to content rights holders (i.e. filmmakers, studios). In such cases, Contractor will negotiate the lowest possible fee on behalf of Red Cross and obtain Red Cross's written approval in advance of submitting an offer to the content rights holders. Red Cross recognizes that Contractor has no control over the release pattern or airing of Productions. Any outstanding obligations of Red Cross to make Content Integration Fee payments are guaranteed by Red Cross, as long as the Content Integration Fee is agreed to by Red Cross in writing, and shall survive the term of this Contract. Contractor will seek out Content Integration Fee opportunities for Red Cross as part of Contractor's Services. However, Contractor's negotiation, management and execution of such opportunities may be subject to additional "Content Integration Management Fees." All Content Integration Management Fees shall be quoted by Contractor and authorized in writing by Red Cross prior to submission of Content Integration Fee offers to content rights holders. Contractor understands that Red Cross is a non-profit organization and does not make it a practice to pay Content Integration Fees, and in light of such, will make all attempts to negotiate the placement of Red Cross Products and Red Cross involvements in Productions as a public service promotion with no required Content Integration Fees.
- 1.13 <u>Collateral materials</u>. Red Cross will establish a budget for product and collateral materials to be used by Contractor as incentive for film companies to expose Red Cross Products in their films, the amount of which shall be in the sole discretion of Red Cross.
- 1.14 Inventory Levels. Red Cross agrees to provide Contractor inventory support for specific items as deemed appropriate and agreed to in writing by Contractor and Red Cross for distribution from Contractor warehousing locations. Red Cross will use commercially reasonable efforts to make sure the level of Product inventory available is sufficient and updated for propping and supply needs of Production companies. Specific items of inventory may include posters, other printed collateral or props. Items such as, but not limited to, uniforms, signage, hard hats and identification items will be supplied to Production companies by Red Cross on an as needed basis.
- 1.15 Return of Product. Contractor will use commercially reasonable efforts to ensure that Products used for Placement are returned to Red Cross at the end of use less an anticipated attrition rate of 10 20%, (ii) For hygienic purposes, all clothing, personal care and first aid Products offered to Productions are considered gifts. Any inventory of this nature not distributed to Productions will be returned to Red Cross. Additional items not requiring return to Red Cross will be agreed upon with Contractor in writing prior to release for Production. At the termination of this Contract, Contractor will ensure that any inventory remaining at Contractor's warehousing locations will be returned to Red Cross.

Sections 1.1 through 1.15 shall collectively be referred to as "Services."

#### 2.0 TASK ORDERS

Additional marketing services and project work outside of the scope of this Contract will be performed in accordance with an executed task order in substantially the same format as set forth in <u>Attachment B</u> ("Task Order").

- 2.2.1 Upon Contractor's receipt of a request for a Task Order by the Red Cross Administrative Representative, Rachel Bonistalli, telephone number 202-303-4222, e-mail address BonistallR@usa.redcross.org ("AR") the Contractor shall provide the Red Cross AR with a written proposal that details the services and deliverables Contractor offers to provide in response to the Task Order.
- 2.2.2 Based upon the AR's Task Order request and the Contractor's written proposal, the Contracting Officer (as defined in Section 24.2) will develop a Task Order for execution by the Parties.
- 2.2.3 Upon the execution of the Task Order by both Parties, the Contractor shall commence and complete the services and deliverables required by the Task Order in accordance with requirements set forth in the Task Order.
- 2.2.4 Red Cross will not pay the Contractor for any services performed outside of the scope of this Contract, prior to the execution of a Task Order.
- 2.2.5 Contractor understands and acknowledges that all Task Orders will be awarded based on the above procedure and there is no guarantee that any Task Order will be issued to the Contractor pursuant to this Contract.

#### 3.0 PLACE OF PERFORMANCE

The place of performance for this Contract is Contractor's place of business. Travel expenses will be reimbursed as out of pocket expenses as outlined in <u>Section 6.0</u>. Any additional travel expenses must be approved by Red Cross in writing and are only reimbursable in accordance with the Red Cross Travel Reimbursement Policy Attachment <u>C</u>.

#### 4.0 ACCEPTANCE

The Red Cross will approve, or disapprove with written modifications, the Services performed in accordance with the criteria and terms set forth in this Contract. The Red Cross reserves the sole and exclusive right to determine the acceptability of the Services provided by Contractor. Unacceptable Services will be corrected at no additional cost to the Red Cross.

#### 5.0 TERM AND TERMINATION

- 5.1 This Contract will begin on February 15, 2005 and expire on February 14, 2006 unless otherwise terminated sooner in accordance with this Contract (the "Term").
- 5.2 The Red Cross and Contractor may mutually agree to extend the Term of this Contract for an additional year by written notice to Contractor within thirty (30) days of the expiration of the Term ("Extension"). The Extension period is subject to the terms and conditions of this Contract, including without limitation, this Section 5.2. The total duration of this Contract, including the exercise of any options under this clause, may not exceed three (3) years.
- 5.3 Either Party may terminate this Contract or any Task Order, in whole or in part, by providing sixty (60) days' prior written notice of its intention to terminate to the other Party. The liability of the Red Cross for such termination will be limited to payment for Services performed as of the effective date of termination.

- 5.4 Either Party may terminate this Contract or any Task Order, in whole or in part, if the other has failed to fulfill any one of its obligations under this Contract (the "Breaching Party"). In the event the Breaching Party is the Contractor, the Red Cross must provide thirty (30) days written notice to allow the Contractor to cure the breach. In the event the Breaching Party is the Red Cross, Contractor must provide thirty (30) days written notice to allow the Red Cross to cure the breach. The Contract will terminate if the Breaching Party fails to cure the breach after the expiration of the requisite cure period.
- 5.5 If any of the Regulations (as defined in Section 8.1.1 below) is amended in a way that precludes a Party from lawfully performing its obligations under this Contract or any Task Order, either Party may terminate this Contract or any Task Order effective upon the effective date of such amended Regulation.
- 5.6 The Red Cross may terminate this Contract or any Task Order as set forth in Section 16.1.
- 5.7 In the event this Contract or any Task Order is terminated, Contractor agrees to immediately cease all Services and turn over all finished and unfinished deliverables to the Red Cross.
- 5.8. The rights and remedies provided in this section are not exclusive and are in addition to any other rights and remedies provided by the Regulations or this Contract.
- 5.9 Unless otherwise provided in this Contract, In the event of any termination or expiration of this Contract, Section 5.9 and Articles 8.0, 9.0, 10.0, 11.0, 12.0, 13.0, 14.0, 15.0, 17.0, 18.0 and 22.0 will survive indefinitely.

#### 6.0 COMPENSATION AND INVOICES

- 6.1 In consideration of Contractor's provision of Services, Red Cross shall pay Contractor:
  - \$6000.00 per month as a retainer for Services as described in this Contract ("Retainer").
  - In addition to the Retainer, Red Cross will reimburse Contractor a maximum amount of \$8,400 per year for out of pocket expenses. Out of pocket expenses include, but are not limited to, shipping and courier costs, collateral material costs (i.e. signage artwork, customized props that cannot be constructed or designed by the filmmaker), travel and incidental costs incurred by Contractor hereunder. All such expenses greater than five hundred dollars (\$500.00) will require Red Cross written approval in advance of expenditure.

Additional marketing services and project work outside of the scope of this Contract will be performed and paid for in accordance with an executed Task Order.

Contractor will not receive more than \$80,400.00 during the Term for Services rendered in accordance with this Contract. Additional marketing services may be added as individual Task Orders and will not exceed an additional amount of \$19,600.00. Notwithstanding the foregoing, Contractor will not receive more than \$100,000 for all Services rendered in accordance with this Contract and all services and deliverables rendered in accordance with all Task Orders issued under this Contract.

6.2 Contractor must submit invoices to the Red Cross before payment will be made. To ensure prompt payment, Contractor will submit an invoice to the following address:

Each invoice must contain the following information:

- Contractor's name and address
- The Contract and/or purchase order number
- Task Order number
- Project name

- A description of the Services and/or deliverables and the dates of performance or delivery
- · Payment terms
- Any additional information required by this Contract
- 6.3 The Red Cross will make payment to Contractor within forty-five (45) days of the receipt of an accurate invoice.
- 6.4 Contractor agrees that submission of an invoice to the Red Cross for payment is a certification that all Services and/or deliverables reflected on such invoice were performed in accordance with this Contract and any applicable Task Order(s).

#### 7.0 DELAY; FORCE MAJEURE

- 7.1 Contractor must notify the Red Cross, in writing, immediately upon learning, or otherwise becoming aware, of any unusual and extraordinary difficulties that may delay the delivery of Services and/or deliverables. Such notification must identify the reason for the delay, as well as the anticipated period of delay. Failure to provide timely notice to the Red Cross will disqualify Contractor from receiving:
  - 7.1.1 any extension of time to perform the Services or provide the deliverables, or,
  - 7.1.2 any additional compensation that may arise out of the Contractor spending any additional time to perform the Services or provide the deliverables as a result of the delay.
- 7.2 Each Party may be excused, without penalty, from any delay in performance or from failure to perform in accordance with this Contract or any Task Order issued hereunder, to the extent that such delay or failure results from causes beyond the reasonable control of such Party, and without fault or omission. Such excusable delays include, but are not limited to, delays caused by fires, floods, epidemics, quarantine restrictions, acts of terrorism, strikes, freight embargoes and unusually severe weather conditions. If such excusable delay extends beyond thirty (30) days either Party may terminate this Contract, or the applicable Task Order, immediately upon written notice to the other Party, without additional cost or penalty.

#### 8.0 REPRESENTATIONS, WARRANTIES AND COVENANTS

- 8.1 Contractor hereby represents, warrants and covenants that:
  - 8.1.1 All Services performed and deliverables provided pursuant to this Contract and any Task Order will conform to the requirements of the Task Order, this Contract, and the highest standards observed in the industry for similar services and deliverables, as well as any and all applicable and then-current laws, rules and regulations ("Regulations").
  - 8.1.2 It will use commercially reasonable efforts to perform all Services and provide all deliverables in a timely and professional manner by qualified professional personnel.
  - 8.1.3 The Services performed and deliverables provided under this Contract do not and will not contain any libelous material, or, infringe upon or violate any Regulations (including without limitation, patent, copyright, trademark, moral rights, semiconductor chip protection or unfair competition law); any license; proprietary information; non-disclosure, trade secret, intellectual property or other right of any third party; or right of privacy.
- 8.2 If the deliverables, materials or information, including any components of the deliverables, materials, or information may or actually become the subject of an intellectual property infringement claim ("Infringing Deliverables"), Contractor may:

- 8.2.1 substitute the Infringing Deliverables with similar modifications that are satisfactory to the Red Cross, or
- 8.2.2 obtain the right for the Red Cross to continue using the Infringing Deliverables. If the use of the Infringing Deliverables by the Red Cross is prevented by a permanent court action, or, if Contractor cannot obtain the right for Red Cross to continue using the Infringing Deliverables at a reasonable cost, then Contractor agrees to take the Infringing Deliverables and refund the total amount the Red Cross has paid Contractor under the applicable Task Order, less one percent (1%). Contractor will provide payment to the Red Cross in immediately available funds to the address provided by the AR within thirty (30) days after the Parties determine that such refund is warranted.

#### 8.3 Each Party agrees that:

- 8.3.1 it is organized, validly existing and in good standing under the Regulations of the jurisdiction in which it was organized,
- 8.3.2 this Contract, and all Task Orders, when executed and delivered by it, will be the legal, valid and binding obligation of it, enforceable against it in accordance with the terms,
- 8.3.3 the execution, delivery and performance of this Contract or any Task Order by it do not and will not (i) conflict with, or constitute a breach or default under its incorporation documents or any material agreement, contract, commitment, or instrument to which it is a party or (ii) require the consent, approval or authorization of, or notice, declaration, filing or registration with, any third party or any governmental or regulatory authority, and
- 8.3.4 it has not previously granted and will not grant any rights to any third party (including a subcontractor of Contractor) which are inconsistent with the rights granted herein.
- 8.4 Red Cross hereby represents and warrants that Red Cross owns all right, title and interest (or has the right to grant licenses to) all Products provided to Contractor by Red Cross for Placement purposes. Red Cross acknowledges that it is Red Cross' sole responsibility to obtain any necessary licenses, releases or permissions associated with Products provided to Contractor by Red Cross under this Contract.

#### 9.0 OWNERSHIP OF MATERIALS

Anything prepared by the Contractor pursuant to this Contract or any Task Order issued under this Contract, including without limitation, the deliverables, market research materials, tracking reports, market strategies, reports, materials, manuals, studies, photographs, negatives, creative slides, placement alerts, pitch kits, pitch letters/materials or other documents ("Materials") are the exclusive property of the Red Cross. Materials will not include (i) any of Contractor's proprietary systems, databases or technology adapted by Contractor for Red Cross ("NMA Proprietary System") (excluding any Red Cross data or content contained in the NMA Proprietary System), and (ii) any Third Party Property or opportunities presented by Contractor to Red Cross. The Red Cross has unlimited rights in such Materials, including without limitation, the right to use, duplicate, or disclose the Materials for any purpose (and to permit others to do so). Contractor will not use or allow the use of the Materials for any purpose other than the Contractor's performance pursuant to the Contract or applicable Task Order, without the prior written consent of the Red Cross. Upon request, Contractor will return all Materials to the Red Cross on or before the completion, expiration or termination of this Contract or the applicable Task Order.

#### 10.0 INTELLECTUAL PROPERTY

10.1 Contractor agrees that the Red Cross will own all right, title and interest in and to the Materials (including elements thereof and derivative works) created by Contractor pursuant to this Contract or any Task Orders issued

under this Contract, all elements thereof, and all derivative works ("Property"). Property will not include (i) the NMA Proprietary System (excluding any Red Cross data or content contained in the NMA Proprietary System), and (ii) any Third Party Property or opportunities presented by Contractor to Red Cross. All right, title and interest in and to the Property is vested solely and exclusively in the Red Cross. Contractor has no residual rights in the Property. Contractor agrees that all works capable of being copyrighted that are created by Contractor, either solely or jointly with others, pursuant to this Contract, are "works made for hire" as contemplated by and defined in Federal copyright Regulations. Contractor agrees to transfer, convey, and assign in perpetuity to the Red Cross, any and all rights, title, and interest that Contractor may have in the works that may be copyrighted.

- 10.2 Contractor will notify Red Cross when it incorporates any third-party materials or third party intellectual property (collectively, "Third Party Property") with any limitations, into any Materials or Property provided to the Red Cross. For the avoidance of doubt, unless otherwise stated in writing by Contractor, all scripts, script synopsis, film clips, production and release schedules, and all other studio and production materials provided by Contractor to Red Cross are Third Party Property. Red Cross acknowledges that unauthorized use of Third Party Property may infringe rights of third parties not owned or affiliated with Contractor. At Red Cross's direction, Contractor will assist Red Cross in its efforts to secure any and all necessary sublicenses or direct licenses for the Third Party Property in the name of the Red Cross, to be held by the Red Cross in perpetuity.
- 10.3 Contractor will not use, allow, or cause to have Property used for any purpose other than performance of Contractor's obligations under this Contract or a Task Order issued under this Contract, without the prior written consent of the Red Cross. Contractor will not release, reproduce, distribute, or publish any Property first produced in the performance of this Contract or a Task Order issued under this Contract or assigned herein to the Red Cross, nor authorize others to do so, without prior written permission of the Red Cross.
- 10.4 Contractor will assist Red Cross, at the expense of the Red Cross, to obtain and enforce all patents, copyrights, trade secrets, and all other intellectual property rights in and to the Property in all countries in order to benefit the Red Cross. Contractor agrees to execute, when requested, patent, copyright, or similar applications and assignments and any other documents deemed necessary by the Red Cross in order to vest ownership of Property in the Red Cross. Contractor's obligation under this Section 10.3 will survive termination or expiration of the Contract and the applicable Task Order.

#### 11.0 ACCESS TO CONTRACTOR'S FILES

- 11.1 Contractor will provide the Red Cross and its agents access to all files, accounts, records, contracts and other documents related to this Contract upon thirty (30) days prior notice during the Term and for the longer of two (2) years after expiration or termination of the Term, or, the time period required by the Regulations.
- 11.2 The obligations set forth in this <u>Article 11.0</u> are supplemental to any federal or state legal requirements and should not be read to be in lieu thereof.

#### 12.0 INDEPENDENT CONTRACTOR

Contractor is furnishing its Services hereunder as an independent contractor, and nothing herein creates any association, partnership or joint venture between the parties hereto or any employer-employee relationship.

#### 13.0 INDEMNITY AND HOLD HARMLESS

13.1 Red Cross shall indemnify, defend and hold harmless Contractor, its officers, directors, employees and agents from and against all suits, claims, demands, liabilities, damages, costs and expenses (including reasonable attorneys' fees) resulting from a third party claim of infringement for Contractor's authorized use of Products provided to Contractor by Red Cross under this Contract.

13.2 Contractor shall indemnify, defend and hold harmless Red Cross, its governors, officers, directors, agents, employees, volunteers and their respective successors and assigns (the "Red Cross Indemnitees") from and against all losses, liabilities, suits, claims, costs, expenses (including reasonable attorneys' fees and court costs) demands, fines, penalties, judgments, damages and causes of action that may be or are asserted or claimed against Red Cross Indemnitees, or incurred by the Red Cross Indemnitees, that:
(i) arise from, or is attributable to, any act or omission of Contractor, its subcontractors or material suppliers (at any tier) or their respective directors, officers, employees and agents in connection herewith, or; (ii) result from any breach or violation by Contractor, its directors, officers, employees or agents of any representation, warranty or covenant made herein or in connection with this Contract or (iii) involve an allegation of infringement of any patent, trademark, copyright, or other intellectual property right or trade secret of a third party as well as any allegation of libel, slander, invasion of privacy, any failure to obtain a necessary release, permission or clearance, or any other cause of action or claim arising out of the Materials, Property or deliverables, and elements thereof, provided by Contractor to Red Cross under this Contract.

#### 14.0 INSURANCE

- 14.1 Contractor will maintain the following insurance policies in full force and effect for the term of this Contract and thereafter for not less than one (1) year:
  - 14.1 1 a Commercial General Liability policy endorsed to include Products and Completed Operations Liability and Personal & Advertising Injury Liability with the Red Cross Indemnitees as additional insureds; the amount of the policy will be at least \$1,000,000 combined single limit for each occurrence and; this will be written on an occurrence form (not "claims made form");
  - 14.1.2 a Professional Liability Insurance policy (Errors and Omissions Insurance) in an amount not less than \$1,000,000 each claim insuring claims arising from performance of Services to the Red Cross as defined in this Contract and related material, including, but not limited to, coverage for all expenses, including attorney's fees, incurred in the investigation, negotiation, arbitration, and defense of any suit or claim for damages including lost earnings of the Red Cross;
  - 14.1.3 an auto liability policy including coverage for owned, non-owned and hired vehicles and uninsured and under-insured motorists coverage in an amount not less than \$1,000,000 with the Red Cross Indemnitees as additional insureds; and
  - 14.1.4 a Workers' Compensation policy covering all employees provided under this Contract and having statutory limits for each jurisdiction where the work required under this Contract is performed, and an Employers' Liability policy with at least the following limits, \$250,000 per accident, \$500,000 per disease and 250,000 per disease (each employee).
- 14.2 Contractor will, at its sole expense, keep in force valid and enforceable policies of insurance as specified in this Contract and as required by statute, with carriers currently rated by A.M. Best at A+10 or higher and licensed in the states in which the work of this Contract is being carried out, and such policies will be written as primary policy coverage and not contributing with, or in excess of any insurance coverage which the Red Cross may maintain. Contractor will provide the Red Cross with such certificates of insurance evidencing all of the above coverages and conditions (types and amounts) prior to the commencement of work, and renewal certificates within ten days of expiration or non-renewal of the policies required; in the "Cancellation Clause" the certificate will provide for not less than thirty (30) days prior written notice to the Red Cross of non-renewal of policies, cancellation or material change in the coverage provided which reduces the amount, terms or conditions below that required herein, prior to the date of such non-renewal, cancellation or change.

#### 15.0 CONFIDENTIALITY; TRADE NAMES; LOGOS

- 15.1 Obligation. Each Party (the "Recipient") shall at all times keep secret and confidential (and shall not disclose, disseminate, transfer, reveal or otherwise make available to any third party) and shall not use for its own purposes any business, operational, technical or commercial information clearly identified in writing as "Confidential" ("Confidential Information") disclosed directly or indirectly, whether orally or in writing or in any physical or visual form, to it by the other Party (the "Disclosing Party") or otherwise belonging to the Disclosing Party and disclosed during the term of this Contract. Confidential Information shall include all information of a confidential or proprietary nature, clearly identified in writing as "Confidential," and regarding (without limitation) trade secrets, Third Party Materials, advertising matters, ideas, plans, techniques, accounts, Products, business, customers, methods of operation, Production scripts or materials.
- 15.2 Exceptions. The obligation of confidentiality contained in Paragraph 15.1 shall not apply or (as the case may be) shall cease to apply to Confidential Information which:
  - (A) is in the public domain at the time of disclosure or becomes part of the public domain without breach of this Contract by the Recipient; or
  - (B) is required to be disclosed by order of a court of law or appropriately empowered government agency or competent authority without similar restrictions or other protections against public disclosure; or
  - (C) is approved in writing for disclosure by the Disclosing Party, providing that the actual disclosure is in accordance with the approved disclosure; or
  - (D) was properly in the possession of the Recipient at the time of disclosure; or
  - (E) subsequent to disclosure by the Disclosing Party, the Confidential Information is (i) received by the Recipient from a third party having the legal right to transfer such Confidential Information without the obligation to maintain confidentiality, or (ii) independently developed by the Recipient without reference to the Disclosing Party's disclosure.

#### 16.0 CONFLICT OF INTEREST

- 16.1 Contractor represents that there is no conflict of interest arising from the Services or deliverables to be provided pursuant to the Contract or the Task Orders issued under this Contract. Contractor will immediately notify Red Cross if any potential or perceived conflict arises. Red Cross reserves the right to terminate this Contract, or the applicable Task Order, in accordance with <u>Section 5.6</u> without cost to Red Cross if Red Cross determines that a conflict exists.
- 16.2 Section 16.1 above notwithstanding, the Red Cross acknowledges that the Contractor's business involves providing services to other organizations similar to the Services to be provided to Red Cross under this Contract. Therefore, the fact that Contractor will continue to provide similar services to commercial and non-profit entities will not in and of itself constitute a conflict of interest under this Contract; however, Contractor acknowledges and agrees that a conflict of interest arises immediately upon Contractor performing any types of placement and integration services to, or for, the Salvation Army, United Way, Goodwill Industries, World Wildlife Fund, Second Harvest, Share Our Strength, St. Jude's Children's Research Hospital, Department of Homeland Security (DHS), Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) and National Transportation Safety Board (NTSB), and Red Cross may determine, in its sole and absolute discretion, to terminate this Contract based on such conflict(s) of interest.

#### 17.0 DISPUTES

In the event that the Parties are unable to resolve any dispute arising between them, the Parties hereby agree to resolve such dispute by arbitration conducted in accordance with the Commercial Arbitration Rules of the American Arbitration Association. If the dispute is filed by Contractor, the place of arbitration shall be

Washington, District of Columbia. If the dispute is filed by Red Cross, the place of arbitration shall be Los Angeles, California. The arbitration panel will consist of three arbitrators, one arbitrator appointed by each of the Parties, and the third arbitrator appointed by the two appointed arbitrators (the "Panel"). The Panel may, at its discretion, provide for discovery by the Parties not to exceed a period of sixty (60) days from the date of filing of the notice of arbitration.

#### 18.0 GOVERNING LAW

This Contract will be governed by the laws of the Commonwealth of Virginia applicable to contracts made and to be performed entirely within such jurisdiction and without giving effect to its choice or conflict of law rules or principles.

#### 19.0 ASSIGNMENT AND SUBCONTRACTING

19.1 Neither this Contract, nor any Task Order issued hereunder, may be assigned by either Party without the express prior written consent of the other Party. Any attempted assignment without such consent will be null and void and of no effect.

#### 20.0 EQUAL EMPLOYMENT OPPORTUNITY

In connection with the performance of Services under this Contract or any Task Order, the Contractor will not discriminate against any employee or applicant for employment because of age, disability, race, religion, color, national origin, sex or any other characteristic protected by the Regulations. The Contractor agrees to abide by all federal, state and local employment and labor law notice posting requirements.

#### 21.0 ENTIRE AGREEMENT AND MODIFICATIONS

This Contract, including all Task Orders, constitutes the entire agreement between the Parties as to the subject matter hereof and supersedes all prior verbal and written agreements. There will be no amendment, modification or waiver of any of the terms and conditions hereof unless in writing and executed by both Parties. Any prior oral or written agreements or proposals are not considered a part of this Contract.

provision. If the Parties are in conflict over whether a provision is in compliance with the Regulations, the disputing Party may immediately invoke the procedure set forth in <u>Article 17.0.</u>

#### Travel Reimbursement Policy for American National Red Cross Contractors And Consultants

Because The American National Red Cross (Red Cross) is supported by generous donations from the American public, contractors/consultants are required to limit their travel expenditures to levels that are commensurate with the charitable objectives of Red Cross.

The purpose of the following policy statement is to ensure that all contractors/consultants are reimbursed in a fair and equitable manner for all reasonable expenses that are incurred while traveling on behalf of Red Cross.

All expenses incurred by contractors/consultants while performing contracted services for Red Cross must be reasonable, actual (no-mark-up) and must be pre-approved by Red Cross in order for the contractor/consultant to receive reimbursement from Red Cross. All expenses must be separately invoiced to Red Cross. Receipts must be submitted for all expenses above \$35. Note: Contractors/consultants are not to use any Red Cross forms when seeking reimbursement.

Contractor/consultants are strongly encouraged to use the Red Cross travel agent (WorldTravel BTI) to book all pre-approved travel (air, rail, car, and hotel) when WorldTravel BTI offers the lowest price. WorldTravel BTI maybe reached at 877-292-9466.

#### Air/Rail Travel

Red Cross strongly encourages contractors/consultants who are traveling on business pursuant to a contract with Red Cross use WorldTravel BTI to book travel. WorldTravel BTI will make reservations for a contractor/consultant travel at the lowest logical airfare. The contractor/consultant should compare ticket costs between what they can obtain from their corporation and WorldTravel BTI and use the least expensive airfare.

Air/rail charges booked through WorldTravel BTI must be placed on the contractor's/consultant's credit card. All air/rail tickets issued through WorldTravel BTI are subject to a \$41.04 transaction fee. There are no transaction fees for information calls, schedules, or for air/rail, car, hotel reservations.

#### **Authorized Class of Service**

#### Domestic

All domestic travel must be in Coach Class.

#### International

The most economical route must be utilized for all international travel. Red Cross contractor/consultants may upgrade from coach/economy to business class between the "international gateway" and their destination if the uninterrupted travel time from travel origin to first or next business destination exceeds eleven (11) hours or more and the business class travel is pre-approved by the Red Cross.

#### Lowest Logical Air Fare

Contractors/consultants will be reimbursed using the lowest logical airfare. The "lowest logical airfare" is defined as the least costly airfare that uses a regularly scheduled commercial aircraft, using the following parameters:

- · routing requires no more than one additional stop over or connection each way;
- departure/arrival must be no more than 2 hour(s) before or after requested time for flights;
- penalty and non-fundable fares must be used, and booked as soon as travel plans are firm. Timing is vital, as substantial savings are available on tickets purchased at least seven (7) to (21) days in advance.

• Contractors/consultants may elect to fly a non-stop flight provided that the additional cost is no more than \$100.00 USD per direction of travel.

Contractors/consultants should also consider taking advantage of savings opportunities that can be obtained using alternate regional airports.

When traveling to a city where Red Cross has preferred hotels, WorldTravel BTI will book the contractor/consultant at the Red Cross preferred hotel. In the event that there is not a Red Cross preferred hotel, WorldTravel BTI will reserve rooms for the contractor/consultant using the Federal per diem as a guideline.

#### Meals

As with other business travel expenses, reimbursement for meals must be supported by adequate documentation including:

- Name(s), company affiliation(s) and business relationship(s) of all persons in attendance
- Business purpose of meeting and nature of items discussed
- Original, itemized receipts

Personal Meal Expenses - Personal meals are defined as reasonable meals incurred by the traveler when dining alone while on providing services for Red Cross.

Maximum Meal Reimbursement Guidelines - The actual cost of meals, including tips and taxes should generally not exceed \$35.00 per day. The following guidelines must be used:

- Breakfast \$7.00
- Lunch \$10.00
- Dinner \$18.00

#### **Ground Transportation**

Contractors/consultants who are traveling on business pursuant to a contract with Red must use the most economical and practical mode of transportation, giving due consideration to factors such as scheduling and distance, in addition to cost. Ground transportation should be shared whenever possible. In all cases, receipts are required for reimbursement.

To/From Airports and Terminals: Contractors/consultants should use the most economical mode of transportation to/from airports, rail terminals, and bus terminals. Contractors/consultants should seek to use the following methods of local transportation:

- buses and subways (before taxis)
- Red Cross shuttle services
- hotel and airport shuttle services

- Red Cross Preferred Vendor: Avis
- Rental Car Categories: Red Cross will reimburse Car rentals up to and including mid-size.
- Refueling: To avoid excessive refueling charges at the rental company, cars should be returned to the car rental agency with a full tank.

Personal Vehicles: Personal vehicles should only be used when it is the most economical means of travel taking into account the extra time and expense involved when using a personal car for long distance travel (e.g., additional nights lodging, meals, mileage, etc.) versus the cost of air fare (the lowest applicable fare between the two points of travel), car rental fees, lodging, meals.

When driving on Red Cross business pursuant to a Red Cross contract, the contractor/consultant must carry a valid driver's license, vehicle registration, and proof of insurance.

Mileage: Mileage is billed at the standard rate published by the IRS. Once at the Red Cross site
or place of performance, local travel will not be reimbursed.

Phone Calls: Only long distance phone calls directly related to services provided under the Contract will be reimbursed.
