SUBCOMMITTEE APPROVES TSUNAMI PREPAREDNESS BILL -

By voice vote, the Subcommittee on Environment, Technology, and Standards today passed H.R. 1674, U.S. Tsunami Warning and Education Act of 2005. No amendments were offered. The legislation was introduced by Science Committee Chairman Sherwood Boehlert, R-N.Y., Rep. Jay Inslee, D-Wash., Environment, Technology, and Standards Subcommittee Chairman Vernon J. Ehlers, R-Grand Rapids, and Subcommittee Ranking Minority Member David Wu, D-Ore.

THIS WEEK IN THE U.S. HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES MONDAY, APRIL 25, 2005

On Monday, the House will meet at 12:00 p.m. in Pro Forma session.

TUESDAY, APRIL 26, 2005

On Tuesday, the House will meet at 12:30 p.m. for morning hour and 2:00 p.m. for legislative business. Votes will be postponed until 6:30 p.m.

Suspensions (10 bills):

(Bills on suspension are generally considered non-controversial and have reduced debate time, but require a two-thirds majority vote to be passed.)

1) H.R. 1158 - To reauthorize the Steel and Aluminum Energy Conservation and Technology Competitiveness Act of 1988

2) H.R. 28 - High-Performance Computing Revitalization Act of 2005

This bill requires the Director of the Office of Science and Technology Policy to: (1) establish the goals and priorities for Federal high-performance computing research, development, networking, and other activities; (2) establish Program Component Areas that implement such goals and identify the Grand Challenges (i.e., fundamental problems in science or engineering, with broad economic and scientific impact, whose solutions will require the application of high-performance computing resources) that the Program should address; and (3) develop and maintain a research, development, and deployment road map for the provision of high-performance computing systems.

It requires the advisory committee on high-performance computing to conduct periodic evaluations of the funding, management, coordination, implementation, and activities of the Program, and report at least once every two fiscal years to specified congressional committees.

- 3) H.Con.Res. 96 Recognizing the significance of African American women in the United States scientific community
- 4) H.Con.Res. 41 Recognizing the second century of Big Brothers Big Sisters, and supporting the mission and goals of that organization
- 5) H.R. 1236 Mayor Tony Armstrong Memorial Post Office Designation Act (Sparks, Nevada)
- 6) H.R. 1524 Ed Eilert Post Office Building Designation Act (Overland Park, Kansas)
- 7) H.Res. 227 Recognizing and honoring the contributions of American Indians to economic innovation and society generally
- 8) H.R. 902 Presidential \$1 Coin Act of 2005

This bill directs the Secretary of the Treasury to redesign the one-dollar coin, beginning in 2007, issuing four different designs a year while continuing to issue the "Sacagawea-design" \$1 coin. The bill also proposes a number of methods to increase the circulation of the dollar coin. Finally, the legislation incorporates the issuance of one-cent coins in 2009 with four different reverse designs to commemorate the bicentennial of the birth of President Abraham Lincoln.

9) H.R. 749 - Expanded Access to Financial Services Act of 2005

H.R. 749 amends the Federal Credit Union Act to permit federal credit unions to offer check cashing and money transfer services to non-members of the credit union as long as the individual is within the credit union's field of membership. The bill is

designed to lower the costs paid by consumers for these basic banking services through increased competition in the marketplace.

10) H.Con.Res. 81 - Expressing the sense of Congress regarding the two-year anniversary of the human rights crackdown in Cuba

WEDNESDAY AND THURSDAY, APRIL 27 and 28, 2005

On Wednesday and Thursday, the House will meet at 10:00 a.m. for legislative business. **Suspensions** (2 bills):

1) H.Res 224 - Providing for the expenses of certain committees of the House of Representatives in the One Hundred and Ninth Congress

2) H.Res. 210 - Supporting the goals of World Intellectual Property Day, and recognizing the importance of intellectual property in the United States and worldwide

H.R. 748 - Child Interstate Abortion Notification Act (Subject to a Rule)

Amends the Federal criminal code to prohibit transporting a minor across a State line to obtain an abortion and thereby abridging the right of a parent under a law in force in the State where the minor resides requiring parental involvement in a minor's abortion decision. The bill makes an exception if the abortion was necessary to save the life of the minor.

H.Res. 22 - Expressing the Sense of the House that American small businesses are entitled to a small business bill of rights (Subject to a Rule)

Historical Tidbits

On April 25 ...

1846 - The Mexican-American War ignited as a result of disputes over claims to Texas boundaries. The outcome of the war fixed Texas' southern boundary at the Rio Grande River.

1898 - The U.S. declared war on Spain. Spain had declared war on the U.S. the day before.

1953 - U.S. Senator Wayne Morse ended the longest speech in U.S. Senate history. The speech on the Offshore Oil Bill lasted 22 hours and 26 minutes.

1980 - In Iran, a commando mission to rescue hostages was aborted after mechanical problems disabled three of the eight helicopters involved. During the evacuation, a helicopter and a transport plan collided and exploded. Eight U.S. servicemen were killed. The mission was aimed at freeing American hostages that had been taken at the U.S. embassy in Tehran on November 4, 1979. The event took place April 24th Washington, DC, time.

On April 27 ...

1861 - U.S. President Lincoln suspended the writ of habeas corpus.

1861 - West Virginia seceded from Virginia after Virginia seceded from the Union during the American Civil War.

1937 - The first U.S. Social Security checks were distributed.

On April 28 ...

1818 - U.S. President James Monroe proclaimed naval disarmament on the Great Lakes and Lake Champlain.

1952 - The U.S. occupation of Japan ended.

On April 29 ...

1974 - U.S. President Nixon announced he was releasing edited transcripts of secretly made White House tape recordings related to the Watergate scandal.

1975 - The U.S. embassy in Vietnam was evacuated as North Vietnamese forces fought their way into Saigon.

1998 - The U.S., Canada and Mexico end tariffs on \$1 billion in NAFTA trade.
