The House Republican Leader recently said that he opposes a

minimum wage increase and has never voted for one in 25 years. That's wrong. I won't back down until working Americans get a raise.

Sick and tired of getting hosed at the pump? Since 2003, the price of gasoline has doubled and is now well over \$3.00 a gallon. Plus, despite growing scientific evidence of the causes and dangers of climate change, we still don't have a national policy to address it. Here's what we should do:



With gas prices creeping towards \$4-per-gallon, commuters are looking toward other options transportation. But Congress isn't helping.

Short term

- Offer larger tax credits for people who make fuel-efficient purchases, including cars that run on alternative fuels, electric cars, and hybrid cars.
- Take back billions in unjustified subsidies to oil companies and invest in alternative technology and fuels
- Increase conservation by promoting the use of mass transit, biking, the expansion of carpooling.

Long term

- Cut U.S. oil demand by investing in research that will make the U.S. the world leader in new technologies and markets for the next generation of revolutionary energy sources. Make energy innovation a priority - biotechnology, nanotechnology, solar, and fuel-cell research.
- ✓ Set firm and enforceable pollution-reduction targets to avoid dangerous, irreversible warming of the planet. Pass the Safe Climate Act. The bill would establish a flexible economy-wide cap-and-trade program for greenhouse gas emissions and reduce emissions through renewable energy, efficiency, and cleaner burning cars.

Helping Our Community



■ I recently joined members of the Fernandez family, local environmentalists, and the Muir Heritage Land Trust, seen above, to commemorate the purchase of land near Hercules. Known as the Fernandez Ranch, the land includes a critical portion of the Bay Area Ridge Trail and connects to the Crockett Hills Regional Park.

In Congress, I helped establish the trail, which today is almost 500 miles long. **Preserving open space in the Bay Area is important to our quality of life**.

Despite the biggest California storm in 20 years, the Water and Environment class at **John Swett High School in Crockett** worked to restore nearby Edward Creek in January, when I visited with teacher Meilin Duncana and a team of ten students as they to got the densely wooded area ready for habitat restoration.

I talked with the class about how habitat restoration is an important part of my efforts on the House Resources Committee to strengthen the **Endangered Species Act**. The students removed invasive non-native plants and replaced them with native coast live oak trees to attract endangered California wildlife.
