- rightharpoonup representation of caring adults who have already committed their time and energy to mentor a child; and
- "supports efforts to recruit more mentors in the United States."

<u>Committee Action</u>: On January 25, 2005, the resolution was referred to the Committee on Education and the Workforce, which took no official action on it.

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H.R. 315—John Milton Bryan Simpson United States Courthouse Designation Act (*Brown, Corrine*)

<u>Order of Business</u>: The bill is scheduled to be considered on Tuesday, February 8th, under a motion to suspend the rules and pass the bill.

Summary: H.R. 315 would designate the federal courthouse at 300 North Hogan Street, Jacksonville, Florida, as the "John Milton Bryan Simpson United States Courthouse."

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H.R. 548—Tony Hall Federal Building and United States Courthouse Designation Act (Hobson)

<u>Order of Business</u>: The bill is scheduled to be considered on Tuesday, February 8th, under a motion to suspend the rules and pass the bill.

Summary: H.R. 548 would designate the federal building and courthouse located at 200 West 2nd Street in Dayton, Ohio, as the "Tony Hall Federal Building and United States Courthouse."

Additional Background: Former U.S. Congressman Tony Hall, a pro-life Democrat, represented Ohio's third congressional district, which included the Dayton area, for over 24 years. Mr. Hall resigned from Congress on September 9, 2002, to accept an appointment to the United Nations Agencies for Food and Agriculture in Rome, Italy, where he oversees the World Food Program, the Food and Agriculture Organization, and the International Fund for Agricultural Development.

<u>Committee Action</u>: On February 2, 2005, the resolution was referred to the Committee on Transportation and Infrastructure, which took no official action on it.

<u>Cost to Taxpayers</u>: The only costs associated with a federal building renaming are those for sign and map changes, none of which significantly affect the federal budget.
