Fair and Equal House Voting Rights Act Passes Government Reform Committee 29-4 March Agreement for New House Vote Bill Met Norton's Conditions

Four Critical Conditions

- Mark-up not only in Rep. Tom Davis' Government Reform Committee, but also in the Judiciary Committee, the committee of jurisdiction.
- **2.** Seat in the state of Utah to be at-large to assure no political party advantage or disadvantage through redistricting.
- **33.** Add two seats instead of one to assure that no state loses a seat as a result of this bill. Instead, the bill provides an additional seat.
- Allow a vote on Norton's No Taxation without Representation Act for House and Senate seats before the vote on House bill to send message that D.C. will never give up the fight for equal representation in both houses.

"I have never mentioned the special reason I personally wanted to be the first to cast that [first] vote, because this bill is for D.C. residents. However, my 16 years in Congress have been defined by the search for full representation in the city where my family has lived since before the Civil War. As a runaway slave, my great grandfather, Richard Holmes, came here in a furtive search for freedom itself. I hope to cast that vote for the residents of the city I have had the privilege of representing, who have fought for so long—and to cast that vote in memory of my great grandfather, Richard Holmes."

Norton Wants HBCU Funding for UDC Graduate Schools

- ★ Bill would match annual Historically Black College and University funding she got for UDC undergraduate programs.
- ★ UDC graduate programs provide skilled graduates for jobs in vital disciplines such as early childhood education, special education, law, and business administration, among other programs. See picture right.

D.C.'s Tuition Bill on the Way to Floors of House and Senate

- ★ Bill deserves reauthorization based on spectacular 40% increase in college attendance in first five years.
- Most recipients first in their families to go to college because of grants of up to \$10,000 annually at state colleges and \$2,500 at local and regional private colleges and U.S. HBCUs.

- ★ Norton wants removal of all provisions that curtail self-government and home rule.
- ★ Free D.C. series eliminates inappropriate, obsolete and redundant anti-home rule congressional legislation.
- ★ Six Free and Equal D.C. bills pending: Budget Autonomy, Legislative Autonomy, D.C. National Guard Autonomy, D.C. Hatch Act Reform, D.C. Coin Act, D.C. Statues in the Capitol Act.

Missed the Medicare Prescription Drug Sign-Up Deadline?

- * "No disappointment was more bitter than the program's startup on January 1st, when it fell flat on its face, leaving many seniors without their medicines." —Congresswoman Norton
- Half the states and the District of Columbia used local taxpayer funds to rescue this federal program.
- Cosponsoring H.R. 5263 to extend the deadline to December 31, 2007 and H.R. 3861 to waive late enrollment fees for 2006.
- The federal government explained the program in materials written from seventh-grade to post-graduate levels, but 40% of seniors read at or below the fifth-grade level.
- Democrats are pushing hard to improve the new program, but the real answer is H.R. 752, which requires a national Medicare plan and negotiation for lower prices.

New Dental Bill Seeks Breakthrough in D.C. HIV/AIDS Epidemic

What A loan repayment program for dental school graduates willing to serve HIV/AIDS patients and poor people. Similar to congressional legislation for physicians, nurses and others.

Why 1) Dental problems are often an early signal of HIV/AIDS.

- **2)** Access would encourage early detection, particularly in areas like D.C. where many are reluctant to be tested.
- **3)** U.S. must tackle serious shortage of dentists, especially for underserved areas because of nationwide drop in dental school
- 4) Loan repayment relief has been very successful in getting professionals to remain in areas where originally assigned.

Norton Continues Work to Repair Family Life

U.S. Parole Commissioner, Former D.C. Police Chief, Model and Mentor He spent 28 years wearing a badge, rising through the ranks....Last year the White House nominated Fulwood to serve a six-year term on the U.S. Parole Commission, which deals with federal and District offenders. The Senate approved his nomination....Once Fulwood locked people up. Now it's about letting people out and then sending them back to prison if they violate the terms of their

release...."I

looked around that prison and said, 'What a waste of human life,'" Fulwood recalls. "I came home and said to my wife, 'Why can't we break this cycle?' It's still a question I'm always struggling with...Some people say, 'Put 'em back in for 30 to 60 days so they know this is not a game.' And some people say, 'This is just a junkie. Ain't causing no harm but to himself." Fulwood appreciates both arguments. "But if you live in one of these neighborhoods, it's more than that."
