THE GOVERNMENT CAN HELP **PAY FOR COLLEGE**

With tuition costs on the rise, more and more students are worried about how they'll be able to afford to college. Well, the Federal government might be able to help.

There are three types of federal aid you may be eligi

- Grants Grants are awarded based only on financial need. Unlike loans, grants don't have to be repaid. The two types of federal grants are the Federal Pell Grants and the Federal Supplemental Educational Opportunity Grants (FSEOGs).
- Work Study Federal Work Study provides money to participating schools so you can work part-time while you're in school. The type of work that you can do is different from school to school, so check with the school's financial aid office for details.
- Loans Loans, unlike grants or work study, are borrowed money that *must* be repaid, with interest. The types of federal student loans are Federal Perkins Loans. Stafford Loans and PLUS Loans.

In order to be eligible for federal student aid, you must fill out the Free Application for Federal Student Aid or FAFSA. The FAFSA determines your eligibility for federal financial aid as well as scholarships. grants and other aid opportunities.

- Read the newspaper. We all know how tempting it is to just skip straight to the sports section or the crossword puzzle, but newspapers provide a wealth of information about current issues in the East Bay, the United States and the world!
- Attend local meetings. A great way to learn what's happing in your area is start to attend city council and school board meetings. In addition, Congressman Stark holds town meetings once a month to address federal issues that affect people locally. Everyone is encouraged to attend.

INTERNSHIPS



KNOW THE FACTS ABOUT MILITARY RECRUITING

Did you know that a provision in the No Child Left Behind Law allows military recruiters to access your name, address and telephone number?

In fact, high schools are required to turn this information over to military recruiters upon request unless you or your parent has formally informed school officials that you do not want your information shared.

You can protect your privacy by sending your school an annual opt-out notice that prohibits the school from providing your records to military recruiters. Simply fill out the form below, have your parents sign it and send it to your school.

Federal public law 107–110, section 9528 of the ESEA, "No Child Left Behind Act" requires school districts to release student names, addresses, and phone numbers to military recruiters upon their request. The military uses this information to recruit students. The law also requires the school district to notify you of your right to Opt-Out from this by requesting that the district not release your information to military recruiters. The completion and return of this form serves as your request to withhold your private information.
