Statement of Senator Susan M. Collins Subcommittee on Oversight of Government Management "Alternative Personnel Systems: Assessing Progress in the Federal Government" September 27, 2005

Senator Voinovich, let me first take a moment to thank you for your continued leadership in ensuring our federal government has the ability to recruit, retain, and reward the high-quality workforce needed to accomplish its many missions.
