Crime Subcommittee Hearing Wednesday on Legislation Updating the FISA Act

What: Legislative Hearing titled, "Legislative Proposals to Update the Foreign

Intelligence Surveillance Act (FISA)"

Since the terrorists attacks of 9/11 nearly five years ago, many counterterrrorism and law enforcement officials have sought more tools to fight the War on Terror. While the PATRIOT Act has proven very helpful thus far in preventing another terrorist attack, many remain concerned about the adequacy of the Foreign Intelligence Surveillance Act (FISA), originally enacted in 1978, in helping these officials fight a 21st-century terrorist threat that is technologically advanced and always adapting.

THIS HEARING WILL...

Examine the need to update and reform FISA. In particular, the hearing will examine legislative proposals related to the Federal government conducting electronic surveillance for intelligence purposes. These proposals include: H.R. 5825 sponsored by Rep. Heather Wilson, House Judiciary Committee Chairman Sensenbrenner, and House Intelligence Committee Chairman Hoekstra; S. 2453 introduced by Senator Specter; S. 2455 introduced by Sen. DeWine; H.R. 5371 sponsored by Reps. Harman and Conyers; H.R. 4976 sponsored by Reps. Schiff and Flake; and H.R. 5223 sponsored by Rep. Conyers.
