Teach For America is the national corps of outstanding recent college graduates who commit two years to teach in urban and rural public schools in the nation's lowest-income communities and become lifelong leaders for expanding educational opportunity. Since 1990, more than 14,000 exceptional individuals have joined Teach For America, including 3,500 corps members currently teaching 300,000 students in 22 regions across the country and more than 10,000 Teach For America alumni, the vast majority of whom are still working in education or on related issues in low-income communities.

According to a highly regarded study by Mathematica Policy Research^{*}, corps members outpaced fully certified and veteran teachers in their schools in moving their students ahead academically.

The study revealed that Teach For America corps members in elementary grades effected greater gains in reading and math than would typically be expected in a year.

The impact in math of having a Teach For America teacher compared with a non-Teach For America



Fostering Alumni Leadership for Systemic Change

Still in their 20s and 30s, our alumni are increasingly assuming leadership roles in education reform efforts, running some of our most acclaimed schools, serving on school boards, and channeling the resources of corporations and law firms toward education and social reform.

• 67% of Atlanta alumni work full-time in education; 75% of of these are teachers or administrators in K-12 schools and 13% of these work at education-related non-profits.

• 82% of Atlanta alumni continue to positively impact the education system or low-income communities through their fulltime or volunteer work.

Alumni Leaders in Atlanta

David Jernigan '00 is the founding principal of KIPP WAYS Academy, a public charter school in the West End. In its first year, the students of KIPP WAYS increased their Iowa Test of Basic Skills scores in math by 25 percent, a change representing nearly two years of growth. On the 5th grade Georgia writing test, KIPP WAYS had the largest percentage of students scoring at the highest levels of any inner-city school within Atlanta Public Schools. Both the math and language arts teachers were Teach For America alumni.

Scott Painter '00 was the Atlanta Public Schools 2001 Teacher of the Year. After four successful years as an Advanced Placement (AP) physics teacher, Scott is currently in his second year of leading the district's AP initiative to ensure a growing number of students successfully complete AP courses.

Mary Hall '91 was a Los Angeles corps member who relocated to Atlanta to work for the Center for Disease Control. As a Program Analyst in Global Health Promotion, Mary works to address public health issues she encountered as a corps member.
