Keeping Small Manufacturing Businesses Afloat

Ohio and throughout the nation need help to stay afloat. Congress has yet to help. In June, the House passed a tax bill that offers billions to giant multinational corporations that export U.S. jobs, but offers nothing for many small businesses. Congressman Brown backed a bipartisan alternative that helps small businesses and uses tax incentives to reward companies that produce in the U.S. and employ Ameri-

can workers.

Brown has urged House leadership to reject the president's plans to cut the Manufacturing Extension Program, which helps manufacturers improve their efficiency and competitiveness. Despite Congressman Brown's efforts, a first-of-its-kind petition to hold China accountable for its abusive trade practices recently was rejected by U.S. trade officials. Brown supports reforming the out-

dated North American Free Trade Agreement model, which has cost the U.S. more than 500,000 jobs and cost Ohio more than 50,000.

Spring Storms Bring Local Assistance

ongressman Brown and his staff toured damaged areas of Cuyahoga Falls, Clinton, Barberton, North Royalton, and Strongsville. Brown spoke to city officials, property owners, and their families while taking a first-hand look at the devastation. From Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) assessments to disaster declarations made by the governor and president, Brown sought immediate action from

state and federal governments. His office is helping local communities apply for FEMA assistance.

Homeland Security Update

ongressman Brown supported several measures designed to strengthen the homeland security infrastructure in Ohio and bring more resources to local first responders. He also fought to ensure that homeland security contracts do not go to companies incorporating overseas to avoid paying taxes in the U.S.

Brown voted in favor of an additional \$50 million for the SAFER (Staffing for Adequate Fire and Emergency Response) program, which provides grants to local fire departments. Brown voted to prohibit homeland security contracts for corporations like Tyco, which evade paying U.S. taxes by incorporating its business in Bermuda.

"It is critical that Ohio's front line first responders have the resources they need, and that the work of protecting our homeland remain in American hands," said Brown. He voted in favor of the Homeland Security appropriations bill, which passed the House in June.

Useful information when filling out your voter registration form:

Line 6 – ID NUMBER: In Ohio, it is necessary to supply your complete driver's license number or the last four digits of your social security number. If neither is supplied, you must present one form of valid identifica-

tion at your polling site; if not you will not be permitted to vote. The permitted forms of identification are a Photo ID (employment ID or driver's license), bank statement, check stub, utility bill or social security card.

Line 7 – CHOICE OF PARTY: Completing this section is optional.

Line 8 – RACE OR ETHNIC GROUP: Completing this section is optional.

Legislation Backed by Brown Advances in Congress


- ▲ HR 2898 Improves coordination of Enhanced 911 deployment for first responders. Passed House
- ▲ HR 3550 Provides funding for improvements to highways, transportation safety, and transit programs. Passed House
- ▲ HR 4175 Increases disability compensation for veterans and survivors. Passed House
- ▲ HR 2998 Corrects current law so wounded soldiers are not required to pay their own hospital bills. Passed House
- ▲ HR 3214 Helps state and local law enforcement agencies improve their use of DNA evidence. Passed House
- ▲ S 741 Gives consumers information to protect against dangerous food allergies. Passed Committee
- ▲ HR 2929 Protects computer users from unwanted spyware programs. Passed Committee

- ▲ S 877 Reduces the amount of unsolicited commercial e-mail. Enacted
- ▲ HR 3658 Strengthens efforts to reduce the incidence of stroke and stroke-related disability. Passed House
- ▲ HR 1298 Provides resources
- and funding in the global efforts to combat AIDS, Tuberculosis, and Malaria. Enacted
- ▲ H. Con. Res. 36 Celebrates the 140th anniversary of the Emancipation Proclamation and commends Abraham Lincoln. Passed House

BITC

he Earned Income Tax Credit (EITC) is a federal tax benefit for low and moderate-income workers. Congressman Brown worked with the Lorain County Economic Opportunity Coalition, the City of Akron, Akron/Summit Community Action, and other local organizations to inform more than 700 people about the EITC. On average, participants received an EITC of almost \$1,700. In total, the effort put EITC benefits of almost \$1.2 million in the pockets of Northeast Ohio residents. Participants also received tax preparation help, saving a total of \$140,800 in tax preparation, electronic filing, and refund anticipation loan fees.
