# **American Parity Amendment**

The Administration's postwar request would build more housing, rebuild more schools and go further in providing health care for more pregnant women in Iraq than for Americans.



### Housing

*Iraq*–20,000 houses rehabilitated<sup>1</sup>

*America*–5,000 new housing units<sup>2</sup>



### **Schools**

*Iraq*—Books and supplies provided for 12,500 schools; resources to enroll 4 million children; rebuilding or renovation of 25,000 schools

*America*–28,000 kids will be eliminated from Head Start, no funds are allotted for school modernization, teacher-quality programs are cut 10%, and 40 educational initiatives are zeroed out under the House Republican budget.<sup>3</sup>



#### **Health Care**

*Iraq*—Provide 13 million people access to basic health services; one hospital in every major city; maternity care for 100% of the population.

*America*–Not one new dollar for 42 million working uninsured<sup>4</sup>



## **Major Infrastructure**

*Iraq*—Repair of nearly 3,000 miles of major roads.

*America*—Highway funding in America cut \$6 billion over the next 10 years.<sup>5</sup>

*Iraq*—Complete reconstruction of only deepwater port.

*America*—The President's budget cuts the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers funding by 10%.<sup>6</sup>
