Dear Secretary Norton,

We're writing to encourage you to include \$3 million in the Administration's Fiscal Year 2007 Budget Request to Congress to begin restoration at Bair Island.

The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service is poised to approve the Final Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) for this priority project to restore critical endangered species habitat within the Don Edwards San Francisco Bay National Wildlife Refuge in Redwood City, California.

Restoring habitat on 2,600 acres of former salt evaporation ponds at Bair Island will improve the health of San Francisco Bay by restoring wetlands for fish and wildlife, improving water quality, and enhancing public recreation opportunities within the nation's largest urban wildlife refuge. Reintroducing the tides to Bair Island also will reduce mosquito breeding habitat and the threat of West Nile virus.

The project enjoys broad public support throughout the entire Bay Area, and a "high priority" ranking from the San Francisco Bay Joint Venture of state and federal agencies working with non-governmental organizations to restore Bay habitat. Oracle Corporation, Pacific Gas and Electric, and other local businesses, community organizations, and students are already engaged in stewardship and maintenance activities around Bair Island, a further indication of the project's importance. We're enclosing letters of support from these private and non-profit organizations.

The Fish and Wildlife Service's restoration plan estimates the total project cost at \$21 million over four years, beginning with \$3 million in FY 2007. We ask you and the President to include this dedicated funding for Bair Island restoration in the Administration's Fiscal Year 2007 Budget Request to Congress.

Save The Bay strongly supports your request to the Department of Interior to provide funding to the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service in Fiscal Year 2007 to begin habitat restoration at Bair Island in Redwood City.

Save The Bay is the oldest and largest membership organization working to celebrate, protect and restore San Francisco Bay, with more than 10,000 members. Since 1961, we have been the region's chief proponent for protecting the Bay shoreline, restoring Bay habitat and increasing public access and recreation amenities, and we helped create the nation's largest urban wildlife refuge in the midst of the bustling Bay Area metropolis.


The Bay Area's scientific blueprint for regional restoration, the *Baylands Ecosystem Habitat Goals*, identifies Bair Island within the Don Edwards San Francisco Bay National Wildlife Refuge as a priority project to restore critical habitat for endangered species. Congress recognized that important opportunity when it responded to your leadership and provided funding to add Bair Island to the Refuge over the last decade.

The Bair Island restoration plan will improve habitat on 2,600 acres that was previously diked off from the Bay's tides and used for salt evaporation. Restoration at Bair Island will improve the Bay's health by providing tidal wetlands that support fish and wildlife, filter sediment from runoff entering the Bay, and offer wildlife viewing and open space to the public. The project also will reduce mosquito breeding habitat and the threat of West Nile virus.

Support for this project is broad and strong among communities adjacent to the site and throughout the entire Bay Area, and from regional and state resource agencies. In addition, Save The Bay volunteers, employees from large and small area businesses, and local students are already together to provide hands-on stewardship at the site. Dedicated federal funding for Bair Island restoration, beginning in Fiscal Year 2007, will fulfill the vision we all share.

Thank you for your leadership on this important issue.

I am writing on behalf of the San Francisco Bay Joint Venture to support your request that U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service seek project funding in the President's Fiscal Year 2007 Budget for the restoration of Bair Island in Redwood City, California.

The San Francisco Bay Joint Venture is a partnership of non-governmental organizations, utilities, landowners, and non-voting agencies working to acquire, restore and enhance wetlands on San Francisco Bay and on the coasts of San Mateo, Marin, and Sonoma Counties. The San Francisco Bay Joint Venture is one of the twelve wetland habitat Joint Ventures operating under the certification of the North American Waterfowl Management Plan, a Congressional agreement between the United States, Canada, and Mexico.

The Joint Venture seeks to protect, restore, and enhance 200,000 acres of wetland habitats for migratory birds, endangered species, and other wildlife habitat. Restoration of Bair Island will contribute significantly toward our toward the Joint Venture goals and is a high priority project in the San Francisco Bay Joint Venture's Implementation Strategy, *Restoring the Estuary* (2001) and was also identified as such in the region's restoration blueprint, *Baylands Ecosystem Habitat Goals* (1999).

Bair Island restoration will provide critical habitat for endangered species and other wildlife in the San Francisco Bay National Wildlife Refuge Complex, the nation's largest urban national wildlife refuge. Restoration will also constitute a highly-visible, near-term validation of habitat restoration on former salt ponds and other parcels around the Bay.


