Dear Mr. Speaker and Leader Pelosi,

If Congress does not act soon, the number of children in the United States without health insurance will likely increase. This increase is primarily the result of a lack of federal funding, and it will leave many states without the funds needed to maintain coverage for the children they currently provide care to through their State Children's Health Insurance Program (SCHIP). The undersigned members of Congress believe that we cannot stand by and put in jeopardy the health and well-being of so many children. We respectfully urge you to ensure that these impending funding shortfalls are averted before the 109th Congress is adjourned.

SCHIP was created in 1997 to reduce the number of uninsured children in the United States. It has been a truly successful federal-state partnership – reducing the number of uninsured low-income children by one-fourth since its enactment. More than four million children are currently enrolled in SCHIP; however, there is reason to be concerned that some children will lose coverage in the coming year.

The annual federal contribution to SCHIP is capped, meaning it is not adjusted to account for either increases in the cost of care or increases in the number of children in need of care. The failure to reflect these kinds of changes will severely impact at least 17 states in the coming year. Specifically, the following states will not have sufficient funds to maintain their existing SCHIP enrollment in Fiscal Year (FY) 2007: Alaska, Georgia, Illinois, Iowa, Louisiana, Maine, Maryland, Massachusetts, Minnesota, Mississippi, Missouri, Nebraska, New Jersey, North Carolina, North Dakota, Rhode Island, and South Dakota.

Last year, and for the first time since 1998, the number of uninsured children in the country increased. And even more children will go without coverage if states are forced to curtail SCHIP benefits by increasing beneficiary cost-sharing, reducing provider payments, or restricting enrollment eligibility. A failure by Congress to maintain the necessary support for SCHIP would be a failure to fulfill the promise of SCHIP and a failure to provide our children and grandchildren with needed care.

Congress has successfully addressed previous SCHIP shortfalls, and the needs of our children once again require that we take action. We ask that you work quickly with the Committees of jurisdiction and the undersigned members of Congress to immediately provide states with the funding needed to maintain SCHIP benefits. Thank you for your prompt attention to this matter.
