
## A FAILURE OF LEADERSHIP:

## HOUSE REPUBLICANS CUT NO CHILD LEFT BEHIND...AGAIN

House Republicans cut No Child Left Behind (NCLB) by \$1.5 billion compared to two years ago even as schools struggle with record student enrollments, increasing NCLB mandates, and continued state



fiscal pressures that threaten the quality of our children's education. Republicans are once again putting tax cuts for people making more than \$1 million a year ahead of the promises they made to children and families when they passed NLCB.

In 2007 alone, schools will receive \$16.4 billion less than Republicans promised under NCLB if the House Labor-HHS-


Education (LHHS) appropriations bill is enacted. As a result of the Republican cuts, <u>Missouri would receive \$231 million less</u>, <u>Ohio \$530 million less</u>, and <u>Virginia \$261 million less than promised under NCLB</u>. The attached table reveals how much each state will be shorted under the House Republican LHHS bill.

The Republican cuts come even as the Secretary of Education recently indicated that <u>states will have to "pick up the pace" to achieve the law's goal that every child meets academic standards by 2014.</u>

Additionally, according to one nonpartisan review: "States and districts lack both the funding and the staff capacity to carry out all of the demands of NCLB.... Some 80% of school districts said they had

costs for NCLB that were not covered by federal funds."<sup>2</sup>

Since 2002 – the year NCLB became law – Republicans will have provided a total of \$56.8 billion less than NCLB pledged to invest in America's schools. The billions Republicans have denied schools by underfunding NCLB could have



been used to help schools meet these mandates by supporting reading and math tutoring to students who are behind grade level, expanding after-school learning opportunities, and enhancing professional development for teachers in math, science and technology.
