Obey/Sabo Amendment to Provide An Additional \$1 Billion to Improve Immigration, Aviation, Port and Transit Security

Speed Up Efforts to Detect and Deport Criminal Aliens (+\$250 Million)

- This amendment funds additional Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) criminal alien teams so that ICE will be able to screen 100% criminal alien now in federal, state, or local jails by 2008, one year earlier than planned (+\$150 million).
- This amendment funds additional detention beds and transportation to allow the prompt removal of these criminal aliens.
- Today, DHS estimates that it is not able to identify about 138,000 of the over 300,000 illegal aliens now in our nation's prisons due to lack of staffing.

Expand Aviation Explosive Detection Systems and Cutting Edge Research (+\$300 million)

- This amendment provides additional funding to expand screening of passengers for explosives, screening of air cargo carried on passenger aircraft, and provides for more efficient in-line explosive detection systems, all called for in the Intelligence Reform Act.
- Today, TSA is only able to fund limited deployment of the more efficient and effective in-line explosive screening systems due to lack of resources.
- After the London threat, DHS expanded its liquid explosive research with a pilot program. Funding provided in this amendment will allow DHS to conduct expanded research on new aviation threats.

Port Security (+\$190 million)

- This amendment, when combined with the funding in the conference mark, would provide \$400 million for port security grants, as called for in the recent port security bills.
- The Coast Guard estimated that \$5.4 billion is needed through 2012 for ports to comply with federal port security standards and with the funding contained in the conference recommendation only 21% of this will have been funded in six years.

Transit Security and Other First Responders/Increases Preparedness (+\$260 million)

- With the funding in this conference mark, only \$591 million will have been provided by DHS since 9/11 for transit security, despite the number of attacks and a \$6 billion needs estimate.
- This amendment provides \$215 million for transit security grants, more than double the \$175 million in the conference mark.
- This amendment also provides an additional \$45 million so that state and urban area terrorism grants are not reduced below 2006.
