Minority Leader Boehner Said Benchmarks Are a Good Idea

In January, House Republican Leaders called for benchmarks to hold the Bush Administration and the Iraqi government accountable. The Iraq supplemental contains President Bush's own benchmarks to ensure progress is being made.
