Dear Friends,

I realize this newsletter arrives at your home when many in the 34th Congressional District are struggling to make ends meet. As your Member

of Congress, I want to assure you that as part of the New Direction Congress I am working hard to help turn things around for you and our country.

Earlier this year, I was pleased to join my colleagues in passing the economic stimulus act, making it possible for 130 million families to receive rebate checks. These rebates are just one first step toward economic recovery. As part of a comprehensive recovery plan, I also support congressional efforts to help the unemployed, including

passage of a 13-week extension of unemployment benefits to 3.2 million displaced workers. To address the home foreclosure crisis, Congress is moving toward a compromise bill to help families hold on to the American Dream of homeownership. We are also working on legislation to reduce our dependence on foreign oil and do what we can to bring down gas prices at the pump. Final passage of all of these measures is needed to spur the economy and protect our families.

To make sure our troops and veterans are part of this economic recovery, I am fully supporting efforts to pass into law a new GI bill to cover the cost of a full four-year education for our service men and women returning from Iraq and Afghanistan. This follows last year's enactment of a historic increase in funding for veterans' health care.

While there is no doubt that our country faces certain challenges, we still have much to be thankful for. We need only flip through the pages of this newsletter to be reminded of what is so right and promising in our communities. Whether in awe of the extraordinary talents of our high school artists or the bravery of a local WWII hero, we have much to appreciate and be proud of this summer season.

The congresswoman places a high priority on keeping local businesses strong and expanding job opportunities in our communities.



Working to Improve Your Commute

ongresswoman Roybal-Allard works from her seat on the Transportation Appropriations Subcommittee to promote infrastructure and transportation improvements across the nation and in Los Angeles. The subcommittee funds federal programs related to aviation, highways and mass transit, maritime, and railroads. The congresswoman is particularly focused on securing federal funds to bring first-rate transportation alternatives to her constituents. This year, her subcommittee appropriated nearly \$80 million in federal funds toward continued construction of the Edward R. Roybal **Metro Gold Line Eastside Extension** – the \$898 million project that will be completed in 2009. She also secured 2008 appropriations for: Red Car restoration efforts in the City of Los Angeles; 170 bus shelters in the City of Bellflower; and roadway construction and improvements in Commerce, Huntington Park and Maywood.

For her public service contributions in Congress, including her successful efforts to address the region's growing transportation needs, the Southern California Leadership Network honored the congresswoman with its **Elected Leader of the Year Award**.

Her legislation would assist educators in using technology in the classroom by helping schools to purchase computer equipment and offer quality teacher training. California Superintendent of Public Instruction Jack O'Connell and the State Educational Technology Directors Association joined the School of Global Studies' students to present the congresswoman with the association's Federal Policy Maker Award. The congresswoman believes that education technology plays a critical role in helping young people succeed in the classroom and compete in today's 21st Century global workplace.

The LA River: The View From Above



To give area lawmakers a bird's-eye view of the projects planned to revitalize the Los Angeles River, the congresswoman cohosted an aerial tour aboard a Black Hawk helicopter along with Army Corps District Commander Col. Thomas H. Magness IV, Councilman Ed Reyes, and Mayor Antonio Villaraigosa. Plans for the 31 miles of river include the development of green space, pedestrian walkways, bridges, housing and various economic development projects that will create jobs in our communities while maintaining the river's vital flood control function. The congresswoman

worked with U.S. Senator Barbara Boxer to enact a long-term federal authorization to revitalize the river, and has secured annual federal funding totaling \$4.85 million since 2002 for restoration projects.

A Champion for Public Health



Roybal-Allard Newborn Health Legislation Signed into Law

The congresswoman won a major victory in her efforts to enhance the nation's public health system when her **Newborn Screening Saves Lives Act** was passed by Congress and signed into law in April. To give babies the best chance at a healthy future, the measure promotes comprehensive and standardized newborn screening tests proven to eliminate preventable newborn deaths and severe disabilities. For her efforts, the March of Dimes honored her with its national leadership award.

From her seat on the Appropriations Health Subcommittee, the congresswoman advocates for the expansion of community health centers, which provide high-quality, cost effective and culturally sensitive care to uninsured and underserved families throughout her district and the nation. To learn firsthand about the centers' federal funding needs, she hosts an annual roundtable with representatives from nine area health care clinics (pictured). In recognition of her efforts, the congresswoman has been nationally honored by the national and county associations of community health centers and clinics.

Bringing Vital Health Initiatives to the District The sole Southern California Member of Congress serving on the Appropriations Health Subcommittee, the congresswoman secured federal funds for 2008 to support initiatives at the following heath care facilities that serve district residents: the John Wesley Community Health (JWCH) Institute's health clinic facility in Bell Gardens; the Eisner Pediatric and Family Medical Center's Parent-Child Home Program in Downtown Los Angeles; White Memorial Medical Center in Boyle Heights; California Hospital Medical Center in Downtown Los Angeles; the Lowman Center at the LA Orthopaedic Hospital near Downtown Los Angeles; AltaMed in East Los Angeles; and Bienestar Human Services, Inc.'s HIV testing program in East Los Angeles.

Legacies



Congresswoman Lucille Roybal-Allard participates in the 67th Annual Nisei Week, a community observance of Japanese and Japanese American culture and history. About 150 people gathered for the event at the Pavilion in the Japanese American National Museum in **Little Tokyo** in **Downtown**. As part of the community's efforts to preserve its proud heritage, the congress-woman helped to facilitate Little Tokyo's designation as a Preserve America Community, making it eligible for historic preservation federal grants. She also secured federal funding for the Go For Broke Educational Foundation to provide training to assist educators in teaching students about the Japanese American experience, including the internment of Japanese Americans during WWII and the many contributions of Japanese American WWII veterans.



The congresswoman presents a Congressional Certificate of Recognition to Salesian Sister Josephine Ochoa, Principal of St. Mary School in Boyle Heights on the occasion of the parochial school's 100 year anniversary. A graduate of St. Mary's Class of 1955, the congresswoman praised the faculty and student body for its longstanding achievements. St. Mary School was the third parochial school established in Los Angeles in 1907.
