Legislative Action From the Week Ending 3/31/2006

H. R. 609 Establishing the College Access and Opportunity Act

The measure extends for another five years higher education aid programs that were not extended and changed by the recently enacted spending cut reconciliation law. Programs addressed by the bill include the Pell Grant and Perkins student loan programs, work study, teacher training programs, and aid to minority-serving institutions. The bill extends the authorization of the Pell Grant program through FY 2012. The measure authorizes a maximum Pell Grant Award of \$6,000 for academic years 2006-2007 through 2012-2013. However, since Pell Grants are subject to appropriations, the actual amount of the maximum Pell Grant would depend on the amount appropriated for a given year. The bill authorizes \$1 billion for the federal work-study program, \$250 million for the Perkins Loan Program, and \$836.5 million for the TRIO program in FY 2006. The bill authorizes \$300 million in FY 2006, and such sums as may be necessary in fiscal years FY 2007 through FY 2011, for Teacher Quality Grants for States and Partnerships. I voted against this measure, which passed the House by a voice of 221 to 199. H.R. 4882 Establishing the Vietnam Veterans Memorial Visitor Center Deadline Enforcement Act

In November 2003, Congress enacted a law authorizing the Vietnam Veterans Memorial Fund to construct a visitor center for the Vietnam Veterans Memorial. Because of ongoing environmental reviews and concerns about the impact on visitors to the Lincoln Memorial, a site has not yet been approved. This bill sets a deadline of 30 days after enactment for the final approval of the design of a Vietnam Veterans Memorial visitors center on the National Mall. It specifies that the visitor center would be located in the triangular land area between Henry Bacon Drive, 23rd Street, Constitution Avenue, and the Lincoln Memorial. I supported this nue, and the Lincoln Memorial. I supported this measure, which passed the House by a vote of 404 to 4.

H. Res. 680 Recognizing Gallaudet University President Dr. I. King Jordan

Dr. I. King Jordan is the first deaf President of Gallaudet University—the only institution of higher learning serving primarily deaf and hearing impaired students—and was the first deaf college president in the United States. In 2005, he received the George Bush Medal for the Empowerment of People with Disabilities. This resolution recognizes Dr. Jordan for his contributions to Gallaudet University, to the deaf and hard of hearing community, and to all people with disabilities. This resolution was agreed to by a voice vote.

H. Res. 85 Supporting National MPS Day

Mucopolysaccharidoses and mucolipidoses, known as MPS disorders, are hereditary disorders in which the body either has malfunctioning enzymes or does not produce enzymes to break down complex carbohydrates. Without this function, carbohydrates are stored in cells, resulting in damage to the bones, heart, internal organs, respiratory system, and nervous system. This cellular damage results in mental retardation, short stature, joint stiffness, heart disease, hyperactivity, respiratory problems, and impairments to vision, hearing and speech. The National MPS Society, Inc., has designated February 25 of every year as "National MPS Day." This resolution supports the goals and ideals of "National MPS Day." This measure passed the House by a voice vote.

H. R. 4979 Establishing the Local Community Recovery Act

This bill clarifies that, in order to meet a requirement under the Stafford Act that preference be given to local firms when soliciting for contracts for disaster relief activities, such contracts may be awarded based on a specific geographic area. The measure also provides that any solicitation made by the Army Corps of Engineers in FY 2006 for such contracts would be final and would not be subject to administrative or judicial review. It also states that any pending administrative and judicial reviews would be dismissed on the date of enactment of this bill. This bill passed the House by a voice vote.
