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Hill Highlights Legislative Action From the Weeks Ending 5/19/2006 & 5/26/2006

H. Con. Res. 376, the Fiscal Year 2007

Budget Resolution The resolution calls for spending \$2.8 trillion in FY

2007, with a deficit of \$348.1 billion. It provides for \$872.8 billion in discretionary spending (appropriations), but also provides for \$50 billion in emergency appropriations above that level for the war on Iraq and against international terrorism, another \$4.3 billion for non-defense emergencies such as hurricanes and floods, and another \$2.3 billion in emergency funds to fight the avian flu. Defense spending would increase by 7% and homeland security spending would rise by 3.6%. For the years after FY 2007, the resolution essentially freezes nondefense discretionary spending at the same level for fiscal years 2008 through FY 2010. The resolution cuts funding for education \$2.2 billion below last year's comparable level and eliminates 42 education programs. It cuts veterans' health care by \$6 billion below current service levels over five years. Health care funding is reduced \$20 billion below current services over five years. Environmental protection is reduced \$2.9 billion for next year and cut \$25 billion relative to current services over the next five years. It provides for \$228 billion in tax cuts over five years, but does not include tax cuts in its reconciliation instructions, thereby providing no protection from filibusters in the Senate for tax cut legislation. Also, the resolution calls for an additional \$653 billion increase in the debt limit. In the last five years, Congress has increased the legal debt ceiling four times, totaling \$3 trillion. I voted against this measure, which passed the House by a vote of 218 to 210.

Appropriations Bill

Detroit Water & Sewage department to upgrade and maintain water treatment and sewage facilities. The measure reduces funding below the current level for most programs, including the EPA, National Park Service, and Bureau of Indian Affairs, and generally cuts grant programs in all agencies. The bill increases funding over this year for fire-fighting accounts, which total \$2.6 billion, and for the Payments in Lieu of Taxes program, which is funded at \$244 million. The measure earmarks \$1 million for the National Park Service to re-open the Statue of Liberty to the public, and earmarks \$5 million for a 9/11 memorial in Pennsylvania for the passengers and crew of United Flight 93. The bill continues a decades-long moratorium on new offshore oil and natural gas production along the outer continental shelf (OCS). It prohibits the Interior Department from granting new offshore drilling leases to existing lessees, if those current lessees' contracts do not require federal royalty payments if energy prices ceed certain limits. The bill does not, however, suspend the waiver of royalty payments for oil and gas production under current federal leases when average market prices rise above certain levels. The bill is silent on the issue of global warming; a provision that would have called for a national program to reduce greenhouse emissions was struck by a point of order. I voted against this bill, which passed the House by a vote of 293 to 128. H.R. 5384, the Agricultural Appropriations Bill This bill appropriates \$93.6 billion for agricultural and other related programs. This is \$8 billion (8%)

The program is currently distributed to 32 states, the District of Columbia, and two Indian Tribal Organizations. The nationwide monthly caseload was 477,157 in FY06. The measure also funds the eradication of the Emerald Ash Borer (EAB) at \$20 million, \$6 million above last year. The EAB is an exotic beetle that was discovered in southeastern Michigan near Detroit in the summer of 2002. The adult beetles nibble on ash foliage but cause little damage. The larvae feed on the inner bark of ash trees, disrupting the ability of trees to transport water and nutrients. I voted in support of this measure, which passed the House by a vote of 378 to 46. H.R. 5429, the American-Made Energy and **Good Jobs Act** The House passed H.R. 5429, the American-Made Energy and Good Jobs Act, which would open up 1.5 million acres in Alaska's Arctic National Wildlife Refuge (ANWR) to oil and gas exploration and production, and would require environmental reviews in hopes of ensuring that drilling activities would not negatively impact local wildlife or their habitats. All

fearing that development in ANWR will destroy a one-of-a-kind habitat for an insignificant amount of fuel that will do nothing to reverse our country's dependence on foreign oil. The U.S. Geological Survey estimated that 10.4 billion barrels are recoverable in ANWR; however, the country currently imports 13 million barrels of foreign oil per day. The Resources Committee, which has jurisdiction over the measure, did not conduct any hearings on the bill that was introduced on May 19. However, the language in the bill is almost identical to ANWR provisions that have passed the House in the past few years, but did not pass the Senate. I voted against the bill, which passed the House by a vote of 225 to 201. H.R. 5427, the Energy and Water **Appropriations Bill** The House passed H.R. 5427, a bill which outlines funding for the nation's water projects, programs within the Department of Energy, and some defense-related programs for fiscal year 2007. The bill provides a total of \$30.5 billion for all programs in 2007, including \$5 billion for the Army Corps of Engineers and \$24.4 billion for Energy Department programs. Within that total, \$250,000 is set aside for an investigation on the Detroit River Greenway Corridor project to study shoreline protection, frontal erosion, and related purposes of the shoreline area from the Bell Isle Bridge to the Ambassador Bridge.
