A BILL

To provide for dime coins to bear the likeness of President Ronald Reagan, the Freedom President, in honor of his work in restoring American greatness and bringing freedom to captive nations around the world.

- 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
- 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
- 3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.
- 4 This Act may be cited as the "Ronald Reagan Dime
- 5 Act".



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1 SEC. 2. FINDINGS.

- 2 The Congress finds as follows:
- 1) President Ronald Wilson Reagan, through his efforts as the 40th President of the United States, created policies that renewed economic growth, strengthened the resolve of the free world together to oppose totalitarianism, and restored pride in the United States.
 - (2) In 1981, when Ronald Reagan was inaugurated President, he inherited a disillusioned nation wracked by rampant inflation and high unemployment.
 - (3) The policies of President Reagan brought about the beginnings of an economic boom that lasted almost unimpeded through the end of the 20th century.
 - (4) President Reagan was victorious in 49 of the 50 states in the 1984 general election, a record unsurpassed in the history of United States presidential elections.
 - (5) President Reagan, through his simple republican dignity and sense of personal responsibility to the United States of America, brought pride and honor to the Office of the President.
 - (6) President Reagan worked in a bipartisan manner to enact his agenda of restoring account-



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1	ability and common sense to government, which led
2	to an unprecedented economic expansion and oppor-
3	tunity for millions of Americans.
4	(7) Mr. Reagan's commitment to an active so-
5	cial policy agenda for the nation's children helped
6	lower crime in our neighborhoods.
7	(8) President Reagan led a national crusade
8	against illegal narcotics, which resulted in a substan-
9	tial decline in illegal drug use in the United States
10	during his eight years in office.
11	(9) President Reagan wrote "Abortion and the
12	Conscience of a Nation" for the 10th Anniversary of
13	Roe v. Wade, which stated "Abraham Lincoln recog-
14	nized that we could not survive as a free land when
15	some men could decide that others were not fit to
16	be free and should therefore be slaves. Likewise, we
17	cannot survive as a free nation when some men de-
18	cide that others are not fit to live and should be
19	abandoned to abortion or infanticide there is no
20	cause more important for preserving that freedom
21	than affirming the transcendent right to life of all
22	human beings, the right without which no other

2	heritage of Western Civilization.
3	(11) President Reagan's unshakeable commit-
4	ment to freedom strengthened America's mission to
5	proclaim liberty throughout the world and led to the
6	collapse of global Communism, the fall of the Iron
7	Curtain, and the toppling of the Berlin Wall, giving
8	millions of people across the globe formerly shackled
9	by the Soviets opportunity to live in peace and free-
10	dom.
11	(12) President Reagan marked the beginning of
12	his Presidency by recalling with shame "the series of
13	historical tragedies-beginning with the broken prom-
14	ises of the Yalta Conference-that led to the denial of
15	the most elementary forms of personal freedom and
16	human dignity to millions in Eastern Europe and
17	Asia".
18	(13) President Reagan brought courage to
19	those people cut off from others who lived in free-
20	dom, reminding them that "Until the people of the
21	Baltic States and Eastern Europe are free to choose
22	their own system of government, we will continue to
23	speak up for their rights and champion their cause".
24	(14) President Reagan called the world's atten-

tion to the plight of captive nations tyrannized be-



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1	hind the Iron Curtain, from Stettin in the Baltic to
2	Trieste in the Adriatic, which included millions of
3	Estonians, Latvians, Lithuanians, Poles, Germans,
4	Czechs, Slovaks, Romanians, Bulgarians, Albanians,
5	Croats, Serbs, Bosnians, and others, reminding us
6	that "Free people, if they are to remain free, must
7	defend the liberty of others".
8	(15) President Reagan made a promise to "all
9	in Eastern Europe who are separated from neigh-

in Eastern Europe who are separated from neighbors and loved ones by an ugly Iron Curtain. And to every person trapped in tyranny, whether in the Ukraine, Hungary, Czechoslovakia, Cuba or Vietnam, we send our love and support, and tell them they are not alone. Your struggle is our struggle, your dream is our dream, and someday, you, too, will be free".

(16) President Ronald Reagan boldly stood at the Brandenburg Gate in West Berlin, on June 12, 1987, declaring: "General Secretary Gorbachev, if you seek peace, if you seek prosperity for the Soviet Union and Eastern Europe, if you seek liberalization: Come here to this gate! Mr. Gorbachev, open this gate! Mr. Gorbachev, tear down this wall!".

(17) President Reagan's vision of "peace through strength" brought the United States victory



1	in the Cold War and freed millions of people from
2	Soviet tyranny.
3	(18) President Reagan reminded his country-
4	men of our calling in world history: "I don't believe
5	the people I've met in almost every State of this
6	Union are ready to consign this, the last island of
7	freedom, to the dust bin of history, along with the
8	bones of dead civilizations of the past. Call it mys-
9	ticism, if you will, but I believe God had a divine
10	purpose in placing this land between the two great
11	oceans to be found by those who had a special love
12	of freedom and the courage to leave the countries of
13	their birth. From our forefathers to our modern-day
14	immigrants, we've come from every corner of the
15	earth, from every race and every ethnic background,
16	and we've become a new breed in the world. We're
17	Americans and we have a rendezvous with destiny.".
18	SEC. 3. OBVERSE OF DIME COIN TO BEAR LIKENESS OF
19	RONALD REAGAN.
20	Section 5112(d)(1) of title 31, United States Code,
21	is amended by inserting after the 4th sentence the fol-
22	lowing new sentence: "Dime coins issued after such date
23	as the Secretary determines to be appropriate shall bear
24	the likeness of President Ronald Reagan, the Freedom
25	President, in honor of his work in restoring American
