ADDRESSING CRITICAL, LOCAL ISSUES

FIXING THE PROBLEM OF THE FAA FLIGHT REDESIGN PLAN

This is my Number One local issue. As a result of the following efforts, we now have the Government Accounting Office (GAO) - watchdog of the U.S. Government - investigating the concerns we raised that noise mitigation, air emissions, and other environmental impacts have not been adequately addressed. We need continued pressure at the local, state, and federal levels to help halt this proposal. That is why I will continue to work with everyone - including you as an important part - on a plan that will tackle this issue from all sides. Our efforts:

EXPERT ADVISORY BOARD – Established an Expert Advisory Board to assess, quantify and report the negative impacts of the FAA's proposal and develop a multi-part solutions plan.

MET WITH KEY DECISION-MAKERS – Met with FAA Administrator Marion Blakey, Transportation Committee Chairman James Oberstar, and Aviation Subcommittee Chairman Jerry Costello to relay the negative impacts of the FAA's proposal on our district and to push for its end.

FUTURE: LEGISLATION, INVESTIGATION, AND LITIGATION — Along with Congressman Rob Andrews, whose district is also impacted by the proposal, I pushed the GAO - the U.S. government's investigative watchdog - to investigate the FAA's proposed airspace redesign due to concerns that noise mitigation, air emissions, and other environmental impacts have not been adequately addressed. I will also pursue legislation with Congressman Andrews to delay or stop the process until community concerns are fully addressed, and will work with the Delaware County Council on litigation as an option as necessary to stop the airspace redesign proposal.

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT & VITALIZATION

Over the past 3 years, our district has lost 600 small businesses and 1 in 5 manufacturing establishments. To reverse this trend, I am working to invest in small businesses through better incentives, increased opportunities, and an educated and trained workforce (see economic and education summits inside).

WATERSHED MANAGEMENT

Our communities face a serious flooding threat from improper watershed management, such as the 2004 flood which damaged about 500 houses and caused about \$4 million in damage. I toured our municipalities to see the impacts of the 2004 floods in our region, including the high water mark at the top of the Exxon sign in Upper Darby, and to discern how best to address the problem. I am committed to bringing municipalities and public officials together to establish a comprehensive solution. Our results:

MET WITH WATERSHED ORGANIZATIONS TO DISCUSS CONSERVATION PLANS to ensure a remedy in one area does not adversely impact downstream or upstream watersheds.

MET WITH ARMY CORPS OF ENGINEERS TO DEVELOP A COMPREHENSIVE WATERSHED REVIEW and to work on a comprehensive solution on flooding and watershed management.

SECURING FUNDING FOR A STUDY to identify the problems, needs and opportunities regarding water resources in the study area, and begin a watershed improvement process.

VIOLENC

The growing violence that we witness in our region and surrounding communities are grim reminders that we must act to address issues pertaining to violence in our schools and communities. I am committed to working on proposals that will help prevent violence, through education, economic development and other opportunities, but will also penalize those who do commit these crimes.



- Introduced legislation calling for the redeployment of our troops out of Iraq by 12/31/07
- Voted against the President's call for Troop Escalation in Iraq

- Voted for a date certain for redeploying out of Iraq, including H.R. 2237
- Provided a 3.5% across-the-board pay raise for all service members
- Supported our veterans through an additional \$12 billion in funding for veterans programs
- Provided \$1.2 billion for personal body armor and \$4.1 billion for Mine Resistant Ambush Protected Vehicles, which will reduce the casualties in vehicles by as much as 80%
- Authorized the largest amount of funding in history for 16 U.S. intelligence agencies and intelligence-related activities for the U.S. government

- Supported funding for an additional 50,000 police officers on the streets over the next six years, improving the security of railroads, public transportation, and over-the-road buses
- Increased funding for homeland security to \$33.7 billion supporting first responders, increased contractor accountability, and strengthened and streamlined the Department of Homeland Security
- Enacted seven bills that expand veterans' health care and benefits, including measures pertaining to traumatic brain injuries and rehabilitation and expanded critical mental health outreach programs
- Prohibited increases in military and retiree health care and pharmacy user fees
- National Security FIRST Act: Implements changes to the CFIUS (security) review process in response to the Dubai ports scandal, which will strengthen national security
- Improved compensation benefits for veterans with impairment of vision involving both eyes
- Provided historic increases in veterans' health and benefits programs totaling more than \$12 billion
