

## HOUSE REPUBLICANS USED TO LOVE "ROVE-ING" INVESTIGATIONS



House Republicans took <u>140 hours</u> of testimony to investigate whether the Clinton White House misused its holiday card database.



Rep. Dan Burton wrote a letter to President Clinton saying: "I would like to inquire what the standard practice is for the White House to respond to mail directed to 'Socks,' your cat."



House Republicans spent <u>\$17 million</u> on politically-motivated investigations from 1995-1998.



House Republicans compelled <u>15 of 20</u> standing House Committees to conduct politically-motivated investigations from 1995-1998.



House Republicans conducted <u>over 50</u> politically-motivated investigations from 1995-1998.



House Republicans on the Government Reform Committee received over <u>1.2 million pages</u> of documents from the Clinton Administration between January 1997-2001.



House Republican investigations led the Clinton White House to spend over <u>\$12 million</u> to reconstruct internal White House e-mails for Committee review, including e-mails between the Vice President and his staff.



House Republicans have written 0 letters, taken 0 hours of testimony, and held 0 zero hearings about a leak by White House Deputy Chief of Staff Karl Rove of an undercover CIA agent's identity.
