House Democrats' Iraq Accountability Act Funds Troops, Demands Accountability

House Democrats are moving quickly to provide our troops with the funds they need, while ensuring that the Iraqi government is held accountable and forcing the President to take a new direction. The Iraq Accountability Act, which will be on the House Floor today, provides all of the money requested by the President for Iraq, in addition to increased funds for the military, the war in Afghanistan, Katrina recovery and other pressing needs. However, Congress would only allow money to be spent on Iraq operations through August, with the remainder "fenced off" until a second vote in July. Under the legislation, the President must submit reports to Congress on July 13th detailing the progress the Iraqi government has made in meeting benchmarks and goals. After receiving this detailed progress report, Congress would vote no more than seven legislative days later whether or not to release the rest of the funding.

Will Republicans Support the Benchmarks They Say They Want?

A growing list of Republicans say they want the same type of benchmarks that are included in the Iraq Accountability Act – today will be yet another opportunity for them to back up their comments with their votes.
