EXECUTIVE BUSINESS MEETING TO CONSIDER THE NOMINATION OF DOUGLAS H. SHULMAN TO BE COMMISSIONER, INTERNAL REVENUE SERVICE; AND TO CONSIDER REVISING SUBCOMMITTEE ASSIGNMENTS TO FILL VACANCIES THURSDAY, MARCH 6, 2008

The meeting was convened, pursuant to notice, at 4:56 p.m., in room S-213, The Capitol, Hon. Max Baucus (chairman of the committee) presiding.

OPENING STATEMENT OF HON. MAX BAUCUS, A U.S. SENATOR FROM MONATANA, CHAIRMAN, COMMITTEE ON FINANCE

The Chairman. Today, the Finance Committee meets to consider the nomination of Douglas H. Shulman to be Commissioner of Internal Revenue. I support his nomination.

At Mr. Shulman's nomination hearing on January 29 of this year, I highlighted many of the challenges that he will face as IRS Commissioner. These include the tax gap, improving customer service at the IRS, IRS's outdated computers, a global economy, an aging IRS workforce, fundamental tax reform, and implementing stimulus this year.

I told Mr. Shulman that these challenges also represented opportunities to turn the IRS around. During the hearing, Mr. Shulman's responses demonstrated that he had given each of these challenges some thought.

I asked for his commitment that he would provide strong leadership to take on these issues and to effect change at the IRS. Mr. Shulman gave his "absolute commitment." He said he was "100 percent committed" to working with me to increase compliance and to help close the tax gap.

I was pleased to hear that Mr. Shulman recognized
that compliance rates are highest when there is thirdparty information reporting. And I was pleased that he is looking forward to working in close partnership with me on that issue.

I was encouraged to hear Mr. Shulman say that modernizing outdated IRS technology would be a priority for him.

I was heartened to hear Mr. Shulman say that he would do everything in his power to ensure that the stimulus checks go out as quickly as possible.

Once confirmed, he has a big job ahead of him.
Mr. Shulman has my support. But with that support comes accountability.

I told Mr. Shulman that every time he comes before the Finance Committee, I'm going to ask him to provide an accounting of his progress in closing the tax gap. I am going to go down this list of challenges again and again. I put him on notice that $I$ expect him to demonstrate specific and real progress each and every time $I$ pose the question. I don't want to hear "we are working on that." I want to hear real results.

I appreciate that Mr. Shulman is willing to take on these challenges. I thank him for agreeing to serve our Nation in the difficult job of IRS Commissioner. I wish him well as he takes on this new role and look forward to
working with him throughout his tenure.
The second order of business is to approve revised subcommittee assignments to fill vacancies.

The Clerk will call the roll.
The Clerk. Mr. Bingaman?
Senator Bingaman. Aye, aye.
Senator Kyl. So I vote "yes" on this, and "yes" on that.

Senator Ensign. Two votes?
The Clerk. Yes, sir.
Senator Ensign. I will vote then -- aye and aye.
The Clerk. Thank you, sir.
Senator Grassley. Oh, yes. Yes.
The Clerk. Mr. Smith?
Senator Smith. Aye and aye.
The Clerk. Thank you, sir.

Senator Crapo. I vote "aye" and "aye."
Senator Roberts. Roberts, aye and aye.
Senator Cantwell. Aye and aye.
The Clerk. Ms. Snowe?
Senator Snowe. Aye and aye.
The Clerk. Mr. Bunning?
Senator Bunning. On the nomination for the IRS Commissioner? Aye. On revising subcommittee
assignments? Aye.
Senator Sununu. Aye and Aye.
The Clerk. Mr. Chairman?
The Chairman. Aye.
The Clerk. The Chairman votes "aye."
Senator Lincoln. Aye and aye. I vote a "yes" vote by proxy for Senator Rockefeller.

The Clerk. Mr. Wyden?
Senator Wyden. Aye and aye.
Senator Kerry. Is it just Shulman?
The Clerk. And to revise subcommittee assignments.
Senator Kerry. What are we doing there?
The Clerk. Removing Senator Lott, adding Senator Sununu.

Senator Kerry. Oh, yes. All right. Thanks. Aye.
Senator Stabenow. We just have one vote, right?
The Clerk. Two, actually.
Senator Stabenow. Oh, there are two? All right, yes and yes.

The Clerk. Mr. Conrad?
Senator Conrad. Aye and aye.
Mr. Salazar. Aye and aye.
Senator Schumer. I vote "aye" on both.
The Clerk. Mr. Hatch votes "aye" by proxy.
Mr. Chairman, the final tally of Members present is

19 ayes, zero nays. The final tally, including proxies, is 21 ayes, zero nays.

The Chairman. Thank you everyone. The meeting is adjourned.
