Conrad's Budget Supports Vets Health


As Chairman of the Senate Budget Committee, Senator Conrad made quality health care for veterans a priority when he wrote the 2009 Congressional Budget Resolution. The result was a record level of \$48.2 billion for Veterans Affairs discretionary funding, including health care.

"America made a solemn promise to its veterans, and I will do everything I can to make sure we keep that promise," Senator Conrad said. "As more and more veterans return from the Middle East, we are learning about the great toll taken on those who served. We must renew our pledge to

meet their health care needs, as well as the needs of our older veterans."

In the two years since Senator Conrad assumed the chairmanship of the Budget Committee, the congressional budget has dramatically increased resources to care for our nation's veterans over proposals put forth by the White House. This most recent budget calls for an increase in veterans' funding by \$3.3 billion more in discretionary spending than what was sought by the Administration.

Senator Conrad's budgets have also met the funding requested in the independent budget put forth by America's leading veterans organizations.

Conrad Breaks Ground on New Vets Home

In June, Senator Conrad joined community leaders to help break ground on the new North Dakota Veterans Home, a 150-bed facility to care for veterans. He helped secure \$15.9 million in federal funding to construct the home.

"North Dakota's wounded warriors deserve the finest care our country can provide. They have made great sacrifices in defense of our freedom. While we can never fully repay them for their service, we can make every effort to meet their health care needs once they return home," Senator Conrad said.

Working with the other members of North Dakota's congressional delegation, Senator Conrad secured a priority listing for federal funds for the Lisbon project through the VA State Home Grant program. As a result of the delegation's efforts and overwhelming public support, the state legislature approved an additional \$6.4 million in state funding for the new veterans home.

Honor Flights - A Fitting Tribute to the Greatest Generation

For the past 18 months, Senator Conrad has paid special tribute to North Dakota veterans and their families by helping to arrange visits to the nation's capital as part of the "WWII Honor Flight."

The statewide initiative was spearheaded by Fargo-based radio show host Tracy Briggs to help North Dakota and Minnesota World War II veterans travel to Washington, DC, to visit the newly built National World War II Memorial. These trips were provided at no cost to the veterans. To date, the Honor Flight has helped more than 600 World War II veterans visit the National World War II Memorial.

"Because of the generosity of so many North Dakotans, hundreds of veterans have traveled at no expense to Washington to receive a hero's welcome," Senator Conrad said. "This trip represents a grateful nation's way of saying thank you to a group of heroes that is deservingly known as 'The Greatest Generation.""

New G.I. Bill Fulfills Promise to Future Vets

Knowing that our veterans will provide the next generation of America's leaders, Senator Conrad helped push the 21st Century G.I. Bill through Congress earlier this year. The legislation grants scholarships to public, in-state colleges for veterans who served three years in the military.

Woody Keeble Honored as 'Bravest of the Brave'

Honoring one of North Dakota's most decorated service members and the state's most recent recipient of the Congressional Medal of Honor, Senator Conrad joined family and friends in paying respect to Master Sgt. Woodrow Keeble at the unveiling of his Medal of Honor headstone in May.

"This is a proud day for the Keeble family and all North Dakotans," Senator Conrad said. "It is appropriate that Woody's final resting place at long last reflects what we have always known – that he will be remembered as one of

North Dakota's, and the nation's, greatest heroes."

After serving with distinction in World War II, Keeble returned to service in the Korean War. On Oct. 20, 1951 he was near Kumsong battling the Chinese. With his fellow soldiers pinned down by heavy enemy gunfire, Keeble - already wounded - made his way up a hill and took out four machine gun bunkers, killing nine enemy soldiers.

A Sisseton-Wahpeton Oyate Sioux, Keeble is one of the most decorated soldiers in history, yet he was never considered for the Medal of Honor due to bureaucratic mix-ups. It was only after years of work by his family, Senator Conrad, and others that Keeble was formally considered for the Medal of Honor.

Conrad Fights to Protect Families of Fallen Soldiers

Earlier this year, Senator Conrad sponsored legislation that would shield the families of fallen soldiers from debt owed to the federal government.

"Recently, we have seen a growing number of cases in which the families of fallen soldiers have received bills for student loans or other outstanding debts owed by that soldier. That is callous and it defies common sense," Senator Conrad said. "By adopting this legislation, we will protect and honor these grieving families who have already sacrificed greatly."

The Combat Veterans Debt Elimination Act would reverse current policy that requires the Vet-

erans Affairs (VA) Secretary to collect debt such as college tuition assistance from the families of service members who have given their lives defending our nation.

While the number of affected families to date is relatively small, Senator Conrad said that it is likely the number will increase, given the ongoing conflicts in Afghanistan and Iraq.
