have a preferred method of contact and application deadlines. By gaining an understanding of the organizations' guidelines and requirements, your organization has a better chance that its proposal is eligible for consideration.

Its contents are by no means comprehensive and should always be viewed as a work in progress. # SECTION I: POTENTIAL SOURCES OF FEDERAL ASSITANCE

#### **Finding Federal Assistance Programs**

Unfortunately, direct federal funding for non-profit initiatives is very difficult to obtain. Nevertheless, the following websites should provide you with a broad overview of federal assistance programs.

The definitive source for federal grants and nonfinancial assistance programs is the Catalog of Federal Domestic Assistance (CFDA), which includes information on over 1,400 programs. With Internet-access, grant-seeking nonprofit organizations can browse the CFDA with its search engine using keywords or a variety of listed categories. The Department of Health and Human Services administers another website, <u>Grants.gov</u>, that may prove helpful in your search. Grants.gov allows organizations to electronically find and apply for competitive grant opportunities from all Federal grant-making agencies. # SECTION II: Nonprofit Support in Pennsylvania

#### I. The Commonwealth of Pennsylvania

For the most accurate information about funding opportunities from the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, you should contact your state Representative or state Senator if you have not already done so. The following paragraphs provide general information on the solicitation of funds in the Commonwealth that you should be aware of before proceeding with your efforts to secure funding for your non-profit organization.

#### A. The Solicitation of Funds for Charitable Purposes Act

According to the Pennsylvania Solicitation of Funds for Charitable Purposes Act, all charitable organizations are required to register with the Pennsylvania Department of State's Bureau of Charitable Organizations before they solicit contributions in the Commonwealth. The Act also requires professional solicitors to register prior to soliciting for charitable organizations in Pennsylvania and professional fundraising counsels to register prior to providing services related to solicitations in Pennsylvania.

The Act defines "solicitation" as any direct or indirect request for a contribution where a representation is made that the contribution will be used for a charitable purpose. It includes, among other things, oral requests made in person, by telephone, radio, telephone, or other communication media; written requests; and sales of advertising space, chances, food, magazines, tickets, or other items of value. A "contribution" is defined in the Act as any promise, grant, or pledge of money, property, or other item in response to a solicitation, including the promise to pay for a performance, event, good, or service.

While the Act generally requires organizations soliciting contributions in Pennsylvania to register with the Bureau of Charitable Organizations prior to doing so, certain organizations are specifically excluded or exempt from the Act. For example, bona fide religious institutions and law enforcement organizations are typically excluded from the Act's requirements provided that they meet certain criteria.

In addition, educational institutions, hospitals, veterans' organizations, volunteer firemen organizations, ambulance associations, rescue squad associations, public nonprofit library organizations, senior citizen centers, nursing homes, and parent teacher associations are typically exempt from the Act's registration requirements provided that they meet any applicable criteria set forth in the Act.

Finally, charitable organizations receiving annual contributions of \$25,000 or less are exempt from the Act's registration requirements provided that they do not compensate any person to conduct solicitations.

#### B. PA Bureau of Charitable Organizations Database

The Pennsylvania Bureau of Charitable Organizations maintains an Internet database that consists of information on nearly 8,000 charitable organizations. It includes the percentages any given charitable organization spent on program services, administrative costs, and fundraising. Donors can access this data and compare it among each registered charitable organization.

# **SECTION III:**

# NONPROFIT ASSISTANCE FROM LOCAL & NATIONAL SOURCES

#### I. Pocono Northeast Development Fund

Northeastern Pennsylvania is fortunate to have a cooperating collection located in Pittston. It is a nonprofit 501(c)3 organization that provides services to nonprofit organizations in Northeastern Pennsylvania, including Carbon, Lackawanna, Luzerne, Monroe, Pike, Schuylkill, and Wayne counties.

One of its services is the Foundation Grant Seekers Information Service (FGIS) center. The FGIS center provides information on philanthropic giving, training for particular community projects, and help in locating funding sources for nonprofit organizations. Although some of the services at the FGIS center are free to the public, others are provided at a cost. A yearly membership with FGIS costs \$25 and provides access to a range of services and discounts on other special services. Each year, the PNDF conducts the Pocono Northeast Community Awards, which recognizes outstanding contributions to community development.

#### **III.** The Foundation Center

The Foundation Center, based in New York City, is an independent national service organization with the mission to strengthen the nonprofit sector by advancing knowledge about US philanthropy. Its website is a helpful tool used for organizing and distributing

information on the grant-seeking process. Nonprofit organizations can log on to http://www.foundationcenter.org/ for access to the Foundation Center's resources.

#### A. Foundation Center Publications

Attached to this manual is a section from the 2004 Foundation Directory that lists all private foundations in the state of Pennsylvania. All foundations within the 11<sup>th</sup> Congressional district of Pennsylvania have been labeled for your convenience.

#### **B.** The Cooperating Collection Network

The Foundation Center has five main library and learning centers in the US, which are located in Atlanta, Cleveland, New York, San Francisco, and Washington DC. In addition, it maintains a national network of cooperating collections in each state. These cooperating collections are open to the public.

The New York and Washington collections contain a complete set of all US foundation tax returns, while many of the network members have sets of state and regional foundation tax returns. In addition, these collections offer grant seekers a variety of useful specialized materials and services.

#### **IV.** Direct Corporation Giving

Direct corporate giving is another potential funding source not to be overlooked. Many corporations support local projects in areas where they have their headquarters or plants, or sponsor projects which somehow enhance their corporate image. The Foundation Center's National Directory of Corporate Giving describes approximately 3,000 corporate foundations that often make grants reflecting the interests of their parent companies. You should also take the time to investigate whether some of the corporations with a presence in Northeastern Pennsylvania have information on their giving practices.

#### V. Other Sources to Consider

Since government assistance programs are highly competitive and limited based on budget appropriations, nonprofit organizations should research assistance programs from local or regional private sector funding sources. These organizations may have a greater interest in contributing to the nearby community. Five basic types of private foundations include:

- 1. Community Based Foundations: Groups that form for the benefit of a specific area. Examples would include the Berwick Health and Wellness Fund Auxiliary, the Hazleton YMCA/YWCA, and the Scranton Catholic Youth Center.
- **2. Foundations with a National Broad Interest**: Organizations that are nationwide with large-scale operations. These groups usually are well-known and thus, receive numerous assistance applications. As result, the application

process tends to be highly competitive among these organizations. Examples of foundations with national and broad interests include the Carnegie Foundation, Rockefeller Foundation, and the Heinz Endowments.

- **3. Foundations with Special Interests**: Foundations that give for only one purpose. Their operations can be international, national, or regional in scope.
- **4. Family Foundations**: Foundations established by wealthy individuals or families. Their operations are generally found in a specific location.
- **5. Private Businesses and Corporations**: Corporate foundations aim to achieve the company's goals by improving their surrounding environment and their company image. Some corporations tend to give grants to nonprofit organizations near their headquarters or major facilities, but some have national, even worldwide, charitable programs.
