Recently, Veterans Affairs Secretary James Peake came before the Senate Veterans Affairs' Committee to present the administration's budget for the upcoming year. I told Secretary Peake that I opposed several components of the budget including new fees and co-payments for veterans and a sharp cut in the VA construction budget that hurts our state. I also sought an update from the Secretary on how the VA is working to improve mental health care, particularly the tragic and growing problem of suicide among active duty military personnel and veterans. – <u>Details</u>
