Thank you, Chairwoman McCarthy, for inviting me to testify before your subcommittee.

Thank you, Rep. Platts, for your caring and committed representation of York County, Pennsylvania.

My name is George Moore. I am the Executive Director of Community Progress Council, Inc., the federally designated Community Action Agency for York County, Pennsylvania.

For eight years we have had the privilege of administering the Foster Grandparent Program (FGP) through a grant from the Corporation for National Community Service. This program has been well received by our board of directors, the agency staff, clients, and the community.

From the FGP volunteers I frequently hear "the program and the children we serve give me a reason to get up everyday." The mutual benefits that the at-risk youth and foster grandparents receive from each other are beyond measure. Children get compassionate one-to-one attention from a caring FGP volunteer. The volunteers have new purpose and meaning in their life. In addition, being physically active has helped lower blood pressure and lessened the effects of disabilities.

Some background on our York County program follows with attached letters about specific Foster Grandparents.

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Since the Foster Grandparent started in York County:

- 132 volunteers (Foster Grandparents) have served
- Approximately 375,000 hours
- 42 volunteers have met and well exceeded the President's challenge by serving over 4,000 hours earning them the "Lifetime" Presidential Volunteer Service Award

Over the past 12 months:

- 63 volunteers (Foster Grandparents) have served over
- 58,000 hours serving well over
- 350 children needing individual attention at
- 15 sites in York City and County (5 faith-based)

At the end of the 2005-06 school year elementary teachers reported that of the children assigned to Foster Grandparents:

- 91% of the children demonstrated improvement in reading
- 92% improved in math skills
- 94% showed improvement in spelling skills

At the end of the 2005-06 school year Head Start teachers reported that of the children assigned to Foster Grandparents:

- 82% of the children were at age level for cognitive development; demonstrating a 7% increase since mid-school year
- 86% were at age level with their social skills which had increased 26% since mid-year
- 94% of the Head Start children in the mentoring program were prepared to enter Kindergarten in the fall with the skills they would need to be successful

Miss Ida Tarrant graciously donates her time and heart to these students. She comes back year after year to VOLUNTEER her time with the very students many consider not appropriate for our public schools. Miss Ida serves at River Rock Academy an alternative secondary school. The mission of River Rock is to develop and provide quality and innovative services to people with psychosocial, educational and vocational needs, creating an enhanced quality of life and social responsibility. At-risk school students between the ages of 11-18 years are referred by public school districts to receive these special services. Despite health issues, Miss Ida has served in this capacity for seven years, logging an average of 35 hours per week.

It takes someone special to work with this population; a population that most would consider too challenging. She develops strong relationships with all of the students. She willingly assists with the behavioral problems that the students may exhibit. She is supportive and friendly not only to students but also to the staff. Miss Ida has the ability to make each student

woman who helps out in any way she can. To some of her students, she has truly lived up to the title of "Foster Grandparent" by filling the void of an emotionally or physically missing grandparent. She shares in the pride felt by family at graduations...graduations most felt would never happen.

One student summed up the feelings of many with the following; "Miss Ida is a very nice and caring lady. She loves to keep the kids happy. Everybody appreciates her for all her help. She always tries to make things good and when something's going wrong she always tries to make it better. We all love Miss Ida."
