#### Veterans: Bringing Veterans Back into the VA Healthcare System

On Wednesday, I introduced the Honor Our Commitment to Veterans Act, which would allow new Priority 8 veterans to enroll in the Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) healthcare system. Priority 8 veterans are those veterans with non-service-connected disabilities whose income is above a modest level that varies across the country. More than four years ago, the Bush administration cut off all Priority 8 veterans' access to the VA healthcare system. My bill would reverse that decision. It would enable over 3,000 new Priority 8 veterans in Washington state to be eligible for care. - Details

#### Highway Safety: Examining the Alarming Increase in Highway Deaths

On Thursday, I chaired a Senate hearing to examine the alarming trend of increased highway fatalities across the country. Since 2003, the number of annual fatalities has risen by over 3,000 to an estimated 43,400 deaths a year. At the hearing we examined many of the causes for the increase in fatalities including drunk driving, seat belt enforcement, adherence to speed limits, and ineffective compliance reviews for rogue trucking companies.

#### Prescription Drugs: Republicans Block Debate on Effort to Lower RX Drugs

On Thursday, I voted to move forward with debate on the *Medicare Fair Prescription Drug Price Act of 2007*, which would allow the federal government to negotiate drug prices with manufacturers and provide more transparency on the discounts they receive through Medicare Part D. Unfortunately, Republicans blocked a motion to move forward and consider the bill. The final vote, 55-42, fell 5 votes short of the 60 needed to move ahead.

Seniors across Washington state have shared their concerns with me over the Medicare Part D Prescription Drug Program. I will continue to work to improve the program and lower drug prices for the over 800,000 Medicare recipients in our state. Unfortunately, Senate Republicans are more interested in protecting the drug industry then in finding ways to benefit more of our seniors.
