

BY THE NUMBERS: OMNIBUS LANDS GRAB AND ENERGY RESTRICTIONS ACT

4 — new units added to the National Park Service

10 — new National Heritage Areas

14 — studies that would create or expand National Park Service jurisdiction

17 — provisions specifically withdrawing federal land from mineral leasing, such as oil, gas, and coal exploration


53 — rivers designated as wild and scenic, a designation that imposes federal jurisdiction and regulation on the impacted waterway, and involve significant land acquisition authority

65 — new federal wilderness designations or additions to public land

130+ — bills included in the omnibus package

983.67 — miles of river designated as wild and scenic, a designation that imposes federal jurisdiction and regulation on the impacted waterway, and involve significant land acquisition authority

1,082 — pages in the omnibus



The Federal Government already owns nearly 650 million acres of land, of which almost 30 percent of the land area of the United States



The National Park Service has a \$9 billion backlog of work that needs to be completed on existing federal land.

1.2 million — acres in Wyoming withdrawn from mineral leasing and energy exploration

1.93 million — acres designated as federal wilderness land, which eliminates all major recreation and prohibits any new oil and gas leasing

3 million+ — total acreage withdraw from energy leasing

331 million — barrels of recoverable oil being taken out of energy exploration in Wyoming

\$592 million— spending included in the bill for 15 new state and local water projects

\$9 billion — the National Park Service's maintenance backlog of projects needed on existing federal park land

\$4.38 billion — total projected cost to the federal government on enacting the omnibus

8.8 trillion — cubic feet of natural gas in Wyoming taken out of energy exploration
