The generation of alternative energy through newly installed solar and photovoltaic panels and efforts to promote food security, will reduce the cost of running the shelter in order to protect the public's investment in this project.

Refurbishment would cost a fraction of that price, ensuring the longevity of the units, and by keeping them in the public housing inventory, the Hawaii Public Housing Authority is able to collect rent to operate the units as intended.

The Kahaleakeola Homeless Resource Center and Hale Makana O Waiale Affordable Rental Project are critical public service facilities that were developed to provide emergency shelter, transitional housing and a continuum of supportive services for an average of 1,200 homeless individuals and families per year on the island of Maui. The long-term upkeep and maintenance of these facilities is necessary to preserve and protect the public investment in these projects and ensure maximum benefits to the public on an ongoing basis.
