Eliminate Taxpayer Subsidies for Amtrak Long-Distance Routes

June 16, 2010

Program or Item Targeted: Taxpayer subsidies for wasteful Amtrak Long-Distance Routes

One-Year Cost of Program or Item: Amtrak's 6 routes that operated at a total loss of \$161.3 million for FY 2009.

Background on Program or Item to Be Sunseted: In an attempt to revive passenger rail service, Congress passed the Rail Passenger Service in October of 1970. The legislation created Amtrak, which began running on May 1, 1971. Amtrak operates a nationwide rail network in 46 states and currently has long-distance trains that operate in 39 states, and the District of Columbia. In 1997, Congress passed the *Amtrak Reform and Accountability Act* which required Amtrak to operate without federal subsidies by 2002. Yet eight years later, Congress is still fully supporting Amtrak's shortfall. From FY2007-FY2010 alone, Amtrak received \$7 billion in federal assistance.

Why This Program or Item Is Wasteful: In 2009 Amtrak lost money on 41 of its 44 routes, according to <u>Subsidyscope</u>, an arm of the Pew Charitable Trusts. Amtrak's worst offenders are its long-distance routes (over 400 miles in length). Nearly every one of the fifteen long-distance routes operates at a loss every month, costing taxpayers \$386 million last year. The biggest loss came from the Sunset Limited, traveling between New Orleans and Los Angeles, which lost \$462 per passenger. Amtrak runs a deficit every year, and because the taxpayers subsidize its inefficiencies, it has no real incentive for improvement. Amtrak's failing long distance routes need to be eliminated so that Amtrak has a proper incentive to improve, and relieve taxpayers from this unnecessary burden.

MEMBER ACTION ITEM: Representative Pete Sessions (TX-22) introduced H.R. 5377, which would require Amtrak to eliminate service to long distance routes which have total direct costs that are more than twice total revenue.
