Dear Friends:

Change is good. ... Change is constructive. ... Change is progressive. Last November, you and countless others just like you across the country asked for change. Nine months into the new Congress, change is exactly what you are getting.

For the first time in a decade, a new minimum wage has been enacted. Over the next two years, 13 million Americans will directly or indirectly get a pay raise of over \$4,000 a year.

In an historic move, Congress made the single largest investment in veterans' health care and benefits (\$6.7 billion over the previous year) since the inception of the Veterans Affairs Administration.

After sitting on the shelf of the previous Congress for three years, each and every one of the 9/11 Commission's recommendations to help bring real security to our country are now law.

We changed the old Congress' course on higher education, children's healthcare and Iraq. Federal grants to pay for college tuition increased by over half a million. We will send to the President a bill to give 10 million children health insurance. And, but for the President's veto, America today would have a law in place setting forth a fixed timeline for the redeployment of our troops from Iraq. This Congress' budget eliminates deficits by 2012 without raising taxes. We reinstituted pay-as-you-go budgeting: we will not enact any new laws or programs unless we pay for them – no more government "credit card binges!"

This Congress recognizes its watchdog duties, and is challenging – finally – no-bid contracts to Halliburton and compelling the White House to come clean on the suspicious firing of eight talented U.S. attorneys.

Not a bad start even with the President getting in the way. Next on our agenda: climate change, energy conservation, fixing the alternative minimum tax and our broken immigration system, and requiring that **all** voting machines produce a paper trail to make sure your vote is counted.

As we can see, it won't be easy. There will be roadblocks. But you asked for change. And that is what I aim to deliver.

GUN MICROSTAMPING BRIEFING & DEMONSTRATION

In the wake of the Virginia Tech tragedy, and shortly following the second anniversary of the conviction of the "Beltway Snipers," I arranged for a demonstration of the crime solving capabilities of aun microstamping technology. The event, which took place in the Rayburn House Office Building firing range on Friday, May 18, gave Todd Lizotte, the creator of microstamping technology, an opportunity to show how the system works to connect the dots for investigators of gun crimes. Internal surfaces of the gun etch tiny characters onto every fired bullet cartridge allowing law enforcement to identify the make, model and serial number of the gun from which it was fired. A single microstamped cartridge recovered at the scene of a crime can lead police to the gun and the criminal that fired it. Currently I am working with Senator Ted Kennedy (MA) to craft legislation that would require gun manufacturers to implement this potentially life saving technology. The California Assembly passed similar legislation, A.B. 1471. "The Crime Gun Identification Act," on May 29, and the California Senate followed suit passing the legislation on September 10.

CONGRESSMAN BECERRA NAMED ASSISTANT TO THE **SPEAKER OF THE HOUSE**

Back in January at the start of the 110th Congress, Speaker Nancy Pelosi nominated me to the senior leadership role of Assistant to the Speaker of the House. My colleagues in the Democratic Caucus then voted unanimously to have me serve in this role. In a press release announcing the appointment, the Speaker said, "Congressman Xavier Becerra's keen intellect and substantive policy expertise will be crucial in charting a new course for America's working families. As a member of the Ways and Means Committee, he has been a strong leader in mapping out a new direction on trade, Social Security, and federal taxes." As a member of the Leadership, I now have a coveted seat at the decision making table. And now you have a stronger voice in the people's house in Washington, D.C. I thank you for the chance to serve!

FIGHTING FOR COMPREHENSIVE IMMIGRATION REFORM

There is little doubt in anyone's mind that we sorely need to fix our broken immigration system, which has allowed millions of undocumented immigrants to live and work in the shadows of our society for decades. I firmly believe that any reform must honor our proud history as a nation of immigrants. This May the Senate took up debate on a comprehensive proposal that would have started us on the path toward reform. As a member of House leadership. I held a series of listening sessions to better understand the needs and concerns of my colleagues as we prepared to begin work on a compromise with the Senate. Unfortunately, after several attempts, the closely divided Senate was unable to send a bill over to the House, effectively derailing hope that a comprehensive bill will be passed this summer. Despite this setback, I will continue to work as hard as I can to fix our immigration system.

LEGISLATION TO BAN GENE PATENTING

It was in February of 1953 when James Watson and Francis Crick discovered the structure of Deoxyribonucleic acid (DNA), the molecule that contains the genetic information of nearly all living organisms. Few discoveries have matched theirs in the understanding of the makeup of the human species. This discovery led to the 1990 founding of the Human Genome Project whose goal was to code three billion nucleotides contained in the human genome and to identify all the genes present in it. The Project's efforts have led to the discovery of approximately 35,000 genes.

Twenty percent of these genes have already been patented and we have absolutely no say in what those patent holders do with our genes. This cannot be what Watson and Crick intended. This is a serious problem and it is growing. And it is for this reason that I, along with my friend and colleague, Rep. Dave Weldon, M.D. (FL-15) have introduced the Genomic Research and Accessibility Act (H.R. 977), straightforward legislation that ends the practice of gene patenting. Genes are a product of nature and thus, should not be patentable. Patenting the gene for breast cancer (yes, breast cancer genes are patented) or any other gene is the analogous equivalent to patenting water, air, birds or diamonds.

WAR IN IRAQ & VETERANS' ISSUES TAKE CENTER STAGE **AT TOWN HALL FORUMS**

This past April. I held district wide town hall forums on two major, interrelated issues that are on the forefront of Congress' - and the American people's - minds: the ongoing war in Irag and health care for our veterans. On April 2 veterans from World War II through the current war in Iraq turned out to speak directly with the Chairman of the House Veterans Affairs Committee, Bob Filner (CA-51), and me at a public forum hosted by American Legion Post 206 in Highland Park. The meeting gave everyone an opportunity to discuss the state of health services for our veterans in the wake of the Walter Reed scandal, mental health



services for those suffering from Post Traumatic Stress Syndrome (PTSD), and equity for Filipino veterans of World War II who fought under the American flag, but were denied benefits provided to other veterans. Several weeks later I met with constituents for an in-depth discussion on the war in Iraq at the Cathedral Center of St. Paul in Echo Park. Everyone who spoke voiced their frustration over the Administration's policy of open-ended war, and their desire to bring our brave troops home as soon as possible.
