General Guide to Government Funding Assistance

Government funding comes in many different forms. Below discusses several of the more common forms, individual benefits, appropriations, grants, and procurement, but this list is far from exclusive.

- Individual benefits: Individual benefits are often called "entitlements," and include Social Security benefits, Medicare, VA benefits, etc. For more information or assistance with individual benefits, please contact the Pennsylvania 7th Congressional District Office at 610-892-8623 or by mail at 600 N. - Appropriations: Often referred to as "earmarks," appropriations are usually large projects that are specifically placed in appropriations bills for limited purposes (i.e. not on-going operations). Forms to apply for an appropriation are available beginning in January by visiting www.sestak.house.gov, contacting the District Office at 610-892-8623, or requesting by mail at 600 N. Jackson Street, Suite 203, Media, PA 19063. The forms must be completed and returned electronically by the designated deadline (usually mid-February). Appropriations are approved once the appropriation bill containing it passes both houses and is signed by the President. This can happen as early as late fall, but in the last several decades, the process has often extended to the end of the year, and in some cases into the beginning of the next year. It should also be noted that recent actions by Congress have dramatically cut funds available for appropriations.
- **Grants**: As the amount of money going to appropriations has decreased, more money has been funneled into the competitive grant process. Federal grant dollars are designated for federally administered grants, but large block grants are also given to states and local governments to administer. Even though a grant may come from a Pennsylvania department, quite often the source of the funding is a federal block grant. In addition to government grant money, hundreds of foundations and individuals offer grant opportunities and these should not be overlooked.
- **Procurement**: Whether you are a small company or a large company, there are often government procurement opportunities available to you. One way to learn more about the procurement process is to attend the yearly PA 7th Congressional District's procurement summit. This event brings together government procurement officials, large government contractors, and area businesses to provide educational and networking opportunities, facilitating regional access to federal procurement dollars. Grant Basics

- 1. **Need and plan**. Determine your need and formulate a plan for implementation.
- 2. **Find opportunity**. Search or browse the federal, state, and private catalogs for potential grant opportunities that fit you need. This may require some creative thinking. <u>Often grant solicitations will describe what they do not want, but will not fully explain what they will accept.</u>
- 3. **Contact grant technician**. Once you have identified potential funding sources, it is often recommended that you contact the grant technician at the granting source to discuss the application process and how best to present your grant request in a way that maximizes the chances of award selection.
- 4. **Check regularly**. Check the sites weekly for new grant postings.
- 5. **Write proposal**. Learn how to write grant proposals. (see below for grant writing resources)

Edward M. Kennedy Serve America Act

The Serve America Act reauthorizes and expands national service programs administered by the Corporation for National and Community Service. These programs include AmeriCorps, Senior Corps, Learn and Serve America students, and additional community volunteers mobilized and managed through the agency's programs. The Serve America Act includes Silver Scholar Education awards provide a \$1,000 education award to an individual aged 55 or older who performs at least 350 hours of service. Transfer of education award earned in Subtitle C position or as a Silver Scholar is permitted for individuals 55 or older to the individual's child or grandchild who meets the citizenship eligibility requirements for AmeriCorps and attains a high school degree before using. Recipient must use the education award within 10 years of its being earned.

Inventions and Innovation (I&I), part of the U.S. Department of Energy's Industrial Technologies Program (ITP), provides grants to independent inventors and small companies with sound ideas for socially beneficial projects and energy efficiency technologies. This assistance is provided at two levels: Up to \$50,000 for technologies in early-stage development and up to \$250,000 for technologies approaching the point of prototype. At present, I&I itself has no funding for its activities in fiscal year 2008, so it has announced no upcoming funding opportunity solicitations. I&I accepts proposals only during open solicitations. Much of the work of the Department of Energy's **Office of Science** (SC) (http://www.science.doe.gov/) is supported through grants and contractual vehicles. This work is processed through the Office of Science Grants and Contracts Division (GCD) (http://www.sc.doe.gov/grants/grants.html) which serves as the principal acquisition, financial assistance (grants and cooperative agreements) and contract/grant management advisor to the Director of Science. The GCD provides independent analyses, advice and recommendations on procurement and assistance actions initiated by the SC; identifies problem areas, opportunities and management issues and makes recommendations; serves as the SC focal point in developing positions and responses to proposed Federal and DOE procurement and assistance regulations and business management policies and procedures; provides advice and guidance and serves as the SC contact point with DOE field offices, laboratories, universities, contractors, grantees and other Government agencies on SC policies and strategies with respect to acquisition, financial assistance and contract/grant management issues.

The Department's **Office of Nuclear Energy** (http://www.ne.doe.gov/) is a competitive peer-reviewed program to provide grants allowing nuclear engineering faculty and students to conduct innovative research in nuclear engineering and related areas. The awards run from one to three years and are granted in eight separate technical areas related to nuclear engineering: reactor physics, reactor engineering, reactor materials, radiological engineering, radioactive waste management, applied radiation science, nuclear safety and risk analysis, and innovative technologies for next generation reactors, space power and propulsion, or radiation sources. This type of research is vital to the academic community to help promote excellence in nuclear engineering and provide resolution to issues confronting nuclear engineering in general.

The Office of Nuclear Energy (http://www.ne.doe.gov/) also provides tuition, stipends, and practicums to outstanding graduate students studying nuclear engineering and health physics and undergraduate scholarships and practicums to students pursuing a nuclear engineering course of study to ensure that our country will have an adequate supply of trained nuclear scientists and engineers. As an element of this activity, the University Partnership Program pairs minority institutions with institutions offering a nuclear engineering degree to enable more minorities to enter the field of nuclear engineering.

The federal government also offers a Renewable Electricity Production Tax Credit and Business Energy Investment Tax Credit for larger, utility-scale wind power installations. The PDM program provides funds to states, territories, Indian tribal governments, communities, and universities for hazard mitigation planning and the implementation of mitigation projects prior to a disaster event. Funding these plans and projects reduces overall risks to the population and structures, while also reducing reliance on funding from actual disaster declarations. PDM grants are to be awarded on a competitive basis and without reference to state allocations, quotas, or other formula-based allocation of funds.

The Bureau of Waterways Engineering contains two main programs: Dam Safety and Flood Protection.
