

Born and raised in New Mexico, Rep. Ben Ray Luján grew up in Nambe, a small farming community north of Santa Fe bordered by the pueblos of Nambe and Pojoaque. There he learned the time-honored traditions and values of New Mexico.

Since he was sworn into Congress, Rep. Luján has worked to get our economy back on track, reform health insurance, build a clean energy economy, and stand up for consumers.

Rep. Luján has stood up for New Mexicans who are struggling in these difficult economic times by cosponsoring the Credit Card Holder's Bill of Rights, fighting to reform Wall Street, voting to provide tax cuts for families and small businesses and working to reform our broken health insurance system. He has worked for the people of New Mexico's 3rd Congressional District, passing legislation that invests in scientific research at Los Alamos National Laboratory, fighting for innovative education at Hispanic Serving Institutions in the American Clean Energy and Security Act and advocating for tribal communities by improving infrastructure, education and health care.

Rep. Luján represents his diverse and varied district by participating in a variety of Caucuses including the <u>Congressional Progressive Caucus</u>, the Natural Gas Caucus, the <u>Congressional Hispanic Caucus</u>

, the Native American Caucus and the Sustainable Energy and Environment Coalition

committees, he is able to serve the many needs of the district which spans from San Juan County in the Northwest to Roosevelt County in the Southeast – and the treasured lands in between.

As a member of the <u>Committee on Science and Technology</u> and Vice Chair of the <u>Subcommit</u> tee on Technology and <u>Innovation</u>

, Rep. Luján is working to combat climate change and make New Mexico a leader in renewable energy through investment in energy efficiency and clean energy technologies. Rep. Luján is also on the

Energy and Environment Subcommittee

, where he focuses on investment in programs that promote environmental sustainability.

As a member of the <u>Committee on Natural Resources</u>, Rep. Luján works to preserve land and resources for future generations and fights to improve services for Indian Country.

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{page:Section1;} --> Rep. Luján has already introduced 9 separate bills that have fallen under
the Committee's jurisdiction. Early in his term, he introduced a bill to protect the Sabinoso
Wilderness. He has also introduced legislation to finalize two tribal water settlements that were
considered by the Committee on Natural Resources before passing through of the House.
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On the <u>Committee on Homeland Security</u>, Rep. Luján focused on emergency preparedness, cybersecurity and improving resources for first responders.

Rep.Luján is also the Chair of the Congressional Hispanic Caucus' Green Economy and Renewable Energy Task Force where he focuses on the role of the Hispanic community in the advancement of clean energy policy.

Rep. Luján's work in Congress to ensure that the Hispanic community is included in the emerging clean energy economy earned him the recognition of one of Hispanic Business Magazine's 100 Most Influential Hispanics.

Prior to his election to Congress, Rep. Luján served as the Chairman of the New Mexico Public Regulation Commission. As a Commissioner, Rep. Luján worked with his colleagues to develop a renewable portfolio standard to increase renewable energy production by New Mexico utilities

to 20 percent of their total production by 2020 and to diversify utilities' renewable portfolios to include solar energy. On behalf of the state of New Mexico, Rep. Luján joined his fellow Commissioners from California, Oregon, and Washington to sign onto the Joint Action Framework on Climate Change to create regional solutions to climate change.

With the New Mexico Public Regulation Commission, Rep. Luján advocated for first responders. He worked with firefighters, the state legislature, and other officials to overhaul the New Mexico Fire Fund so that all distributions from the fund would go to improving fire services in New Mexico.

Rep. Luján also worked to improve health care as a member of the New Mexico Public Regulation Commission by investigating the denial practices of the health insurance industry. The investigation led to the development of legislation that expanded access to insurance and closes closed loopholes the industry had been using to unfairly deny medical claims and void policies.

Rep. Luján has also served as New Mexico's deputy state treasurer as well as New Mexico Cultural Affairs Department's director of administrative services and chief financial officer.

Rep. Luján earned his Bachelor's degree from New Mexico Highlands University in Business Administration.
