## **General Information**

#### **Overview**

Washington, DC was founded on July 16, 1790. The District has a total area of 68.3 square miles, 6.9 of which are water. The city itself has a population of approximately 600,000 people, while the metropolitan area has a population of 5.3 million – making it the ninth-largest metropolitan area in the country. In addition to being the seat of our federal government, Washington hosts 174 foreign embassies as well as the headquarters of the World Bank, the International Monetary Fund, the Organization of American States, the Inter-American Development Bank, and the Pan American Health Organization.

#### Weather

D.C. is located in a "humid subtropical climate zone", with four distinct seasons. Spring and fall are warm, with temperatures typically in the sixties and low humidity. Winter is cool, with average lows tending to be around 30 degrees Fahrenheit. Snow fall is moderate, averaging about 15 inches per year, however blizzards on average hit once every four to six years. Summers are hot and very humid, with the July high and low averaging 88 degrees and 70 degrees, though the high will often surpass 95 degrees accompanied by high dew points. The combination of heat and humidity in the summer brings very frequent thunderstorms, some of which occasionally produce tornadoes in the area.

# Getting to DC

#### Plane:

DC is served by 3 major airports, Ronald Reagan Washington National Airport (DCA), Washington Dulles International Airport (IAD), and Baltimore-Washington International Thurgood Marshall Airport (BWI).

DCA – Commonly known as "Reagan" or "National" is located in Arlington, VA just across the Potomac River from DC. It is by far the closest, and has its own Metro stop on the Blue and Yellow lines.

IAD – Commonly known as "Dulles" is located 26 miles outside of downtown DC in Dulles, Virginia. There are buses and shuttles that run from the airport to various DC Metro stations. It is about a 40 minute commute from the airport into the city.

BWI – Commonly known as "BWI" is located 30 miles northeast of DC and 10 miles south of Baltimore. The commute to downtown DC is about an hour. There is a Metro Bus (B30 Express line) that runs from the airport to the Greenbelt Metro station. There is also train service via MARC or Amtrak. Although it is further out, in 2010 it was ranked best airport of its size (15-20 mil passengers) in the world by the Airports Council International.

#### Train:

Amtrak trains arrive from all over the country. All stop at Union Station, a few blocks from the Capitol building.

#### Car:

D.C. is primarily served by I-95, though the highway does not go directly into the city itself, but skirts around it by merging into "the beltway" (I-495). The beltway literally circles around the city and is miserable to drive on during morning and evening commuting hours as it is heavily congested (often to the point of stand-still). Other major highways that run through and around DC include: I-270, I-395, I-295, I-66, and US-50. In addition to heavy traffic, parking is also extremely limited in DC. It is primarily on-street, metered parking. Some areas downtown have parking garages, but they can be pricey.

#### **Bus:**

Greyhound bus offers service to Washington, DC and has numerous locations throughout Northeastern and Central Pennsylvania. There are also a number of commercial bus services that run from DC to New York City and/or Philadelphia. For Philadelphia: Apex Bus, Eastern Shuttle, Megabus and, New Century 2000. For New York City: Apex Bus, Boltbus, Eastern Shuttle, Holabus. Megabus, New Century 2000, Tripper Bus, Vamoose Bus, and Washington Deluxe.

# **Getting Around**

## City Layout

The city is split into four quadrants of unequal size, with the center on the Capitol Building: NW, NE, SE, and SW. The NW quadrant is the largest and SW is the smallest. Addresses take a quadrant name, e.g. 100 C St NE, depending on where in the city they fall.

City roads are laid out in a grid, with east-west streets primarily named with letters, and north-west streets primarily named with numbers. There are also a number of diagonal streets which cross-sect the grid, which are mostly named after states.

Numbers increase and letters decrease (A-Z) with distance from the Capitol (meaning the streets closest to the Capitol are "A" and "1<sup>st</sup>").

The grid has a few peculiarities of note, which are a legacy from Pierre L'Enfant's eighteenth century plan for the city. There is no J street because J and I were indistinguishable when handwritten in the 18<sup>th</sup> century, and I street is often referred to as "Eye st" to distinguish it from the letter L.

#### Metro Rail

The underground subway, the Metro, is the central feature of the city's public transportation system, comprised of five intersecting rail lines. Lines are color-coded, (red, green, yellow, blue, and orange) and in some areas two lines share the same tracks.

The Metro fare system is complicated and varies based on the time of day and the distance of the trip. During peak times (M-F 5am to 9:30am and 3pm to 7pm and Sat-Sun all day) fares cost \$1.65-4.50. At all other times, fares cost \$1.35-3.00. Posted guides will help you calculate the appropriate fare. Fares are paid by purchasing a fare card at automated machines within stations. Flat-rate Metro passes are available that give riders an unlimited number of trips within the system for a set number of days. If you are staying for an extended period of time, consider buying a SmarTrip card, which works with both the Metro and the Metrobuses. SmarTrip cards are required for parking at Metro lots, and can be bought at most major stations and all CVC stores.



## **Metro Rail Essential Tips and Etiquette**

- Think of escalators as 2-lane highways. The left "lane" is the fast lane, and the right "lane" is the slow lane. Stand on the right side, walk up or down on the left side.
- Hold on to your fair cards. You need them to enter AND exit each station. Have them in hand as you approach the turnstile to speed up the process.
  - o The blue "express" lanes are for "Smart Trip" (frequent rider card) holders only. You CANNOT use a paper fair card in these lanes.
- Train doors are not like elevator doors, meaning they will not reopen if they begin to close on your arm, bag, etc. When the bell chimes indicating the doors are closing, make sure you are completely clear of them.

- DO NOT try and hold/force the doors open when they are closing. Not only does this hold-up the train, it can damage the doors causing the train to have to unload and go out of service.
- The flashing red lights along the platform indicate that a train is approaching. You should step back away from the edge at this point, as trains move quickly into the stations.
- When boarding a train, always let exiting customers off the train before you try to board. Once on board, move towards the center of the car. Do not stop right in front of the doors, crowding them. This prevents other customers from being able to enter and exit.
  - o If you are standing in front of the doors, please step away (or off the train) when at a stop so other people can exit.
- When exiting a train, keep moving away from the car. Do not stop right in front
  of the doors when you exit, this causes problems for riders behind you who are
  still trying to exit.
- If you are traveling with a large group, spread out and use all doors when entering and exiting, do not try to all get on through the same set of doors. Each car has 3 sets of doors, utilize all of them. This will ensure that everyone is able to get on the car before the doors close.
- It is best to avoid trains during morning and evening rush hours if you have large suitcases, strollers, etc, as trains are typically extremely crowded.
- Pay attention to the final destination indicated on the front and side of each train.
   Not all trains go all the way to the end of each line, some terminate early during certain hours and for special events.
- Transfer stations (where multiple lines cross) are extremely busy, especially
  during rush hours, so use care when in these stations and be aware of your
  surroundings.

#### **Buses**

The DC-Circulator buses are tourist friendly and akin to shuttles. They run on a predictable fixed route and schedule, and run principally between main attractions and the city's most popular neighborhoods. All DC-Circulator routes run every 10 minutes and cost \$1. There are currently 5 routes:

- Georgetown-Union Station "yellow" line runs between Georgetown and Union Station Su-Th 7am-Midnight, F-Sa 7am-Midnight (and Midnight-2am from Georgetown to Farragut Square).
- Convention Center-SW Waterfront "red" line runs between Southwest
   Waterfront and the Washington Convention Center 7am-9pm daily.
- Smithsonian/National Gallery of Art Loop "purple" line loops the perimeter of the National Mall Sa-Su 10am-6pm.

 Woodley Park-Adams Morgan-McPherson Square "green" line – runs between the Zoo, U street, Adams Morgan, and McPherson Square Su-Th 7am-Midnight and F-Sa 7am-3:30am.

The Washington Metro Area Transit Authority (WMATA), who operates the Metro Rail line also runs an extensive bus service called Metrobus. It is geared towards locals, and can be a bit confusing as not all stops are listed on route maps. However it takes you many places that are hard to reach by Metro rail or the Circulator. WMATA's website (<a href="www.wmata.com">www.wmata.com</a>) published route maps and timetables for all routes. Fares typically cost a flat rate of \$1.35 and exact change is required. Metrobus also offers real time "Nextbus" feature. Each stop has a number on it which you can enter online or over the phone (202-637-7000) and get an accurate estimate of when the next bus will arrive.

#### Taxi

Taxi fares within the metropolitan area are based on a standardized time/distance metered system. Taxis cost \$3.00 for the first sixth of a mile and  $25\phi$  for each additional sixth of a mile. The maximum fair *within* D.C. is \$19, excluding standard fees (\$1.50/additional passenger, and a 25% fee during declared snow emergencies). There is no "rush hour" fee, but meters do charge  $25\phi$  for each minute stopped in traffic or traveling under 10mph. Most cabs only accept cash. # Driving

Driving in DC is difficult, and even most locals avoid driving downtown when they can help it. The street layout is complex and not always well marked (Washingtonians will proudly joke that it was designed to confuse invading armies). There is also endless traffic, limited and expensive parking, strict parking enforcement, confusing traffic circles, fines from automated red light cameras and speed traps, frequent street direction changes, and multiple street closures do to events and/or construction. If you are driving within the city, make sure you have detailed accurate directions, give

yourself plenty of time to reach your destination, and listen to radio traffic reports for areas to avoid.
