*These States are projected to have the permanent-law Extended Benefits (EB) program in place throughout June. This may allow individuals to switch from the expiring Emergency Unemployment Compensation (EUC) program into EB in those States in June. However, individuals in these States would lose eligibility for up to 53 weeks of EUC benefits, resulting in significant exhaustion rates later in the year. (The maximum EB benefit is 20 weeks.) Additionally, without current full federal financing for EB and without the EUC program, these States would be required to pay out significantly more UI benefits, increasing pressure on them to raise taxes.
