

### Congressman Bruce Braley: Working to Improve Mental Health Services

## Helped pass into law H.R. 1424, the Paul Wellstone Mental Health and Addiction Equity Act of 2007

- This legislation provides critical, life-saving mental health care to millions of Americans, and reduces the burdens on our already overtaxed hospital system by treating mental illness and addiction disorders sooner.
- The bill requires insurance companies to cover mental health to the same extent that they cover physical health.
- Rep. Braley was a cosponsor the bill and helped shepherd it through the House, until it became law in 2008.

### Rep. Braley passed legislation into law to study ways to improve mental health services for the spouses and children of Guard and Reserve

• Congressman Braley authored and passed an amendment to H.R. 1585, the National Defense Authorization Act, requiring the Department of Defense to conduct a study on implementing a peer-to-peer National Guard and Reserve spouses' counseling program, and a program to provide mental health and other support services for the children of Guard and Reserve members.

### Rep. Braley authored and introduced HR 2201, the Medicare Equity and Accessibility Act of 2007

• This legislation would increase Medicare Part B reimbursement rates for health care professionals in Iowa and other rural states in order to help Iowa retain doctors and improve patient access to quality healthcare. This legislation would institute a permanent floor on the Geographic Practice Cost Indexes under Medicare Part B, directly increasing the Medicare Part B reimbursement to Iowa health care providers.

#### Working to designate a National Brain Injury Awareness Month

• Rep. Braley is a cosponsor of H. Con. Res. 40, which expresses the need for enhanced public awareness of traumatic brain injury and support for the designation of a National Brain Injury Awareness Month.

### Fighting the pending Medicare cut to reimbursements, working to replace the SGR, and expanding and improving S-CHIP

- Rep. Braley has repeatedly spoken on record, sent letters, and urged his colleagues in the House and Senate to stop the pending cuts to Medicare reimbursements. However, on January 1, 2010, a 21% cut to Medicare Part B reimbursements will go into effect unless Congress acts again this year.
- Rep. Braley was glad to previously avoid a cut to Medicare reimbursements, by supporting legislation that eliminated a proposed 10% cut in 2009, and instead enacted a 1.1% increase to Medicare reimbursements under Part B for all of 2009.
- Rep. Braley also supported HR 3162, the *Children's Health and Medicare Protection (CHAMP) Act of 2007*, which passed the House on August 1, 2007 by a vote of 225-204. The CHAMP Act replaces the SGR as the mechanism for setting Medicare's physician payment rates with a new system that creates six different categories of physician services.

## *In the 110<sup>th</sup> Congress, introduced H.R. 1541, the Coming Together for Guard and Reserve Families Act*

• This legislation, authored and introduced by Congressman Braley, expands mental health services and support for the families of National Guard and Reserve troops throughout the cycle of deployment.

# In the 110<sup>th</sup> Congress, Rep. Braley was an original co-sponsor of H.R. 327, the Joshua Omvig Veterans Suicide Prevention Act, which passed into law with Rep. Braley's support

• This legislation, which passed the House *unanimously* on March 21, 2007, requires the Veterans Administration (VA) to develop and implement a comprehensive veterans suicide prevention program, to provide 24-hour mental health care services to veterans, and to ensure that a suicide prevention counselor be available at every VA facility.

#### *In the 110<sup>th</sup> Congress, co-sponsor of H.R. 2199, the Traumatic Brain Injury Health Enhancement and Long-Term Support Act of 2007*

• This legislation requires the Department of Veterans Affairs to screen veterans for TBI, calls for a comprehensive program of long-term care for post-acute TBI rehabilitation, creates a TBI veteran health registry; and expands VA resources to provide rural communities with mobile vet centers for mental health services and benefits outreach. This bill passed the House by a vote of 421-0 on May 23, 2007.
