## Did You Know... November 11th, 2009 Marks the 55th Anniversary of Veterans Day?

During World War I, the Allied nations and Germany signed an armistice and ceased combat on November 11<sup>th</sup>, 1918. Democratic President Woodrow Wilson commemorated the day as Armistice Day and, in 1954, Congress expanded the meaning of the holiday by declaring November 11<sup>th</sup> as Veteran's Day—to honor veterans of all American wars. As we come together to thank our men and women in uniform, we hope you will find this information helpful.

## **VETERANS BILLS FROM THE 111<sup>TH</sup> CONGRESS SIGNED INTO LAW INCLUDE:**

- The Veterans Health Care Budget Reform and Transparency Act of 2009 (P.L. 111-81) that ensures timely funding to support the delivery of high quality medical care for our veterans by authorizing Congress to approve investments in Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) medical care, and requiring the President to request those funds, one year in advance.
- The Supplemental Appropriations Act of 2009 (P.L. 111-32) that expands the Post-9/11 G.I. Bill by covering full college tuition for children of service members killed on active duty since September 11, 2001.
- The American Recovery and Reinvestment Act (P.L. 111-5) that provides an economic stimulus payment of \$250 to 2 million disabled veterans and a \$1.4 billion increase for the Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) to maintain, construct and repair VA medical facilities.

LANCE CORPORAL **JOSÉ ANTONIO GUTIERREZ** War: Irad **Branch: Marine** Corps

In 2003, at the age of 22, Gutierrez became one of the first soldiers to be killed in Iraq. Born in Guatemala, he

made a 2,000 mile journey as an orphan to come to America and died before receiving his U.S. citizenship.<sup>1</sup> More than 45,000 non-citizens were serving in the United States Armed Forces as of March 2007.<sup>2</sup> Gutierrez's citizenship certificate, backdated to his death on March 21, 2003, was

presented to his adoptive mother at his memorial service.<sup>3</sup>



**CAPTAIN CAROLYN HISAKO TANAKA** War: Vietnam War **Branch: Army Nurse** Corps

Hisako was six years old when her family was evicted from their California home, in the wake of Pearl Harbor, and

relocated to an internment camp in Arizona. After the war, her family returned to find their California home burned to the ground. Despite this painful memory, she applied her experience as an emergency room nurse to the Army, enlisting in 1966 and telling skeptics, "I have a skill that is needed in Vietnam, and I'm going there to do my duty for my country."



FIRST LIEUTENANT **ROBERT P. MADISON** War: World War II **Branch: Army** 

Madison fought in World War II as part of the 92<sup>nd</sup> Division all-black cavalry unit known as the "Buffalo Soldiers" and featured in the novel and film, Miracle at

*St. Anna*. He earned a Purple Heart for wounds received in action in Italy. President Harry Truman signed an order desegregating the U.S. Armed Forces two years after the war.<sup>5</sup> Madison went on to earn a graduate degree from Harvard University, was a Fulbright Scholar, and founded Ohio's first African American owned architecture firm.
