Some facts you should know


- A national study by the Kaiser Family Foundation found that 22% of young adults (ages 15-24) in the U.S. felt that they had done something sexually that they didn't really want to do.
- 61% of young adults feel that waiting to have sex is a nice idea, but nobody really does.
- 76% of young adults have learned a lot from their friends about sexual health.
- 58 % of young adults felt pressure to have sex by a certain age.
- According to a study by NPR/Kaiser/Kennedy School of Government at Harvard, 36 % of parents said "that [teens] might have sexual intercourse before they are psychologically and emotionally ready."
- That compares with 29 percent who said their biggest concern was disease (23 percent said HIV/AIDS and 6 percent said other sexually transmitted diseases) and 23 percent who said pregnancy.










Who are you most comfortable talking to about sexual topics? (Rank 1 to 5, 1 being your first choice.)






Most students become sexually active because they are ... (rank from 1 to 4, 1 being your first choice)






The reason most students get involved in a relationship is...

(Rank from 1 to 5, 1 being your first choice)






The reason I wouldn't want to be in a relationship is... (Rank from 1 to 3, 1 being your first choice)






Do you feel that schools have a responsibility to education their students about sex?






Teaching teenagers about STDs does a lot in preventing teens from having sex.






There have been times when I have regretted being involved in a sexual activity.






How much pressure do you feel from your peers to engage in sexual activity?






How much pressure do you place on your peers to engage in sexual activity?




Having sex in high school is too early.






Premarital sex is OK and should be neither discouraged nor encouraged.






Sexual promiscuity in high school should not be shameful.






Sexual Activities on TV, radio and magazines accurately reflect sexual activity at my high school.






Girls who have sex get a bad reputation (for sexual activity) at school.






Boys who have sex get a bad reputation (for sexual activity) at school.




I would rather be in a relationship than be single.






Are you in a relationship currently?






Being in a relationship means it is OK to have sex.






It is important to me to talk about sexual activities with my partner before they happen.






It is important to me to talk about past relationships/sexual history with my partner.






I worry about being pressured to go farther than I want to sexually.






I would date someone who had a reputation for being sexually active.






My friends are sexually active.



Fast Forward




Engaging in sexual activity is emotionally risky.






I would feel upset if I had sex and my partner talked about it with friends.






I would feel bad about myself if I had sex and then the relationship ended.

Call to Action

Government

- Expand funding for current research to analyze and evaluate Bush's abstinence only program
- Promote teen sexual responsibility and awareness of the emotional consequences of sex much like anti-drug campaigns
- Possible subcommittee hearing in Congress to discuss what SAC found
- Working with State Legislators

Schools

- Provide information on topics regarding sex
- Reevaluate the effectiveness of current sexual education programs to include the emotional consequences of sex
- Send representatives to School Board meetings
- Training or presentation during Teacher In Service Days
- Health class requirement extended to private schools
- School board reviews effectiveness of its programs on sex



Call to Action: Cont'd CA15th SAC

Community

- Break the silence about the emotional consequences
- Make information on the emotional consequences of sex more available
- Make sure teenagers feel heard
- Reexamine effectiveness of pledge programs
- Community forum to address questions on the issue

Parents

- Be OPEN
- Know what resources are available for your children
- Understand your children's hormones
- Open discussion about emotions involved instead of blind eye

Media

- Send letters signed by Michael Honda and SAC members to channels such as NBC, ABC encouraging reevaluation of portrayal of teens in primetime TV
- Have Rep. Honda and SAC students record a PSA
