


	LEBANON COUNTY
	Lebanon County has benefitted significantly from the Recovery Act. As a direct result, over 62,000 constituents received a tax cut. In addition, Lebanon County has received over \$36 million in funding for education, transportation, and infrastructure and other projects.

Education	<p>The Recovery Act is providing much-needed federal funding for local school districts. School districts are using these funds for a variety of purposes, including special education, educational technology, and basic education needs. These funds have unequivocally prevented the elimination of teaching positions and have helped stabilize education budgets throughout the Commonwealth. Specific awards in Lebanon County include:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ➤ \$927,589 to the Annville-Cleona School District ➤ \$2,273,554 to the Cornwall-Lebanon School District ➤ \$1,291,176 to the Eastern Lebanon County School District ➤ \$4,560,994 to the Lebanon School District ➤ \$1,547,876 to the Northern Lebanon School District ➤ \$1,424,329 to the Palmyra Area School District

Transportation and Infrastructure	<p>The Recovery Act is helping Pennsylvania revitalize its transportation infrastructure through highway resurfacing and bridge rehabilitation projects. It is also providing funding for key infrastructure projects designed to improve water quality. Specific awards in Lebanon County include:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ➤ \$6,377,851 for resurfacing and Safety improvements on US Route 22 from Lincoln School Road to Lancaster Street ➤ \$1,174,273 to the Lebanon, PA area, in the form of Transit Capital Assistance
