WESTMORELAND COUNTY



Westmoreland County has benefitted significantly from the Recovery Act. As a direct result, over 163,000 constituents received a tax cut. In addition, Westmoreland County has received over \$92 million in funding for education, transportation, and infrastructure and other projects.

Education

The Recovery Act is providing much-needed federal funding for local school districts. School districts are using these funds for a variety of purposes, including special education, educational technology, and basic education needs. These funds have unequivocally prevented the elimination of teaching positions and have helped stabilize education budgets throughout the Commonwealth. Transportation and Infrastructure

The Recovery Act is helping Pennsylvania revitalize its transportation infrastructure through highway resurfacing and bridge rehabilitation projects. It is also providing funding for key infrastructure projects designed to improve water quality. Specific awards in Westmoreland County include:

- ➤ 163,416 residents of Westmoreland County have enjoyed federal tax relief as a result of the Recovery Act
- ➤ 20,300 jobless adults will receive a boost in unemployment compensation
- ➤ 15,700 unemployed persons qualify for more help purchasing health insurance
- ➤ 53,324 low income children and adults will continue to have access to health care through Medical Assistance
- ➤ 38,377 children and adults will receive more help through the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (Food Stamps)
