Unlocking American's Energy Future by Congressman Roy Blunt

For more than a decade, I have consistently advocated a balanced approach to lowering energy prices for the people of Southwest Missouri – an approach that expands access to American energy resources, promotes conservation, and encourages investment in the next generation of energy technology.

We learned again this summer that the cost of fuel to power a car or truck has a dramatic impact on the family budget. Gasoline prices that topped out in Southwest Missouri at \$3.90 a gallon (more than \$4.50 a gallon in some places) this summer cut driving by more than 10 billion miles

in America and forced families and businesses to make painful decisions.

I heard those stories at gas pumps, diners, and roundtable discussions across the Ozarks. Family outings and dinners, trips to ballgames, movies and vacations all fell victim to never

before seen gasoline prices. Even as gas prices have come back down to earth this fall, that pain still resonates – with motorists rightly fearing that high prices will return.

In my judgment, the key to preventing what we saw this past summer is to produce more American energy. The United States is not oil poor, but access to those plentiful resources has been off limits for nearly three decades. This October, under constant pressure from motorists and fearful of a return of \$4 gas, the majority in Congress allowed its long-standing moratorium on offshore energy exploration to expire.

But this is only a first step. We need to make sure the expiration of the offshore energy ban actually translates into the acquisition of new energy. Bureaucracy on its own ensures that process is time consuming as environmental assessments are followed by lengthy comment periods before the first drop of oil is even produced. Unfortunately, that's not even where the real struggle begins.

The real battle for energy independence and affordability will shift to the courts, as a relatively small number of radical organizations look to

Blunt worked to extend critical tax incentives in Congress' final days

A longtime advocate of providing tax incentives for charitable giving to help the nation's neediest, Congressman Roy Blunt shepherded through an extension of these important tax incentives. late September.

Congressman Roy Blunt said, "This facility will provide the quality of care our veterans deserve. I'm glad the VA saw the same need that Senator Bond and I did to add a second clinic in Southwest Missouri. With record high gas prices, our veterans deserve convenient health care facilities in their own communities."

Initially, the CBOC will house two primary care teams and mental health services. Audiology, optometry, home based primary care, pharmacy, laboratory, radiology and additional services will become available in the near future as the CBOC expands in response to increased patient traffic.

The VA anticipates the Branson CBOC will serve 900 existing patients and 3,900 new patients. The new Branson location will save many of them trips to Mt. Vernon or Fayetteville, Ar-

kansas to see a VA doctor.

The Center will improve veterans' access to primary and specialty care, especially in rural, historically underserved areas. Services will include comprehensive primary care, health promotion, maintenance, routine/urgent care procedures and education. On the mental health side, the Center will include a wide range of

ing, and assessment/evaluation and therapy.

The VA has also decided to locate a new Veterans Center in Greene County next year, as one of 39 new VA community centers that will be opened around the country in 2009. The center will specialize in counseling and mental health services for veterans who served in combat.

"It is critical that we improve treatment for our service members and veterans suffering with mental injuries like Post Traumatic Stress Disorder and increasing access to Vets Centers are an important part of that effort," said Senator Bond. "I hope the Pentagon will also give active-duty troops access to these communitybased counseling centers, which is a key provision in my bipartisan bill to care better for our wounded heroes."

The existing 232 VA centers conduct commu-

nity outreach, offering counseling on employment, family issues and education to combat veterans and family members as well as bereavement counseling for families of service members killed on active duty. They are staffed by small teams of professional counselors and social workers, many of whom were combat veterans. The services are made

available at no

cost to combat veterans of any war era. Missouri has two other existing centers in St. Louis and Kansas City.



Congress further extended the critical provisions of the bill."

In the final weeks of the legislative session of Congress, Blunt made sure the following provisions were included in the Charitable Giving Act that was extended through 2009:

- Extended tax-free distributions from IRAs to charities (not to exceed \$100,000 per year) – saving taxpayers \$795 million;
- Enhanced charitable deduction for donations of food inventories to food banks and pantries – saving taxpayers \$123 million;
- Enhanced charitable deduction for donation of book inventories – saving taxpayers \$49 million;
- Enhanced charitable deduction for donations of computer equipment – saving taxpayers \$365 million; and
- Extension of the basis adjustment to stock of S Corporations making charitable contributions – saving taxpayers \$132 million.



DTV Transition and the Coupon Program

What is the digital television transition?

At midnight on February 17, 2009, all full-power television stations in the United States will stop broadcasting in analog and switch to 100% digital broadcasting. Digital broadcasting promises to provide a clearer picture and more programming options and will free up airwaves for use by emergency responders.

What is the TV Converter Box Coupon Program?

Congress created the TV Converter Box Coupon Program for households wishing to keep using their analog TV sets after February 17, 2009. The Program allows U.S. households to obtain up to two coupons, each worth \$40, that can be applied toward the cost of eligible converter boxes.

A TV connected to cable, satellite or other pay TV service does not require a TV converter box.

Consumers have a variety of options. Options to explore include:

- 1. Keeping your existing analog TV and purchase a TV converter box. A converter box plugs into your TV and will keep it working after Feb. 17, 2009, or
- 2. Connecting to cable, satellite or other pay service, or
- 3. Purchasing a television with a digital tuner.

Between January 1, 2008, and March 31, 2009, you can request a coupon while supplies last in one of four ways:



"Access to information and reliable communications can be a matter of life-and-death in law enforcement," said Blunt. "The benefit of these grants goes far beyond just the Sheriff's Department, or any one law enforcement agency in the county," said Greene County Sheriff Jack Merritt. "These grants fund systems that allow officers from all the agencies in the county to do their jobs better and faster." ★ Private First Class John M. Kalita (pictured second from the left) waited more than 60 years to receive the Bronze Star he earned while serving in the World War II European Theater in 1945. 
★ Ernest Cowherd of Purdy also received his Bronze Star from World War II service after being wounded 63-years ago in the leg and hip while serving in the Philippines. Cowherd's grandson, finding the Bronze Star missing from his World War II medals, encouraged his grandfather to apply for the medal he earned, but never received. Congressman Blunt's office was contacted for help in that effort and the Bronze Star arrived in the mail within 60 days.

★ A Stone County property owner challenged and won reestablishment of his original property boundaries with the U.S. Forest Service but was never reimbursed for the \$784 in out of pocket expenses. He turned to Congressman Blunt, who wrote the Secretary of Agriculture. The secretary authorized the reimbursement of the constituent's expenses.

★ Two students from Missouri Southern State University were headed to Chile as part of an exchange program when each learned they needed a visa requiring an FBI background check. Learning of the problem, Congressman Blunt's office arranged for the two women to be fingerprinted by the FBI. With only four weeks before departure and the average visa processing time at four weeks, Blunt's constituent advocates requested consideration for expedited services and overcame the deadline with two weeks to spare.

★ A Republic woman sought help from Congressman Blunt for what was reported to be a delinquent loan from the USDA. Congressman Blunt's office learned it was an accounting error. The Rural Development agency reversed the error, and posted her payments, showing the account current. The inquiry was completed within 30 days. The error was also reported to credit reporting agencies to show her account as "in good standing."

★ A Springfield resident came to Congressman Blunt to acquire her deceased father's military records which were lost in a house fire. Congressman Blunt's constituent advocate, Sue Ellen Ball, contacted the National Personnel Record Center in St. Louis and asked for any



★ A Lawrence County couple attempting to adopt a 13-year-old child in China they were concerned by an approaching deadline that may have halted the adoption. Congressman Blunt's office sent an e-mail seeking expedited consideration for the adoption. In less than 30 days the expedited petition was approved for the adoption, keeping it on track.

★ A Rogersville family filed a Privacy Act Release Form with Congressman Blunt because they were six years behind in filing taxes while serving as missionaries in Russia. The family believed they had overpaid their taxes and asked for a refund. The IRS declined to make refunds after more than two years of discussions. Working with the Taxpayer Advocate, Congressman Blunt learned the IRS relented and agreed to refund more than \$5,000 in tax overpayments.

★ An Army veteran from Springfield came to Congressman Blunt's advocate Jon Bledsoe seeking help with a debt from the VA, who wanted reimbursement of funds from his non-service connected pension. Blunt's office helped him request a waiver to pay back more than \$25,000. After several attempts to negotiate a resolution with the VA, it was determined that the pension was not obtained fraudulently and the waiver was granted.

★ When a 100% service-connected disabled veteran remarried, he tried unsuccessfully for a year to get the VA to add his new family members to his benefits. He came to Congressman Blunt for help. Within three weeks, the VA added his new dependents to his benefit and issued a \$2,100 back-payment.

★ A woman caring for her disabled World War II veteran father came to Congressman Blunt to get promised benefits that were to begin in October 2007, but had not yet been received nine months later. Only two weeks later the VA recognized the lapse and began paying benefits for nursing home care. It came just in time; family funds had expired to maintain care for the 78 year old veteran. desirability of offering an insurance benefit to federal employees that would provide wage replacement during absences related to a health condition. It also provides that the bill's requirements not apply to births occurring within six months of the bill's enactment. **YES Passed 422-0**

>427 6/19/08 H.R. 5781 Motion to recommit the bill to the Oversight and Government Reform Committee with instructions that it be reported back promptly with language that would bar employees who do not comply with court-ordered child support arrangements from being eligible for the paid leave provisions. **YES Failed 206-220**

>428 6/19/08 H.R. 5781 Providing that four of the 12 weeks of parental leave given to federal and congressional employees would be paid leave. Employees could also use accrued annual or sick leave for parental leave and would not be required to demonstrate a medical need for using their sick time for that purpose. ≻430 6/19/08 H. Res. 1230 Calling on all Zimbabwean security forces, informal militias and individuals to immediately cease their attacks and condemn the orchestrated campaign of violence conducted by the ruling party. YES Passed* 412-1

>431 6/19/08 H.R. 2642 Motion to concur in the Senate amendment to the House amendment to appropriate \$165.4 billion for the wars in Iraq and Afghanistan, including \$99.5 billion for military operations for FY2008 and \$65.9 billion for FY2009. YES Passed 268-155

>432 6/19/08 H.R. 2642 Motion to concur in the Senate amendment to the House amendment with an additional amendment. The House amendment would appropriate \$21.1 billion for domestic programs, including \$2.7 billion for disaster relief in the Midwest and \$5.8 billion for FY2009 to rebuild levees in Louisiana. It would provide for a permanent expansion of education benefits for post-Sept. 11 veterans and cut \$3.6 billion from funding for the wars in Iraq and Afghanistan to fund domestic programs. > 437 6/20/08 H.R. 6304 Overhauling the Foreign Intelligence Surveillance Act (FISA), which governs electronic surveillance of foreign terrorism suspects. The bill allows the attorney

general and director of national intelligence to jointly authorize, for up to one year, investigations involving surveillance targeting those who are not U.S. persons and who are reasonably believed to be outside the United States. The FISA court would have to approve procedures for conducting the surveillance. Under the bill, warrantless surveillance would be allowed as long as it does not intentionally target U.S. persons or persons located within the United States, excluding foreign agents. It allows for retroactive liability immunity for telecommunications companies alleged to have participated in the National Security Agency's warrantless surveillance program. The bill's provisions sunset on Dec. 31, 2012, but warrants would remain in effect until they expire. YES Passed 293-129

≻438 6/23/08 H. Res. 1242 Honoring the 100th anniversary of Louis Jordan's birth and recognizing his contributions to American music as a musician, composer and entertainer. YES Passed* 348-0

≻439 6/23/08 H. Con. Res. 372 Supporting the goals and ideals of Black Music Month, honoring the contributions that African-American singers and musicians have made, and calling on Americans to celebrate African-American music. YES Passed* 353-0

≻440 6/23/08 H. Res. 1051 Congratulating James Madison University for 100 years of leadership and service to Virginia and the United States. YES Passed* 354-0

≻443 6/24/08 H.R. 6331 Replacing a 10.6 percent cut in payments to physicians treating Medicare patients, scheduled to take effect on July 1, by holding payments at current rates for 18 months and providing for a 1.1 percent increase in 2009 and then cutting payments thereafter. The bill provides an additional \$4 billion over five years and \$16.6 billion over 10 years for changes to Medicare beneficiary programs and eliminates a higher co-payment rate for Medicare outpatient psychiatric services. It would be partially offset by requiring private "fee for service" plans to form networks with health care providers, thereby slowing the plans' rate of growth by eliminating private "fee for service" in many rural areas. ≻444 6/24/08 H.R. 5876 An amendment to strike the exclusion of psychiatric residential treatment facilities and the exclusion of foster care group homes from the bill's definition of residential treatment programs. The amendment also eliminates required unannounced site inspections of covered programs at least once every two years, and requires the Department of Health and Human Services to report to Congress on the activities of the national toll-free hotline established in the bill. USDA Issues \$445,000 in Energy Efficiency Grants to 13 Ozarks Farms

The U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) recently selected 13 local poultry producers to receive more than \$445,000 in federal grants to promote renewable energy and efficiency systems. These grants will allow area businesses to develop, install, and utilize renewable energy systems likely to save them a total of more than 325,000 gallons of propane each year.

"Southwest Missouri farmers are among the most innovative small business owners in the country, always looking for new ways to reduce their costs and increase production," Congressman Roy Blunt said. "We saw during the annual agriculture tour that poultry producers are experimenting with burning low-quality hay, corn, wood and wood chips to reduce their soaring propane costs. These innovations are helping reduce their reliance on nonrenewable energy while at the same time having a positive impact on our community."

Carla Hurn of Verona said, "This is such a blessing. Using wood pellets in place of propane, I can save \$107,000 per year in heating costs for my eight poultry houses." Similarly,

"The Farm Bill also includes language that removes a 40 year-old law keeping state-inspected meats—beef, lamb, pork, goat and poultry—from being marketed across state lines," Blunt said. "I couldn't find a good reason—scientific or political—for this law. If we want to open markets for agriculture products, we ought to start at home."

The law change will allow 2,000 state-inspected meat processors—more than two dozen of them in Missouri—to start marketing their products nationwide after passing state meat inspections. This measure will promote the local livestock sector of agriculture without compromising food safety that consumers demand.

The bill extends dozens of expired or expiring tax provisions, including several energy tax provisions. It provides a one-year adjustment to exempt more than 20 million taxpayers from paying the alternative minimum tax on 2008 income and require private insurance plans to put mental health benefits on par with other medical benefits. Deadly Tornadoes, Floods and Ice Bring Disaster Declarations

President Bush issued six disaster declarations over twelve months for several counties in Southwest Missouri. Federal agencies came to the aid of individuals and local governments to put families and businesses back on their feet as a series of lethal storms hit the region.

Tornadoes swept through Barry, Jasper and Newton Counties in Missouri, taking 16 lives, plus another six people were killed in Oklahoma. One storm cut a path of destruction from near Seneca to Purdy. In January, tornadoes damaged schools, homes and businesses in Greene County.

Flooding prompted three presidential disaster declarations from January into April. Heavy rains pushed the White River to record levels and

FISA Reforms Are Making America Safer

A long-needed modernization to the Foreign

Intelligence Surveillance Act (FISA) negotiated by Congressman Roy Blunt will make our nation safer and more secure, while at the same time safeguarding and strengthening the freedoms of every American.

For years, our intelligence community has been forced to track 21st century terrorist organizations under a set of rules designed to counter

a 20th-century threat. Unfortunately, we now face a sinuous, resilient and constantly adapting terrorist enemy - a threat that legislation originally written in 1978 couldn't adequately address without this much-needed modernization.

Blunt said, "This update is every bit a victory

"I am pleased that after months of work, we were able to strike the delicate balance of granting our intelligence officials the resources and freedoms they need while strengthening the freedoms of Americans," Blunt said.

Blunt Secures Grant for Tornado Safe Room in Seneca

Congressman Roy Blunt helped secure a \$1.5 million grant from the Federal Emergency Management Agency to construct a community tornado safe room in the Seneca R-7 School District. The 13,557 square-foot structure will provide protection for more than 2,700 people in the storm prone area and is designed to withstand 250 mile per hour winds.

"This year Southwest Missouri witnessed some of the worst nature has to offer," Blunt said. "The Seneca area bore the brunt of a massive line of tornadoes and paid too great a price. I hope we never experience another disaster of that magnitude and this shelter is never put to use, but if needed it will be well worth the investment."

Seneca Superintendent of Schools Rick Cook said, "We're excited about getting this facility for our community. We applied a year ago and just last spring, in the space of three weeks, we had one tornado that missed our school by just two



miles and another that came within five miles."

FEMA's Hazard Mitigation Grant Program is intended to reduce the loss of life and property, lessen the impact to local communities due to natural disasters, and enable recovery after a disaster. FEMA will pay 75 percent of the project costs and the Seneca R-7 School District will contribute the remaining 25 percent.

Social Security Recipients to See Benefit Increase

In 2009, Southwest Missouri residents on Social Security will receive about \$60 more each month thanks to this year's 5.8 percent cost of living adjustment (COLA). This is the largest increase in a quarter century and is more than double the 2.3 percent COLA in 2008.

The Social Security Act sets a formula that compares the increase in the average Consumer Price Index for Urban Wage Earners and Clerical Workers from the third quarter of 2007 to the third quarter of 2008 to estimate each year's COLA.

The Medicare Part B monthly premium will remain at \$96.40 in 2009, the first year since 2000 that there was no increase in previous year's premium. Medicare Part B covers a portion of the cost of physicians' services, outpatient hospital services, certain home health services and durable medical equipment.

Medicare Beneficiaries Should Review, Compare Their Current Plan

Medicare beneficiaries can make changes to their plans through December 31. Everyone with Medicare benefits should review their current health or prescription drug plan to make sure it meets their needs. Those without prescription drug coverage can also enroll in a drug plan during this annual enrollment period, but all changes must be completed by December 31 in order to take effect in 2009.

Last year, two-thirds of all Medicare beneficiaries reviewed their plan options, one-third compared more than one plan, and 3.1 million Medicare beneficiaries – about 12% - changed their plan. It is always a good idea to review your plan options because the cost and coverage provided by a Medicare plan can change, as can a person's health status.

Medicare beneficiaries in Missouri may experience significant changes – and maybe reduced coverage – if they stay with their current plan. There are nearly 50 drug benefit plans available in Southwest Missouri starting at \$14.50 a month. A dozen plans offer coverage during the gap for some, many or all generics drugs with premium costs running from



seniors, nearly half have a drug component offering gap coverage. While reduced coverage sounds like a bad thing, for many healthy seniors a less expensive and less inclusive plan makes the most economic sense.
