



Committee Passes COMPETES with Bipartisan Support : *Legislation to Advance Innovation & Strengthen American Competitiveness in the 21st Century*

On April 28, the Full Committee approved an Amendment in the Nature of a Substitute to H.R. 5116, the *America COMPETES Reauthorization Act of 2010*, by a vote of 29 to 8. The bill makes investments in science, innovation, and education to strengthen the U.S. scientific and economic leadership, support employers, and create jobs in the short-, mid-, and long-term. Over 140 organizations have endorsed the bill, including the U.S. Chamber of Commerce, the National Association of Manufacturers, the Business Roundtable, and the American Chemical Society.

"The statistics speak for them themselves. More than half of our economic growth since World War II can be directly attributed to development and adoption of new technologies. The path is simple. Research and education lead to innovation. Innovation leads to economic development and good paying jobs," stated **Chairman Bart Gordon**.
