A BILL

- To establish the Twenty-First Century Water Commission to study and develop recommendations for a comprehensive water strategy to address future water needs.
 - 1 Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
 - 2 tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,

3 SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.

- 4 This Act may be cited as the "Twenty-First Century
- 5 Water Commission Act of 2009".

6 SEC. 2. FINDINGS.

7 Congress finds that—

(1) the Nation's water resources will be under increasing stress and pressure in the coming dec-

3 ades;

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4 (2) a thorough assessment of technological and 5 economic advances that can be employed to increase 6 water supplies or otherwise meet water needs in 7 every region of the country is important and long 8 overdue; and

9 (3) a comprehensive strategy to increase water 10 availability and ensure safe, adequate, reliable, and 11 sustainable water supplies is vital to the economic 12 and environmental future of the Nation.

13 SEC. 3. ESTABLISHMENT.

There is established a commission to be known as the
"Twenty-First Century Water Commission" (in this Act
referred to as the "Commission").

17 SEC. 4. DUTIES.

18 The duties of the Commission shall be to—

(1) use existing water assessments and conduct
such additional assessments as may be necessary to
project future water supply and demand;

(2) study current water management programs
of Federal, interstate, State, and local agencies, and
private sector entities directed at increasing water

1	supplies and improving the availability, reliability,
2	and quality of freshwater resources; and
3	(3) consult with representatives of such agen-
4	cies and entities to develop recommendations con-
5	sistent with laws, treaties, decrees, and interstate
6	compacts for a comprehensive water strategy
7	which—
8	(A) respects the primary role of States in
9	adjudicating, administering, and regulating
10	water rights and water uses;
11	(B) identifies incentives intended to ensure
12	an adequate and dependable supply of water to
13	meet the needs of the United States for the
14	next 50 years;
15	(C) suggests strategies that avoid in-
16	creased mandates on State and local govern-
17	ments;
18	(D) eliminates duplication and conflict
19	among Federal governmental programs;
20	(E) considers all available technologies and
21	other methods to optimize water supply reli-
22	ability, availability, and quality, while safe-
23	guarding the environment;

1	(F) recommends means of capturing excess
2	water and flood water for conservation and use
3	in the event of a drought;
4	(G) suggests financing options for com-
5	prehensive water management projects and for
6	appropriate public works projects;
7	(H) suggests strategies to conserve existing
8	water supplies, including recommendations for
9	repairing aging infrastructure; and
10	(I) includes other objectives related to the
11	effective management of the water supply to en-
12	sure reliability, availability, and quality, which
13	the Commission shall consider appropriate.
14	SEC. 5. MEMBERSHIP.
15	(a) Number and Appointment.—The Commission
16	shall be composed of 9 members who shall be appointed
17	not later than 90 days after the date of enactment of this
18	Act. Member shall be appointed as follows:
19	(1) 5 members appointed by the President;
20	(2) 2 members appointed by the Speaker of the
21	House of Representatives, in consultation with the
22	minority leader of the House of Representatives; and
23	(3) 2 members appointed by the majority leader
24	of the Senate, in consultation with the minority lead-
25	er of the Senate.

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(b) QUALIFICATIONS.—Members shall be appointed
 to the Commission from among individuals who—

- 3 (1) are of recognized standing and distinction
 4 in water policy issues; and
- 5 (2) while serving on the Commission, do not
 6 hold any other position as an officer or employee of
 7 the United States, except as a retired officer or re8 tired civilian employee of the United States.

9 (c) OTHER CONSIDERATIONS.—In appointing mem-10 bers of the Commission, every effort shall be made to en-11 sure that the members represent a broad cross section of 12 regional and geographical perspectives in the United 13 States.

14 (d) CHAIRPERSON.—The Chairperson of the Com-15 mission shall be designated by the President.

(e) TERMS.—Members of the Commission shall be
appointed not later than 90 days after the date of enactment of this Act and shall serve for the life of the Commission.

20 (f) VACANCIES.—A vacancy on the Commission shall
21 not affect its operation, and shall be filled in the same
22 manner as the original appointment provided under sub23 section (a).

24 (g) COMPENSATION AND TRAVEL EXPENSES.—Mem25 bers of the Commission shall serve without compensation,

except members shall receive travel expenses, including per
 diem in lieu of subsistence, in accordance with applicable
 provisions under subchapter I of chapter 57, United
 States Code.

5 SEC. 6. MEETINGS AND QUORUM.

6 (a) MEETINGS.—The Commission shall hold its first 7 meeting not later than 60 days after the date on which 8 all members have been appointed under section 5, and 9 shall hold additional meetings at the call of the Chair-10 person or a majority of its members.

(b) QUORUM.—A majority of the members of the
Commission shall constitute a quorum for the transaction
of business.

14 SEC. 7. STAFFING.

15 The Chairperson of the Commission may, without regard to the civil service laws and regulations, appoint and 16 terminate an Executive Director and such other additional 17 personnel as may be necessary for the Commission to per-18 form its duties. The Executive Director shall be com-19 20 pensated at a rate not to exceed the annual rate of basic 21 pay for GS-15 of the General Schedule. The employment 22 and termination of the Executive Director shall be subject 23 to confirmation by a majority of the members of the Commission. 24

1 SEC. 8. POWERS AND PROCEEDINGS OF THE COMMISSION.

2 (a) HEARINGS.—The Commission shall hold no fewer 3 than 10 hearings during the life of the Commission. Hearings may be held in conjunction with meetings of the Com-4 5 mission. The Commission may take such testimony and receive such evidence as the Commission considers appro-6 7 priate to carry out this Act. At least 1 hearing shall be 8 held in Washington, DC, for the purpose of taking testi-9 mony of representatives of Federal agencies, national organizations, and Members of Congress. Other hearings 10 11 shall be scheduled in distinct geographical regions of the United States and should seek to ensure testimony from 12 13 individuals with a diversity of experiences, including those who work on water issues at all levels of government and 14 in the private sector. 15

16 (b) INFORMATION AND SUPPORT FROM FEDERAL
17 AGENCIES.—Upon request of the Commission, any Fed18 eral agency shall—

(1) provide to the Commission, within 30 days
of its request, such information as the Commission
considers necessary to carry out the provisions of
this Act; and

(2) detail to temporary duty with the Commission on a reimbursable basis such personnel as the
Commission considers necessary to carry out the

provisions of this Act, in accordance with section
 5(b)(5), Appendix, title 5, United States Code.

3 SEC. 9. REPORTS.

4 (a) INTERIM REPORTS.—Not later than 6 months 5 after the date of the first meeting of the Commission, and 6 every 6 months thereafter, the Commission shall transmit 7 an interim report containing a detailed summary of its 8 progress, including meetings and hearings conducted in 9 the interim period, to—

10 (1) the President;

(2) the Committee on Resources and the Committee on Transportation and Infrastructure of the
House of Representatives; and

14 (3) the Committee on Energy and Natural Re15 sources and the Committee on the Environment and
16 Public Works of the Senate.

17 (b) FINAL REPORT.—As soon as practicable, but not 18 later than 3 years after the date of the first meeting of 19 the Commission, the Commission shall transmit a final re-20 port containing a detailed statement of the findings and 21 conclusions of the Commission, and recommendations for 22 legislation and other policies to implement such findings 23 and conclusions, to—

24 (1) the President;

(2) the Committee on Resources and the Com mittee on Transportation and Infrastructure of the
 House of Representatives; and

4 (3) the Committee on Energy and Natural Re5 sources and the Committee on the Environment and
6 Public Works of the Senate.

7 SEC. 10. TERMINATION.

8 The Commission shall terminate not later than 309 days after the date on which the Commission transmits10 a final report under section 9(b).

11 SEC. 11. AUTHORIZATION OF APPROPRIATIONS.

12 There are authorized to be appropriated \$9,000,00013 to carry out this Act.

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
