DEPARTMENT OF JUSTICE ANNOUNCES BULLETPROOF VEST PARTNERSHIP GRANT

The Bulletproof Vest Partnership (BVP), created by the Bulletproof Vest Partnership Grant Act of 1998 is a unique U.S. Department of Justice initiative designed to provide a critical resource to state and local law enforcement.

Since 1999, over 11,900 jurisdictions have participated in the BVP Program, with \$173 million in federal funds committed to support the purchase of an estimated 450,000 vests. The Office of Justice Programs' Bureau of Justice Assistance (BJA) administers the BVP Program.

The Bureau of Justice Assistance (BJA) is pleased to announce the Fiscal Year (FY) 2008 BVP application funding period.

Deadline: Applications for the FY 2008 cylcle of BVP funds must be submitted via the online BVP system, by 5:00 pm (Eastern Time), Wednesday, April 23, 2008.

Please note that FY 2008 BVP funds may only be used toward the purchase of vests ordered on or after April 1, 2008. Each vest purchased with FY 2008 funds must meet National Institute of Justice (NIJ) standards on the date it was ordered. Beginning with FY 2008 funds, the use period for BVP funds will be two years.

To draw down FY 2008 BVP funds, vests must be received and the request for payment submitted to the BVP system by September 30, 2010. Each applicant should update their profile before filing an application for FY 2008 funds.

IRS RELEASES DRAFT INSTRUCTIONS FOR 2008 FORM 990, SEEKS PUBLIC COMMENT

The Internal Revenue Service is seeking public comments on the <u>draft instructions</u> to the 2008 Form 990, the annual return most tax-exempt organizations must use to report information about their operations. The instructions are for the redesigned Form 990 that organizations will file for their 2008 tax year (returns filed in 2009), which was released in final form in December 2007 (IRS news release IR-2007-204.

The IRS is seeking comments from the public on the 2008 Form 990 instructions, in an effort to make sure the final instructions address the needs of the tax-exempt community. The comment period is open until June 1, 2008. Included with the instructions are special *highlights* lists indicating certain items in the instructions on which the IRS would especially like to receive public comments. As with comments received on the draft Form 990, the IRS plans to post comments on the instructions on its Web site.

The draft 2008 Form 990 instructions are organized according to a consistent format. There is a general overview of the form or schedule explaining its purpose, an explanation of who must file that particular schedule, and then line-by-line instructions to aid in answering each question on the form or schedule.

The draft instructions also contain a number of new tools designed to make it easier for the organization to answer the questions and to promote more uniform reporting. These tools include a comprehensive glossary of terms; a sequencing list to help organizations determine the order in which to fill out parts of the form; a compensation table to help organizations determine how and where to report items of compensation; and many illustrative examples. These aids were developed in response to comments received last year in connection with the draft Form 990.

The event, hosted by the Delta Region Revitalization Corporation, marked the start of construction for this muchanticipated commercial development.

The coming leadership crunch in nonprofits has been in the news for some time. The retirement of the baby boom generation plus the explosive growth of nonprofits in recent years promise a disaster for nonprofits as they look for new leadership.

A recent study, <u>Ready to Lead? Next Generation Leaders Speak</u> <u>Out</u>, by the Casey Foundation, the Eugene and Agnes E. Meyer Foundation, CompassPoint Nonprofit Services, and Idealist.org. probed this problem. The study asked more than 600 nonprofit workers of various ages what problems they find in nonprofit work as well as why they got into it, stuck with it, or contemplated leaving it.

As many as one-third of the workers surveyed said that they were interested in leading a non-profit but most felt that they were not being mentored or groomed for such leadership.

In addition, 69% of the respondents felt underpaid while half of that group worried that they would not have the money to retire comfortably.

People who work in nonprofits generally do so because of the opportunity to do something worthwhile, but a worrying subset of young people may find ways of doing that good outside the conventional nonprofit sector.

Attracting and Keeping the Next Generation of Leaders

The report has some very specific suggestions. For current Executive Directors, it provides this advice:

- Replace outdated power structures. Younger generations do not appreciate traditional hierarchy and expect to be included in decision making.
- Help staff build strong external networks. Invite younger staff
 to attend meetings with funders and colleagues. Give them
 access to the board where they can staff board committees,
 attend and present at board meetings, and help find new
 board members. Send them to community meetings.
- Be a mentor. Serve as a talent scout for future leaders for your own organization and others.
- Be a good role model. Respondents in the study often said

their executive directors were poor models of leadership, sacrificing good work-life balance and courting burnout. Don't leave the impression that 80-hour work weeks are the only essential for leadership.

- Pay reasonable salaries and provide good benefits. Financial sacrifice should no longer be part of the nonprofit business model. Passion will not trump decent pay and reasonable work hours.
- Engage in succession planning. Periodically ask if you are still the right person for the job, and be proactive in attracting and retaining talented staff who might be eligible for future leadership.
 - Become educated about generational differences and don't be judgmental about the priorities of younger staff.
 Boards of Directors are encouraged by the leadership study to consider these actions:
 - Pay reasonable salaries and provide benefits to staff.
 - Look beyond the Executive Director and make sure that leadership is being developed deep in the organization. Support training and recruitment of diverse staff.
- Step out of your comfort zone by recruiting board members from other age groups and backgrounds.

Even funders are exhorted by the study to take actions such as:

- Be willing to fund leadership and training programs. Support succession planning, coaching, and other kinds of professional development.
- Have a conversation with grantees about these issues and be prepared to help with solutions.

Avoid behaviors that make things worse for nonprofits and their leaders. In the study, the challenge of accessing institutional capital was one of the causes of executive burnout. Plus, among next generation leaders, an aversion to fundraising was the primary reason people gave for not aspiring to nonprofit leadership roles.

Doris Duke Charitable Foundation's Arts Program Announces National Projects Fund

Deadline: Open/Rolling

As part of a new initiative to help strengthen the national performing arts sector, the Doris Duke Charitable Foundation's Arts Program will support select national projects that strengthen the health of the dance, jazz, presenting, and/or theater fields. During a two-year pilot phase, the National Projects Fund will award a total of up to \$1 million in grants to support key national projects in the dance, jazz, presenting, and/or theater fields. Grants will range from \$60,000 to \$200,000 each, and cannot exceed 40 percent of a project's total cost. National projects engage a broad national constituency, occur once (or periodically) rather than annually, and have the potential to significantly impact a field. Types of projects eligible for support include national research, national public awareness activities, cross-discipline collaborations (including national meetings or conventions), and other national activities. Single nonprofit organizations and consortia are eligible to apply. Organizations receiving core support from DDCF are not eligible to request additional support from the National Projects Fund for single-discipline activities. Pilot programs that aspire to be a national model are not eligible to apply, nor are national dance, jazz, or theater commissions, productions, or tours. Arts Writers Grant Program Announces New Application Process for Book Proposals

Deadline: 05/05/2008

The Creative Capital | Warhol Foundation Arts Writers Grant is a three-year pilot program designed to support writers whose work addresses contemporary visual art through project-based grants issued directly to individual authors. The grant program is spearheaded by the Andy Warhol Foundation for the Visual Arts as part of its broader Arts Writing Initiative and is administered by Creative Capital. Beginning with the program's 2008 grant cycle, applicants for book projects will no longer be required to submit a letter of strong interest/intent to publish from an editor as part of their proposal. In place of this requirement, the program is implementing a new Letter of Inquiry phase for all book proposals, which will serve as a gateway to the formal grant-application process. The addition of the LOI phase and the elimination of the letter of strong interest/intent to publish will enable the Arts Writers Grant Program to process a higher volume of book proposals and to consider book projects at an earlier stage of their development. LOIs will only be accepted from writers who meet the program's general eligibility requirements and who have been writing professionally on the contemporary visual arts on a regular basis for at least three years; or have previously published a book with a reputable publisher; or have completed a Ph.D. dissertation. There is no LOI phase for writers seeking support in other categories (articles, short-form writing, and blogs/new and alternative media). Those writers may apply directly to the program during the general application phase. (For these projects, the online grant application form opens on August 4, 2008. Grant applications are due September 22, 2008.)

Dance/USA has announced renewed funding for American Masterpieces: Dance - College Component through the support of the National Endowment for the Arts. The AMDCC brings classic American dances of the past century to college students and audiences in communities across the United States. The NEA and Dance/USA welcome projects that embrace choreography from all forms and styles representing the cultural richness of the U.S. and its many dance traditions. Awards are available to reconstruct or restage works by master American choreographers of the twentieth century. These works will increase students' access to and understanding of dance heritage and the role played by artists such as George Balanchine, Bob Fosse, Martha Graham, Susan Marshall, Meredith Monk, Jerome Robbins, and other artists. For all projects, public involvement within and/or beyond the academic community is critical. At each site, performances, panel discussions, lectures, school showings, open rehearsals, film or video showings, symposia or other activities should allow general audiences access to the history of the dance work and the process of creating choreography. Other organizations may collaborate, including musical ensembles, dance companies, community-based dance organizations, presenting institutions, or elementary and high schools. It is permissible for several colleges to collaborate on one project.

Age alone (e.g., youth, seniors) does not qualify a group as underserved; at least one of the underserved characteristics noted here also must be present. This category, as an essential component of the Arts Endowment's goal of providing wide access to artistic excellence, supports local projects that can have significant effects within communities. Grants are available for professional arts programming and for projects that emphasize the potential of the arts in community development.

The National Endowment for the Arts is committed to providing leadership in arts education by inspiring all young Americans through rich arts experiences. A high quality education in the arts opens a critical gateway to a lifetime of appreciation and engagement. For two reasons, learning in the arts is an indispensable part of American education: 1) children celebrate and participate in their cultural inheritance, and 2) academic and social maturity follow directly from arts education experiences. The Learning in the Arts for Children and Youth category offers funding for projects that help children and youth acquire knowledge and understanding of and skills in the arts. Where appropriate, study will include the acquisition of skills relevant to practicing the art form 3) Performance: Informed by their experience and study, students will create artwork. In the case of literature, the primary creative activities will be writing and/or recitation 4) Assessment: Students will be assessed according to national or state arts education standards. Where appropriate, projects will employ multiple forms of assessment including pre- and post-testing.
