CONGRESSMAN RUBÉN HINOJOSA ANNOUNCES MULTI-MILLION DOLLAR GRANT TO CONNECT UNIVERSITY AND COLLEGE SYSTEMS ACROSS SOUTH TEXAS

U.S. Rep. Rubén Hinojosa (TX-15) announced a \$15.7 Million federal grant was awarded to Valley Telephone Cooperative, Inc. (VTX Telecom).

The funds will build more than 150 miles of new underground fiber network in Willacy, Cameron, Hidalgo and Starr counties.

The project is projected to benefit over 300,000 people and over 17,000 businesses and community institutions.

"This is a 20 year commitment to creating jobs and boosting our economic development", said Rep. Hinojosa. "This service

will benefit and expand the surrounding communities and businesses. It is a prime example of how the President's American Recovery and Reinvestment Act is helping our residents of Deep South Texas and our local economy". The "RGV Fiber Optic Me/Ed Foundation Network" as it is being called will specifically connect the University of Texas and Texas A&M University systems and Texas State Technical College and South Texas College in South Texas.



The project is designed to provide fiber optic technologies that will provide faster and broader high-speed connections to all campuses and their 23 satellite educational facilities and the communities surrounding them.

"This is a great opportunity for the four counties and the educational systems that will benefit from this service, said Rep.

Hinojosa. "These universities and colleges will be able to use this free service for their administrative and financial records, crucial research and distant learning. It will also connect the multitude of health and medical services around the Rio Grande Valley".



CONGRESSMAN RUBÉN HINOJOSA ANNOUNCES A QUARTER OF A MILLION DOLLAR GRANT FOR SOUTH TEXAS COLLEGE

U.S. Rep. Rubén Hinojosa (TX-15) announced a \$250,539.00 Interim Associate Dean of Community Engagement and Workgrant was awarded to South Texas College of McAllen by the force Entitlement for STC, Luzelma Canales says this is their United States Department of Education. The funds will be used third CCAMPIS grant. for the Child Care Access Means Parents in School (CCAMPIS) Program which provides campus based child care for lowincome students who meet eligibility requirements.

this program are doing an outstanding job when it comes to combining higher education along with early childhood education", said Rep. Hinojosa. "This program is meant to help students with children stay in college and it also serves to provide an excellent educational environment for their children. This is what I call a win, win situation".

To qualify, students must be eligible to receive a Federal Pell higher education to pursue postsecondary education. It is antici-Grant for that school year. The higher education institutions which are awarded the (CCAMPIS) grants must have awarded a total of \$350,000 or more of Federal Pell Grant funds to students enrolled at that institution during the prior school year.

"This grant allows us to continue to enhance our services in our early child development program on our Weslaco Campus", said Canales. "This grant also allows some of our students to do "Everyone at South Texas College who has been involved in their training at our nationally accredited Day Care Center. We are hoping to use these funds to expand our program, so that we can give more students and children an educational advantage".

CONGRESSMAN RUBÉN HINOJOSA ANNOUNCES **U.S. DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION GRANT AWARDED TO COASTAL BEND COLLEGE IN BEEVILLE**

U.S. Rep. Rubén Hinojosa (TX-15) announced Coastal Bend College in Beeville will receive a grant for \$290,517.00 from the U.S. Department of Education under the Student Support Services Program (SSS) to assist low-income, first-generation and disabled college students.

The SSS program is to provide academic and other support services to eligible students. The program is designed to increase student retention and graduation rates, facilitate their transfer from two-year to four-year colleges and foster an institutional climate.

"One of the biggest objectives for an institution of higher learning is being able to provide an educational environment which allows all students to complete their courses through graduation", said Rep. Hinojosa. "This grant from the U.S. Department of Education will certainly assist Coastal Bend College in helping more students to succeed

and guiding them to fulfill their dream of obtaining a college degree".

The program service may include: Instruction in basic study skills, tutorial services, academic, financial, or personal counseling, assistance in securing admission and financial aid for enrollment in four-year institutions. It may also include: assistance in securing admission and financial aid for enrollment in graduate and professional programs, guidance and career options, mentoring and special services for students with limited English proficiency and grant aid.



CONGRESSMAN RUBÉN HINOJOSA ANNOUNCES \$298,135.00 GRANT FOR **MCALLEN I.S.D. AND MCALLEN I.S.D. POLICE DEPARTMENT**

U.S. Rep. Rubén Hinojosa (TX-15) announced the U.S. Department of Education has awarded McAllen Independent School District and the McAllen I.S.D. Police Department \$298,135.00 grant for the Readiness and Emergency Management For Schools Program. The funds will be used to strengthen the emergency management plans (Prevention-Mitigation, Preparedness, Response and Recovery) in McAllen ISD schools.

"This grant award will help supplement the McAllen I.S.D. student safety and campus readiness plan through a joint community effort and through education and communication", said Rep. Hinojosa. "By joining together with government agencies, school leaders, local law enforcement, first responder departments, public and mental health officials, parents, guardians and other stakeholders, the McAllen Independent School District will be able to create clear communication and collaboration to effectively respond to an emergency".

McAllen I.S.D. is one of the largest school districts in the South Texas border region. With its growing population of over 25,000 students on 34 campuses and approximately 3,400 employees and 1,700 teachers, security and emergency readiness is a priority.

The program includes significant National Incident Management System (NIMS) Incident Command System (ICS) training, testing and evaluation that will help McAllen I.S.D. to sustain and continually improve its emergency preparedness and response capabilities.

Rep. Hinojosa added, "This is going to help the McAllen I.S.D. to continue to provide local emergency and school personnel with crucial tools that can help them respond to a school emergency quickly, saving time and possibly lives during critical moments".

CONGRESSMAN RUBÉN HINOJOSA ANNOUNCES NEARLY HALF A MILLION **DOLLAR GRANT FOR TEXAS STATE TECHNICAL COLLEGE IN HARLINGEN**

U.S. Rep. Rubén Hinojosa (TX-15) announced Texas State Technical College in Harlingen was awarded a \$426,186.00 grant by the U.S. Department of Education for the High School dents. It is anticipated that the program will be for a total of 5 Equivalency Program (HEP).

The purpose of the HEP program will help support state and local efforts to assist migratory and seasonal farm workers (or children of such workers) who are 16 years of age or older and not currently enrolled in school to obtain the equivalent of a high school diploma. Ultimately, the program strives to guide and provide support services for the student to gain employment or begin postsecondary education or training.

"Texas State Technical College has demonstrated for years how to best serve the students of South Texas", said Rep. Hinojosa. "I congratulate T.S.T.C. for their continued efforts towards helping low-income students strive to fulfill their dreams of obtaining higher education and finding good jobs".

The grant is for a one year plan which will help up to 100 stuyears. Besides the educational classes, the HEP program provides individual guidance, group guidance, and counseling opportunities as well as cultural and educational field trips for eligible students.



CONGRESSMAN RUBÉN HINOJOSA ANNOUNCES USDA GRANT AWARD FOR PROYECTO AZTECA FOR SELF-HELP HOUSING

U.S. Rep. Rubén Hinojosa (TX-15) announced a \$326,445 grant was awarded to Proyecto Azteca in Hidalgo County by USDA Rural Development. The funds will be used for the Self-Help Housing Technical Assistance Program which helps families construct their own homes.

"These funds will be used to help at least 35 families in Hidalgo County build a home', said Rep. Hinojosa. "Proyecto Azteca has been working to help provide assistance to so many residents in our area. I am very happy to see more funding awarded to this very worthy program".

The Rural Development funds will be used to provide assistance in recruitment, screening, loan packaging and related activities for prospective self-help housing applicants. The program also provides technical and supervisory assistance to the families who will be constructing their own homes.

Ann Williams Cass of Proyecto Azteca says 600 homes have been built since 1991. Each family is required to put in at least 550 "sweat-equity" hours into building their home. In cases where the eligible new home owner is disabled, Proyecto Azteca relies on volunteers to help build the homes.

The homes are constructed at the Proyecto Azteca site in San Juan and then are moved to area colonias. Williams says the new home owners have a deep sense of pride in their homes because they put so much into them.

CONGRESSMAN RUBÉN HINOJOSA ANNOUNCES USDA RURAL DEVELOPMENT GRANT FOR THE DEVELOPMENT CORPORATION OF DONNA

U.S. Rep. Rubén Hinojosa (TX-15) announced a grant for \$114,200 was awarded to the Development Corporation of Donna by USDA Rural Development. The funds will be used to create a Revolving Loan Fund to help small and emerging businesses in the area.

"Many smaller towns in the Rio Grande Valley lose their businesses and their jobs to larger cities, said Rep. Hinojosa. "This grant from USDA Rural Development, for business loans, offers the Donna area a fighting chance to keep local jobs and help small businesses in the area".

Donna Mayor, David Simmons says the funds will also help their new Industrial Park, which is already lining up business. "We already have interested parties who want to start up businesses in Donna", said Mayor Simmons. "We are grateful to Congressman Hinojosa for all he is doing to keep our economy going in our community".

The grant could create approximately 12 new jobs Donna. Mayor Simmons said that was a very good start. Mayor Simmons added that the loans will be made to small businesses at a very low interest rate.

What the Student Aid and Fiscal Responsibility Act Means to You in Texas



Increased the maximum Pell Grant award to \$5, 550 this year – By 2017, the maximum Pell Grant is expected to be \$5,975. The value of the Pell Grant has been shrinking – paying 75% of college costs in 1977, and just 33% last year.

Made your student loan payments more affordable – Right now you can cap your student loan payment at 15% of your discretionary income, and any balances you have left after 25 years will be forgiven. For new borrowers starting in 2014, this goes down to 10% of your discretionary income, with balances forgiven after 20 years.



Lowered student loan interest rates on your need-based loans – Subsidized Stafford Loan rates have been dropping and will continue to decrease over the next two years, going down to 4.5% in the 2010-2011 school year and reaching 3.4% in the 2011-2012 school year.

Invested in students, not banks – By switching all schools to the more efficient Direct Loan program, the government will save \$68 Billion over the next 11 years-money that will now be used to help you, rather than subsidies to banks.



Made it easier to apply for federal student aid & plan for textbooks – We streamlined the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) process down from 100 questions and created a two-page FAFSA-EZ form – giving families extra time to plan for college expenses. On textbooks, colleges are now required to provide you with advance information on textbook pricing to help you plan. And publishers must provide pricing information on "unbundled" versions of every "bundled" textbook they sell.



Invested in community colleges – \$500 million a year for the next four years – All students – including those who are returning to school after being in the work force – will have access to high-quality, low-cost higher education. More courses will be available in community colleges such as South Texas College in McAllen, Texas State Technical College in Harlingen and Coastal Bend College. These courses will be offered at times that work for you.



Invested \$2.55 billion in historically black colleges and universities and Hispanicserving institutions such as the University of Texas-Pan American and Texas A&M University-Kingsville – This can renew, reform and expand programming to provide students with the support they need to stay in school and graduate.



Encouraged teaching through tuition assistance and rewarded public service through loan forgiveness – You can receive up to \$4,000 a year in up-front tuition assistance if you commit to teaching in a high-need area or subject area for four years after you graduate. If you work in public service or at a nonprofit for 10 years, and make payments on your federal student loans during that time, any balances after 10 years will be forgiven.

NIFA requests applications for the Community Food Projects Competitive Grants Program (CFPCGP) for fiscal year (FY) 2011 to support: 1)the development of Community Food Projects with a one-time infusion of federal dollars to make such projects self-sustaining; and 2)Planning Projects to assess the food security needs and plan long-term solutions to help ensure food security in communities. NIFA anticipates that the amount available for support of this program in FY 2011 will be approximately \$5,000,000. The primary goals of the Community Food Projects Competitive Grants Program (CFPCGP) are to: Meet the food needs of low-income individuals; Increase the self-reliance of communities in providing for the food needs of the communities; Promote comprehensive responses to local food, farm, and nutrition issues; and Meet specific State, local or neighborhood food and agricultural needs including needs relating to: Infrastructure improvement and development; Planning for long-term solutions; or The creation of innovative marketing activities that mutually benefit agricultural producers and low-income consumers. Community Food Projects are intended to bring together stakeholders from the distinct parts of the food system and to foster understanding of national food security trends and how they might improve local food systems.

Eligible Applicants: Only private, nonprofit entities meeting the following three (3) requirements are eligible to receive a CFP or PP grant: (a) have experience in the area of (i) community food work, particularly concerning small and medium-size farms, including the provision of sustainably produced food to people in low-income communities and the development of new markets in low-income communities for agricultural producers; or (ii) job training and business development activities for food-related activities in low-income communities; (b) demonstrate competency to implement a project, provide fiscal accountability, collect data, and prepare reports and other necessary documentation; and (c) demonstrate a willingness to share information with researchers, evaluators, practitioners, and other interested parties, including a plan for dissemination of results.

The Kresge Foundation's Arts and Culture Program is inviting preliminary applications for its Facility Investments and Building Reserves grants. The opportunity is part of the program's Institutional Capitalization focus area, which is designed to strengthen the long-term financial health of arts and cultural organizations. Facility investments grants support both project costs and the creation of a building reserve. This new grant opportunity will prioritize renovation and repair projects. On occasion, the program will entertain applications for new construction associated with exemplary sustainability practices or those that embody key principles of urban and community planning to enhance local quality of life. Building reserves grants are designed to seed or enhance a fund to support the ongoing maintenance and replacement needs of an organization. Start-up organizations and those organizations that

are government-owned and operated are not eligible to apply. Grant amounts will be dependent on the type of project and the size, scope, and business model of the organization. Some grants may be designed as matching or challenge grants. Additionally, full applications will be reviewed to see if other funding methods may be appropriate. In general, multi-year institutional capitalization grants will not exceed \$1 million and/or a period of three years from the time of the grant award. Organizations with competitive pre-applications will be invited to submit full applications. For those organizations that submit promising pre-applications but require additional support to complete their analysis, planning grants may be made available. The foundation calls for pre-liminary applications for facility investments and building reserves grants twice a year, in the spring and the fall.

National Association of Latino Arts and Culture Fund for the Arts Offers Grants for Artists and Nonprofits

Deadline: 09/24/2010

The NALAC Fund for the Arts is a field-advised grant program designed to help Latinos develop their creative talents and make lasting contributions to their communities and society as a whole. Launched in 2005 by the National Association of Latino Arts and Culture with major support from the Ford Foundation, the NFA provides financial resources to strengthen Latino small and mid-sized arts organizations and to support Latino artists in the creation of their work. A "Latino arts organization" is defined as an organization whose mission is focused on Latino art and culture, whose executive or artistic director is Latino, and/or whose board of directors is comprised of at least 51 percent Latinos. Applicant organizations must have 501(c)(3) nonprofit status or have a fiscal sponsor with a 501(c)(3) status, must have been in existence for at least one fiscal year, must have an operating budget that does not exceed \$1 million, and must be a member of NALAC. Eligible organizations may apply for grants ranging from \$1,000 to \$10,000 each to be used toward general operating support, the creation and presentation of artistic works, organizational capacity-building initiatives, and professional development. A "Latino artist' is defined as a U.S.-based Latino artist working individually or as part of a Latino ensemble, arts collective, or community-based arts group in dance, interdisciplinary arts, literary arts, media arts, multidisciplinary arts, music, performance art, theater arts, or visual arts. Applicant artists must be at least 18 years of age, and must be a member of NALAC. Individual artist project grants ranging from \$1,000 to \$10,000 each may be used for creation, development, and presentation of work; professional or career development, equipment necessary for artistic production, or project research and travel. In addition, a limited number of NFA Artist Fellowship Grants ranging from \$1,000 to \$20,000. The technical assistance period for this NFA grant cycle is open until August 16, 2010. Jacob K. Javits Fellowship Program

U.S. Department of Education (ED), Office of Postsecondary Education (OPE)

The purpose of the Jacob K. Javits (JKJ) Fellowship Program is to award fellowships to eligible students of superior ability, selected on the basis of demonstrated achievement, financial need, and exceptional promise, to undertake graduate study in specific fields in the arts, humanities, and social sciences leading to a doctoral degree or to a master's degree in those fields in which the master's degree is the terminal highest degree awarded to the selected field of study at accredited institutions of higher education. The selected fields in the arts are: Creative writing, music performance, music theory, music composition, music literature, studio arts (including photography), television, film, cinematography, theater arts, playwriting, screenwriting, acting, and dance. The selected fields in the humanities are: Art history (including architectural history), archeology, area studies, classics, comparative literature, English language and literature, folklore, folk life, foreign languages and literature, history, linguistics, philosophy, religion (excluding study of religious vocation), speech, rhetoric, and debate. The selected fields in the social sciences are: Anthropology, communications and media, economics, ethnic and cultural studies, geography, political science, psychology (excluding clinical psychology), public policy and public administration, and sociology (excluding the master's and doctoral degrees in social work).

Maximum Grant Size: \$43,989

Number of Awards: 33

Eligible Applicants: Individuals who, at the time of application: Are eligible to receive a Federal grant, loan or work assistance pursuant to section 484 of the Higher Education Act of 1965, as amended (HEA); intend to pursue a doctoral or Master of Fine Arts degree in an eligible field of study selected by the Board at an accredited U.S. institution of higher education; and are a U.S. citizen or national, a permanent resident of the United States, in the United States for other than a temporary purpose and intending to become a permanent resident, or a citizen of any one of the Freely Associated States. The program will transform neighborhoods by revitalizing severely distressed public and/or assisted housing and investing and leveraging investments in well-functioning services, high quality public schools and education programs, high quality early learning programs and services, public assets, public transportation, and improved access to jobs. Choice Neighborhoods will ensure that current residents will be able to benefit from this transformation, by preserving affordable housing or providing residents with the choice to move to affordable and accessible housing in another existing neighborhood of opportunity. In the development of Choice Neighborhoods, HUD has focused on directing resources into three core goals: 1)Housing: Transform distressed public and assisted housing into energy efficient, mixed-income housing that is physically and financially viable over the long-term;2)People: Support positive outcomes for families who live in the target development(s) and the surrounding neighborhood, particularly outcomes related to residents' health, safety, employment, mobility, and education, 3)Neighborhood: Transform neighborhoods of poverty into viable, mixed-income neighborhoods with access to well-functioning services, high quality public schools and education programs, high quality early learning programs and services, public assets, public transportation, and improved access to jobs. To achieve these core goals, communities must develop a comprehensive neighborhood revitalization strategy, or Transformation Plan. Staffing for Adequate Fire and Emergency Response (SAFER) Grant Program

U.S. Department of Homeland Security (DHS), Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA)
